# Loss of Year Faces UCLA's Grid Players

(Continued from preceding page) the modified penalty. Football players at UCLA will lose one year of eligibility unless they can show they have not received any illegal financial aid. If they are untaunted they will be cleared entirely.

This means coach Red Sanders will have at least the nucleus of a football team next year — although he could lose all who were juniors on the 1955 squad. A 1955 freshman who is caught in the web will be limited to two years of varsity play, a sophomore will have one. If he wishes he may delay his penalty season until his final year in school.

Eligibility Not Certain  
"We may have a semblance of a team," said Sanders. He pointed up the possibility however that his university administration still might refuse the conference offer of amnesty and stick to the blanket ineligibility.

Dr. Kaplan also said he did not know what his administration might do.

The three-year probation was assessed Saturday because the school had permitted athletes to receive money in a manner not authorized by the conference. It was fined \$15,000 for failure to cooperate with the conference commissioner and deprived of its Rose Bowl receipts — about \$78,000 — for the next three years.

The University of Washington had drawn a two-year probation at an earlier meeting for illegal payment of athletes. It too had declared some athletes ineligible for accepting loans but there were only a few. The conference said these men will be eligible as soon as they have repaid the loans.

Dr. Kaplan did not provide a list of the athletes he declared ineligible. His action included all who participated in sports during the school year now ending.

This is the conference resolution in the UCLA ineligibility case: "Whereas the faculty athletic representative of the University of California at Los Angeles has at this session officially informed the conference that he has declared ineligible each member of the 1955 freshman and varsity football squads at UCLA for having received substantial financial aid not permitted by the conference athletic code."

"And whereas it is the opinion of the conference that permanent ineligibility in all sports is too harsh a penalty in this situation. (Dr. Kaplan later explained his action included all sports.)

Only Football Mentions  
"Now therefore be it resolved that each member of the 1955 freshman and varsity football squads — to be defined as including the name of each freshman and varsity football squad member who participated during the 1955 season — and so declared ineligible by the institution, be reinstated to eligibility subject to being charged with one year of varsity football participation in lieu of the penalty heretofore imposed by the institution."

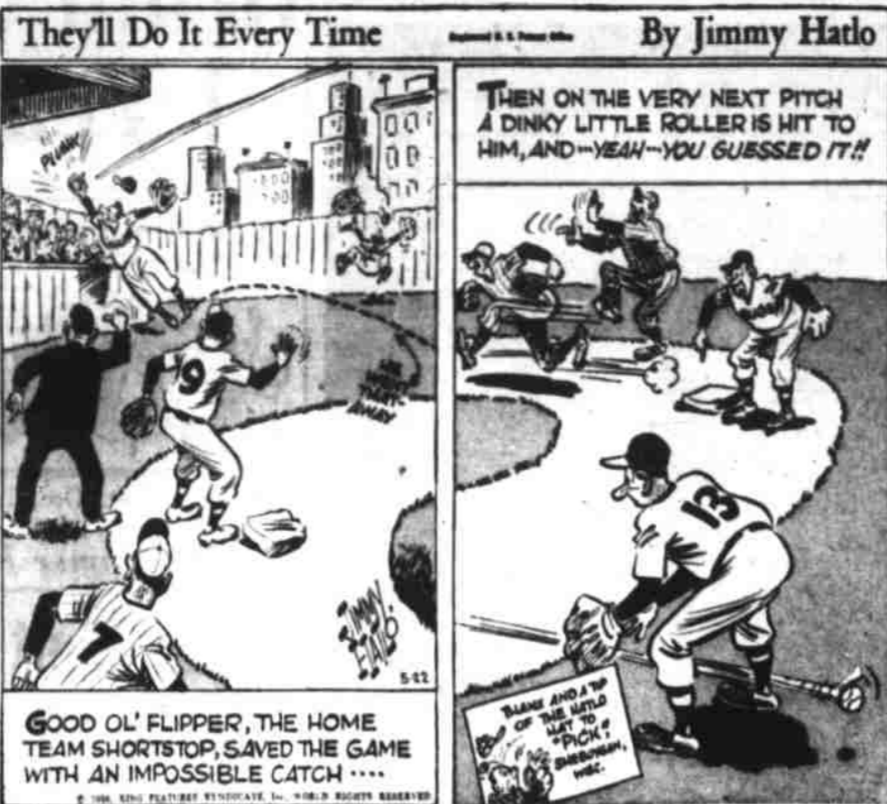
Provided however that the penalty herein provided shall not apply to any student who may show not to have received such prohibited financial aid by exhibiting to the commissioner the original records disclosing the names of those students who did receive such aid.

