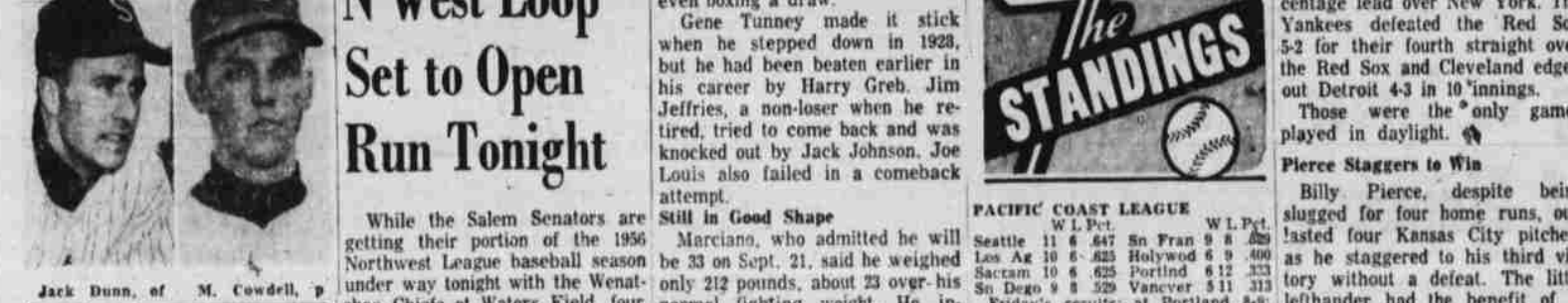

Ben Hogan Ends Golf Retirement

NEW YORK — Ben Hogan ended retirement talk Friday and took aim at the one great objective that has eluded him in an illustrious golfing career—his fifth U. S. Open championship.

Hogan's entry for the 1956 Open championship at Rochester, N. Y., June 14-16 reached U. S. Golf Assn. headquarters Friday, ending speculation that began after he lost to Jack Fleck in a playoff for the 1955 Open title and indicated that he never would make another serious bid.

Marciano Retires As Heavyweight Champ

Family Rated Ahead of Ring Bosox Still in Slump . . .

Undefeated King Quits Without Loss

NEW YORK — Rocky Marciano retired Friday as heavyweight champion of the world, unbeaten in his 49 pro fights, to spend more time with his wife and baby daughter at his Brockton, Mass., home.

If Rocky can resist the lure of a comeback, he will be the only unbeaten heavyweight titleholder ever to quit without losing a pro fight or even boxing a draw.

Gene Tunney made it stick when he stepped down in 1928, but he had been beaten earlier in his career by Harry Greb, Jim Jeffries, a non-losser when he retired, tried to come back and was knocked out by Jack Johnson. Joe Louis also failed in a comeback attempt.

Marciano, who admitted he will be 33 on Sept. 21, said he weighed only 212 pounds, about 25 over his normal fighting weight. He insisted physical condition had nothing to do with his decision to step fighting.

"I am retiring because of my wife and Mary Anne (his 3 1/2 year old daughter)," said Marciano at a hastily called news conference after his wife, Barbara, already had released the news to Vic DuBois, sports editor of the Brockton Enterprise. "Actually I feel good. I still have some good fights left in me."

"My mother never did want me to fight," said Rocky. "My decision puts her very much at ease. My father always liked boxing but he's happy to see me quit."

Stranger to Daughter

"Barbara has been after me to quit for some time. After the Don Cockell fight (in San Francisco, May 16, 1955) we spent a month together in Mexico. She did a lot of talking about our not being together and how I had to be introduced to the baby every time I went home. I never spent more than two weeks in a row at home."

"Even before the Archie Moore fight his last match, Sept. 21, 1955) I was thinking about retirement. After the fight I really began to consider it seriously. I thought I would be taking advantage of my family if I tried to fight anymore. At first, I was single. It didn't make any difference then. But the baby makes a lot of difference."

Possible Successors Named

Who did Marciano think should succeed him as champion? Rocky named three men—Archie Moore, Floyd Patterson and Hurricane Jackson—as possibilities.

Ring Magazine's latest ratings show Moore as top contender followed by Jackson. Bob Baker of Pittsburgh, John Holman of Chicago and Johnny Summerlin of Detroit. The NBA quarterly ratings put Jackson behind Marciano followed by Baker, Nino Valdes of Cuba with "honorable mention" to Holman, Summerlin and four others. They rate Moore only as a light-heavy.

Knocked Down Twice

Marciano defended his title six times after winning it by knocking out Jersey Joe Walcott in the 13th round of a thrilling bout at Philadelphia, Sept. 23, 1952.

