Fire District Meeting Set For Tonight

SALEM HEIGHTS—A public meeting for discussion of a proposed \$55,000 bond issue for the Liberty-Salem Heights Fire District will be held at the Salem Heights Community Club at 8 p.m. Tuesday. The issue will be up for vote May 29.

The money would be used for construction of a new fire hall, with training facilities, and a 1000-gallon tanker with a 250-gallon pump and fire hose. The fire hall would be on property already owned by the district on Sunnyside just off Highway 99E west of the Volkswagen agency.

Lyle Suiter, secretary of the fire district, said the proposed bond issue would be retired through a 5-mill levy for four years. He said approval of the bonds would lead to a 10-cent insurance reduction per \$100 valuation in hydrant areas and a 16-cent reduction outside hydrant areas.

The fire district's present equipment is housed behind Dickson's store.

JAMES COPP (D)
Candidate for
Polk County Clerk

DALLAS—James Copp, bookkeeper and farmer, has filed on the Polk County Democratic ticket for county clerk. Mr. Copp feels that his more than 25 years in office work and business managing amply qualify him for the position.

He has lived in Polk County for the last 10 years and has worked in the office of the production department of Gerlinger Carrier Company for the last five years. Prior to that he lived in Yamhill County for 10 years and for five of those years he was manager of the Amity Cooperative Warehouse and Feed Mill.

Born in Stanstead, Quebec, on Jan. 16, 1908, Copp served overseas in World War I as a Canadian soldier and was wounded in action. He entered the United States in 1921 and came to Oregon in 1924.

He received his business training in Portland, where he was graduated from the Northwestern School of Commerce in 1930. From 1930 to 1935 he was an accountant for the Norton, Lilly Steamship agents in Portland. He became a United States citizen in 1942 in McMinnville.

Copp has been a member of the Farmers' Union for 15 years and served as president of the Perrydale Farmers Union in 1948 and 1949. He was a Polk County member of the Federal Farm Home Administration committee and chairman of the committee of the Veterans' Vocational Agriculture program from 1946 to 1949.

He and his wife live on a 90-acre farm in the Smithfield district, where he raises sheep and cattle in his spare time. Their daughter, Mrs. Charles Honey, is an honor graduate student at Oregon State College in Corvallis, and their son, Bertram, will graduate this spring from the Oregon State College.

ALBANY—Frank Clover Dannals, 90, long-time Albany resident and businessman, died Sunday afternoon at a local hospital following a week's illness.

Funeral services will take place Tuesday at 2 p.m. at Fort Miller—Frederickson Funeral Home. Interment will follow at the Masonic Cemetery here.

Dannals lived in Albany for the past 80 years. He was a paint contractor for 68 years and operated a paint store in downtown Albany until he retired about 1945.

He was born at Salem April 17, 1866. He married Mrs. Luevel Kendall July 2, 1902, at Albany. She died June 14, 1943.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Ollie Dannals, whom he married in 1951; five daughters, Mrs. Richard Paul of Portland, Mrs. R. A. Sloan of Albany; stepson, Hillard Kendall of Salem; sister, Mrs. William Pollak of North Hollywood, Calif.; six grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.

Gervais Students Elect Officers

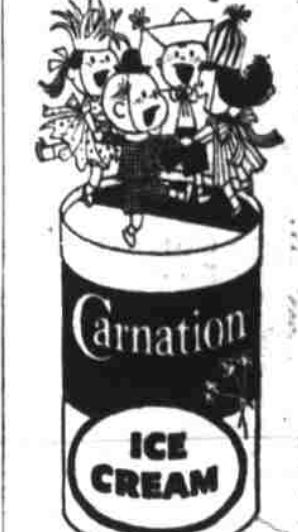

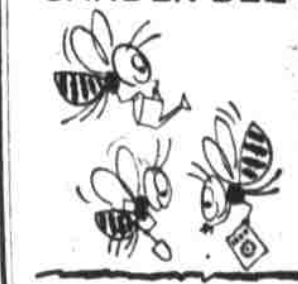