Innocence Questionable  
"And provided further that the commissioner be authorized on behalf of the conference to extend the benefits of this resolution to any other freshman or varsity football players, in addition to the squad members as above defined, who may be reported to him prior to Sept. 1, 1956, as having been declared ineligible by the institution."

Although the burden of proof rests with the athlete under the POC action, the conference did not make it clear how a player could establish his innocence.

Some observers reported the action was a stratagem to compel the Young Men's Club of Westwood and the Bruin Bench to "open their books" to show who had received improper financial aid.

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# Cureton Calls Ban 'Farce'

## UCLA Star Guard Also Blasts USC

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Hardman Cureton, who helped UCLA win three Pacific Coast Conference football championships, Monday termed the conference's ban on his alma mater a farce.

"There's not a school in the conference that does not subsidize above the code limit in one way or another," Cureton said.

Cureton said Bruin coach Red Sanders and his assistants should "spill the beans."

"I don't know why they should stand by and have our athletic program wrecked."

USC Draws Blast  
The Negro guard, who will play for Toronto in the Canadian professional league next season, also was critical of UCLA's cross-town rival, the University of Southern California.

"We get peanuts compared to what those guys at USC are getting," he said. "Southern California pays a football player anywhere from \$50 to \$150 in addition to the permitted \$75 a month. Then, there are automobiles and other rewards."

Cureton said he knows a Trojan wingback who gets his allotted \$75 in addition to \$150 a month.

"The Trojans also got his wife a job for \$300 a month," Cureton added.

Under a PCC ruling Monday in Canada, the entire last year UCLA varsity and freshman teams will lose a year's eligibility unless they can prove that they received no illegal financial aid.

# Arizona Topples TCU in Playoffs

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — Craig Sorenson clouted a two-run homer with two out in the ninth inning Monday night to give Arizona a 7-5 victory over Texas Christian University in the district six NCAA playoffs.

The two teams met again Tuesday night in the best of three series. The winner goes to the NCAA Little World Series at Omaha, Neb.

Third baseman Sorenson hit two home runs and drove in another two with two singles in five trips. TCU had tied the score with two out in the ninth. After an 4-1 advantage but Arizona went ahead 5-4 in the seventh.

Arizona catcher Jack Davis dropped Al Paschal's pop-up for what would have been the last out of the game in the top of the ninth. Paschal then singled, Charles Quint sent him to third with a single and Jim Shofner sent the tying run home with another single.

When Arizona came up, Lee Meyer singled with two out. Coach Dutch Meyer of TCU squawked when Meyer was called safe after stealing second. Sorenson, who had hit a 400-foot homer in the first, then hit another out of the park.

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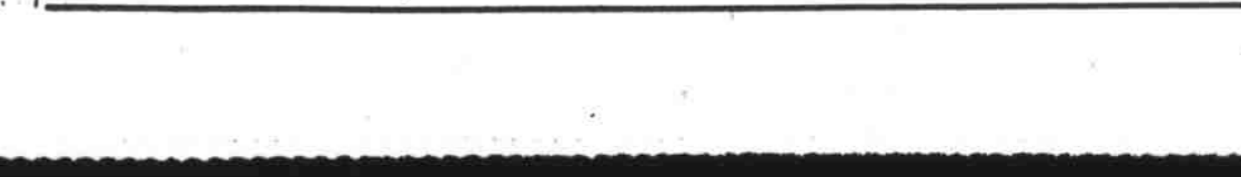
