MT. ANGEL—Members of Benedictine Village, Inc. voted Monday night to dissolve the corporation and to deed the land south of the church, less the property on which the church heating plant stands, to the Benedictine Art Shop.
The land on which the parish heating plant stands plus two feet to the south of the building is to be deeded to the parish S. Mary's Church.
The remainder of the four-acre plot will go to the Benedictine Art Shop, a corporation which makes handmade religious articles, which assumes the \$4,845 mortgage.
With the dissolution of the Benedictine Village the hope and plan of the cottage-type home for the aged which had been the dream of Father Hildebrand and a group of hard-working parishioners, vanishes.
