

Five States Hold Primaries Today; Indiana in Spotlight

Five states—Indiana, Ohio, West Virginia, Florida and New Mexico—hold primaries Tuesday.
From a national standpoint, the Indiana results will get the closest watching. The question there is how much the Republican vote

will exceed the Democratic; both sides say the Republicans will be on top, as usual.
Ohio will elect national convention delegates with 58 votes at the Democratic convention and 36 at the Republican. West Virginia also will pick its convention delegates,

with 24 votes at the Democratic convention and 16 at the Republican.
Tuesday's primaries, in brief: **INDIANA**
President Eisenhower had little opposition in the Republican presidential preference voting. Kefauver had none on the Democratic side. Hence there will be a sort of popularity contest between them.
Democrats did well in the municipal elections in Indiana last year and are counting on an increased farm vote to boost their standing. However, Indiana is usually counted safe by the Republicans.

Michigan Pair Riding Horseback to Oregon

MONROE, Mich. (AP) — It'll be clip-clop, clip-clop for 3,000 miles for a Monroe couple who set out on horseback Monday for Oregon.
Kenneth King, 30, and his wife, Joanne, 29, piled all their possessions aboard a packhorse and pulled up stakes for the long journey west. They expect it will take about four months to reach Pendleton, Ore., where King hopes to get a job on a ranch.
The Kings said they decided on the trek because "we both like horses." Their home here was an apartment in a riding stable.
They plan to camp out along the way. Their gear includes a collapsible stove, a tent, rifles and an extra supply of horse-shoes.
The Kings will follow a north-west route, going by way of Ludington, Mich., by boat across Lake Michigan, then up through Wisconsin, the Dakotas and Montana.
King is astride Ringo, a dark sorrel, and his wife rides Inky, a white horse. Their four-footed moving van is Cocoa.
Walking escort duty will be Bruno, the couple's Weimaraner dog. He'll get a horseback ride, too, when his feet get tired.

Accused Sex Slayer Sent To Grand Jury

MEDFORD (AP) — Billy Junior Nunn, 23, accused of first degree murder in the sex slaying of a 14-year-old Klamath Falls boy, was bound over to a grand jury Monday.
The testimony of State Police Sgt. Thomas Eaton was found by Dist. Judge Rawles Moore to be sufficient to require grand jury action.
Eaton testified that Nunn, a Klamath Falls millworker, had told of the killing while the two men were en route from Alura, Calif., where Nunn was arrested, to Medford.
Eaton said Nunn told him he had picked up the boy, Alvin William Ecker, in his car April 19 and had driven him to Tub Springs, a secluded park area. There, Eaton quoted Nunn as saying, Nunn committed a sexual attack on the boy and then strangled him with his hands.
Nunn said he killed the boy to keep him from telling others of the incident, Eaton testified.

Fishing Loss Pay Asked For Indians

WASHINGTON (AP) — Spokesmen for the Umatilla and Yakima Indians Monday urged congressional approval of funds to pay them for the loss of their Columbia River fishing rights through construction of The Dalles lock and dam.
The budget recommends appropriation of some 23 million dollars for three tribes.
Of this amount 15 million would go to the Yakimas and about four million each to the Umatilla and Warm Springs tribes.
These three tribes have signed contracts with the government settling their claims for these amounts.
Charles F. Luce, tribal attorney, and David Hall, a tribal member, represented the Umatillas at Monday's hearing. Paul M. Niebel, Washington attorney, represented the Yakimas. The Warm Springs Indians are to be heard later in the week.
The three testified before a Senate appropriations subcommittee headed by Sen. Ellender (D-La.).
In response to questions, Luce said the annual fish catch of the Indians at the fishing ground at Celilo fishery is valued at around \$700,000. The fishing grounds, in a narrow part of the big river, will be under water when the dam is completed in the near future.

Canadian Fire Sweeps Over Hill Timber

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP) — Forestry officials said Monday a fire was sweeping through 40 acres of hillside timber in Howe Sound, about 25 miles northwest of Vancouver.
It was the worst of 33 forest fires still burning in the Vancouver forest district after a weekend of destruction in the province's tinder-dry woods. The Vancouver district covers the lower southwest coast of the province and the southern part of Vancouver Island.
"The situation is not too bad now," an official said late Monday, "but potentially it's still very bad."

