

British 'Sparring' With Soviets Over Mystery of Lost Frogman

LONDON (AP)—The Eden government engaged in cool and distant sparring with Moscow Saturday over the mystery of the vanished frogman—and braced for

bare-knuckled blows from its domestic political foes. Lionel (Buster) Crabb, skin diver and retired lieutenant commander of the royal navy, is presumed to have lost his life while taking a secret, underwater peep at Soviet warships in Portsmouth harbor during the state visit of Soviet leaders Bulganin and Khrushchev.

But his mission is disowned by the highest level of the British government and the Soviet government has politely refrained from calling it spying. Instead, the Soviet government Friday night vaguely referred to it as an "unusual fact," politely asked for an explanation and said Britain had apologized.

The roughest twist to the case on the diplomatic level was the accusation by a British foreign office spokesman Saturday that Russia had violated diplomatic usage by announcing the apology before the British themselves disclosed it.

Admitting officially that such an apology had been made, the spokesman said "when an exchange of notes takes place between nations, it is customary for a government to publish the text of its own communication only, and not that of the other government."

Crabb's body has never been found. What happened to him is a mystery, though the admiralty announced he presumably died on April 19, the day after Bulganin and Khrushchev arrived in Portsmouth harbor aboard the cruiser Ordzhonikidze.

The Soviet note released Friday night said a diver, wearing flippers and a lightweight diving suit was sighted by lookouts aboard a Soviet destroyer about 7.30 a. m. that day and after a minute or two he disappeared under the water near one of the warships.

The British reply acknowledged that this "presumably" was Crabb who was "engaged in diving tests," and said his approach to the Soviet warships "was completely unauthorized and her majesty's government express their regret at the incident."

Albert R. MacCagnan, 41, interviewed in the county jail, said the only drawbacks to his discovery were his lack of knowledge of its value and the fact it sent him to jail.

MacCagnan, a veteran of 20 years on the docks, was arrested on suspicion of violating the State Narcotics Law. Police said he had \$1,000 on his person and records showing he had banked \$6,500 since the first of the year.

Friday harbor division police, acting on another tip, searched MacCagnan's car for the third time and found \$25,000 worth of heroin concealed in the oil filter.

The officers then raided the home of a friend of the dock worker and said they found more than five pounds of heroin in three plastic bags. The friend, whose name was not released, told officers MacCagnan left the three bags at his home saying they contained paint thinner.

Continued U.S. Foreign Aid Said Good Business

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore) said Saturday that to continue foreign aid "sounds like good business."

"There seems to be a growing feeling that it is time to call a halt" to foreign aid spending, he said, adding: "We must remember, however, that so long as the mighty Red military machines continue to grow and grow and grow, there is the ever present danger that some time, some place, the mad Russians in the Kremlin might decide to use it aggressively."

Court Takes Custody of Union Funds

ROSEBURG (AP)—Fifty contract drivers for four log hauling companies are on strike for an increase in pay. Affected are the Chappell Logging Co., B & B Logging Co., Scott Logging Co. and Powell Logging Co., all of the Myrtle Creek area south of here.

The drivers, who are paid at a rate of 25 per cent of the value of the haul, are asking an increase of \$2 per thousand board feet.

The drivers said that living costs have gone up and there has been a 30 per cent increase in the cost of equipment since they received their last increase eight years ago.

Terrorists Appeal for Briton's Death

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP)—A battle of leaflets—including an underground appeal for the "execution" of British Gov. Sir John Harding—filled an otherwise ominous calm in this troubled city Saturday.

An appeal pasted on walls about the city called the governor "Gaulleter Sir John" and said "it is the duty of all Greeks" to execute him.

The leaflet bore the typed signature of Digenis, unidentified leader of the Eoka organization which seeks union of this crown colony with Greece. Digenis is believed to be Col. George Grivas, former Greek army officer, who has a \$28,000 price on his head.

"Instead of a material reward which can emanate only from scum and can be accepted only by scum," the leaflet said, "we shall make the executioner of the sadistic tormentor of the Cypriot people a national hero whose name will be written in gold letters in the roll of honor of the heroes of the Cypriot struggle."

There already has been one attempt on Harding's life. Last March 23 an unexploded time bomb was found in the bed in which he had slept all night.

Cypriot police passed out leaflets, too. They asked the Greek population, which make up four-fifths of the island's half million, to "disown bloodstained fanatical terrorists."

"These murderers do not help our national cause. On the contrary, they retard it and smear it. The whole world considered our island a peaceful haven of Greek civilization. Now they see our island bloodstained. They consider us barbarians who shoot sick women in hospital beds, kill Christians in churches, throw

Senate Committee Hints at Possible Veto of Farm Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—Hinting at a possible veto, five members of the Senate Agriculture Committee Saturday urged the Senate to knock mandatory price supports on livestock feed grains from the new soil bank farm bill.

"This is the kind of contradiction which caused the President to veto the original farm bill of 1956," the minority group said in a 36-page report on the new bill. It was signed by Sens. Holland (D-Fla.), Eastland (D-Miss.), Aiken (R-Vt.), Hickenlooper (R-Iowa) and Williams (R-Del.).

Majority Report
The report by the majority of the committee, led by Chairman Ellender (D-La.), also was issued Saturday. It was devoted largely to previously publicised explanations of the bill. Like the minority report it mentioned President Eisenhower's April 16 veto of the previous omnibus farm bill, but said: "The provisions objected to by the President have been either eliminated or modified."

As did the previous bill, the new one authorizes \$1,200,000,000 of soil bank benefits to farmers who underplant their allotments of surplus crops or divert lands to grass and trees.

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Log Drivers Out on Strike

ROSEBURG (AP)—The funds of Local 2624 of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union, tied up by a jurisdictional dispute, will be turned over to the Douglas County Circuit Court.

Norman Morgan, representative for the LSWU, said he was directed by the union's headquarters to "take complete supervision and direct this local" after local officers "engaged in actions detrimental to the interests" of union members.

William Harris is business agent of the union and is fighting to retain control. The National Labor Relations Board will hold an election within the next 30 days to determine who is to represent workers at the Long Bell Lumber Co. and E. K. Wood Lumber Co. plants in the Reedsport area.
