CD Emergency Hospital Demonstration Planned

A working demonstration of the Civil Defense 200-bed emergency hospital will be given at 7:30 p.m. Monday and Tuesday to members of the Marion County medical profession, Wallace S.

Wharton, county civil defense director announced Friday.

Monday night's tour will be for groups of practical nurses, aides, laboratory technicians, pharmacists, dentists, dental assistants and X-ray technicians. Drs. E. S. Vanderhoof, Joseph Van Eaton and C. E. Weeber will explain the organization and function of the hospital before the working demonstration.

Tuesday night's demonstration will be for hospital administrators, graduate nurses and members of the Marion-Polk County Medical Society. All departments of the emergency hospital will be manned by skeleton crews of doctors, nurses and technicians for the demonstration.

The 200-bed emergency unit was designed under federal civil defense agency specifications to provide mobile hospital facilities to meet disaster situations. The unit is a complete general hospital that can be transported in an ordinary sized truck-trailer van.

Wilson Asked To Testify in Senate Probe

WASHINGTON — Chairman Hennings (D-Mo) announced Saturday he is summoning Secretary of Defense Wilson before the Senate Constitutional Rights Subcommittee to explain the Pentagon's handling of security risk cases.

Aides said the subcommittee also plans to summon Atty. Gen. Brownell who, like Wilson, has not responded to prior invitations. The subcommittee is preparing a report now on what Hennings describes as an exposure of abuses in the government's security program. The report is based on hearings held last November.

Saturday Hennings made public a letter to Wilson saying the subcommittee "respectfully calls upon you" to explain among other things whether the other armed services have adopted what Hennings termed the Army's "common sense" rules for judging who is a real security risk.

Hennings' letter also referred to the case of a Seattle Port of Embarkation carpenter whose wife was reinstated to her port job although he was fired. Hennings' letter said the charges against both were the same.

The letter included a protest that the Army itself "withheld unaccountably for six months" disclosure to the subcommittee that Secretary of the Army Brucker had laid down the "common sense" rules last Oct. 17. It asked how closely the Army has followed those rules.

Hennings asked Wilson to name a suitable date to appear before the subcommittee. It did not say whether it planned a public or closed door session.

Hennings recalled that he has asked Secretary of the Air Force Quarles to review the case of Sidney Halkin, an Air Force employee suspended without pay for 14 months as a suspected security risk. Halkin announced last Sunday that he had spurned a Russian effort to hire him to supply information about the U. S. aircraft industry.

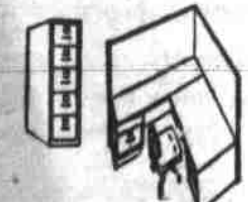