Estes' Aide Sees Oregon Vote as Vital

PORTLAND (AP) — J. Howard V. Grall, co-chairman of national Kefauver for president or organization, said Monday the May 18 Oregon primary election will have a decided effect on the Florida and California presidential primaries which follow.
"The Florida and California elections, like Oregon's, give all the votes to the winning candidate. I don't see how (Adlai Stevenson) can go very far if he loses to Kefauver in either of both of them," McGrath said.
He said the Tennessee senator will have some strength from all states when the convention opens in Chicago. This will give Kefauver about 300 votes at the start, provided he wins in Oregon, California and Florida, McGrath said.

Electronic Gadget Aids Air Bombing

GREAT NECK, N. Y. (AP) — An electronic control system for B-52 intercontinental jet bombers that enables crews to "find and hit any target in the world in any weather" was announced Monday by the Sperry Gyroscope Co.
The Sperry company said it has designed two control systems, one an "electronic co-pilot" and the other an automatic bombing system.
The company said the "electronic co-pilot" was a "near-human" device that automatically computes the force to be applied to the plane's control surfaces for any flight maneuver.
The bombing system, Sperry said, automatically feeds steering information to the flight control system.

First Aid Car Fund \$500 Richer

The fund for a new city first aid car was \$500 richer Monday, as results of a contribution from the Marion-Polk County Medical Society.
Dr. Robert K. Wulf, secretary of the society, presented a check for the sum to Fire Chief Ellis Smith.
Smith said the contribution raises the fund to about \$1,800. Goal is \$3,000. Other money for the car came principally from a benefit fashion show held last fall and since then there has been a scattering of individual donations.

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California Paper Wins Pulitzer Prize

NEW YORK (AP) — The Watsonville, Calif., Register-Palmarian, with a circulation of 7,800, was selected as winner of the 1956 Pulitzer public service award in journalism Monday. The newspaper's crusade led to the resignation of a district attorney and the conviction of one of his associates.
A roving three-man team from the Hearst newspapers, headed by Editor-in-Chief William Randolph Hearst Jr., won the international reporting award for exclusive interviews with top Soviet leaders.
Cited with Hearst were Kingsbury Smith, vice president and general manager of International News Service, and Frank Conniff, editorial assistant to Hearst.
Other journalistic winners were: **Local Reporting**—Lee Hills, executive editor of the Detroit Free Press, for his coverage of the United Auto Workers' negotiations for supplemental employment pay, and Arthur Daley of the New York Times, for his coverage of sports in his column "Sports of the Times."
National Reporting—Charles L. Bartlett of the Chattanooga, Tenn., Times, for his series exposing a conflict of interests and leading to the resignation of Harold E. Talbot as secretary of the Air Force.
Editorials—Lauren K. Soth of the Des Moines Register and Tribune, for his editorial invitation that led a Russian farm delegation to visit Iowa.
Cartooning—Robert York of the Louisville, Ky., Times for "Achilles," his depiction of the weak heel of farm prices upon which the bulging figure of American prosperity rested.

Photography—The New York Daily News for consistently excellent news picture coverage. An outstanding example cited was George Mattson's air view of a bomber crash into the street of a Long Island city. Twenty-five other photographers for the Daily News were mentioned by name in the citation.
The winning newspaper receives a golden plaque. Individual journalistic winners get \$1,000 each. Awards in letters and music are \$500 each.
Other winners included: **History**—"The Age of Reform," Richard Hofstadter's study of the passion for progress and reform from 1890 to 1940.
Biography—"Benjamin Henry Latrobe," a full length biography by Talbot Hamlin of America's first professional architect.
Poetry—Elizabeth Bishop's collection of poems, "North and South—A Cold Spring."
Music—Ernst Toch, self-taught Viennese composer of "Symphony No. 3," first performed last December by the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra.

Court Avoids Mail Dispute

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court Monday refused to rule on an attack by five railroads on the government's authority to experiment with carrying ordinary first-class mail by air.
The railroads contended the test violated postal laws which call for postage of 6 cents an ounce on mail carried by air. Under the program, first class mail bearing postage of 3 cents an ounce is given air carriers when they have space available.
The U. S. court of appeals here found the program was authorized by law. The railroads, which then appealed to the highest tribunal, are the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe, Great Northern, Northern Pacific, Southern Pacific and Union Pacific.