Only six opponents went the route with him in 49 pro fights. He was knocked down twice, the first time in his first match with Walcott and the last time in his final bout with Moore.

Although there are only estimates on some of his early bouts, it was believed his purses totalled about \$1,700,000, before manager's cut and taxes.

Bob Gaytas posted one of the better times of the meet, clipping off the 100-yard dash in 10 flat. Gaytas also won the 220.

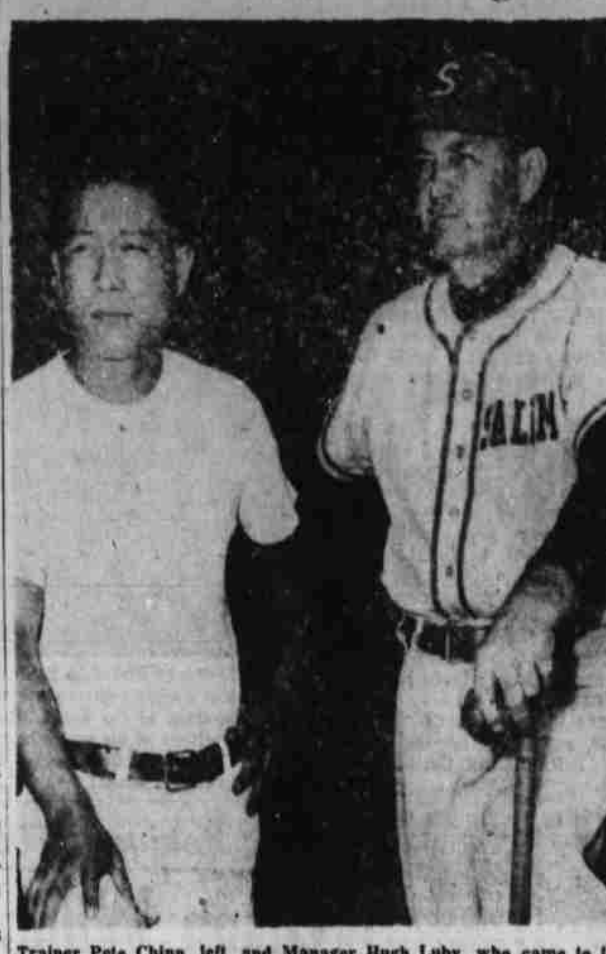

The 1956 Oregon trout fishing season got under way this morning, and thousands of anglers were up and 'em throughout the state. Most of the streams and lakes available for fishing were reported in "good to excellent" condition for the opener.

On the local scene, hundreds of youngsters are expected to be fighting the annual battle of Mill Creek, which is closed to fishing to all but the "small fry." The Oregon Game Commission stocked the stream with 2,000 legal size trout recently, and the kids are expected to have their annual fun and frolic trying to hook them.

The Commission only recently completed a major stream stocking program around the state, providing the many anglers with good opportunities to catch legal size fish.

Inaugural Set At Waters Park; King on Mound

Weather permitting, the 1956 Northwest League baseball season leaves the barrier tonight at Waters Field, same returning two long-time rivals, the Salem Senators and Wenatchee Chiefs, and following the usual pre-opener fanfare. The ceremonies, including flag-raising, speech-making, promises and introductions are tabbed for a 7:30 o'clock takeoff. The game itself will get under way around eight, after some high state official, batting for Gov. Smith, casts his opening pitch.

The inaugural will be the 14th for Salem Senators baseball here. What it will draw is a difficult question, and the answer doesn't appear to be even closely related to the record for opening nights, a snappy 4,356 established in the first year of pro ball here, back in 1940.

Home Openers Lost by Bevos

PORTLAND, Ore. — The Sacramento Solons spoiled Portland's opening in its new baseball park by winning both ends of a high-scoring day: night doubleheader here Friday, 9-4 in the 11th inning afternoon opener and 10-9 in the night game.

Record Attendance Fills Multnomah

Portland's record crowd of 17,321 erased the afternoon mark of 16,929 and bettered the previous 1956 Pacific Coast League attendance of 14,001 set at San Francisco earlier in the season.

Elsewhere in the PCL, Seattle kept its spot atop the standings with a 9-3 win over San Diego, San Francisco exploded in the ninth inning for two runs to down the Vancouver Mounties in their Canadian opener, 2-1, and Los Angeles blasted Hollywood 10-4 in their series opener.

The two-game total attendance of 34,450 also was a record turnout for an opening doubleheader. Portland took a two-run lead in the night game when Jim Baxes singled in two runs in the third inning. But the Sac came back with a five-run outburst in the fifth with a triple by pitcher
