Klang Wrecking Co. took permits to tear down two houses and a business building, former location of Hazer's Fur Shop, in the 1200 block of South Commercial Street for a clinic to be built by Physicians Building Corp. He said demolition of the houses at 1258 and 1234 S. Commercial St. and the workshop at 1260 S. Commercial St. would start today.

The new building for the drug store which is now at 1069 S. Commercial St. will feature the first drive-in window for prescriptions in Salem and off-street parking for 18 cars, George H. Swartsley, manager, said.

The Misses Miller took their degree in re-nursing work at Oregon State College, while Mrs. Loehden pursued studies at the University of Oregon.

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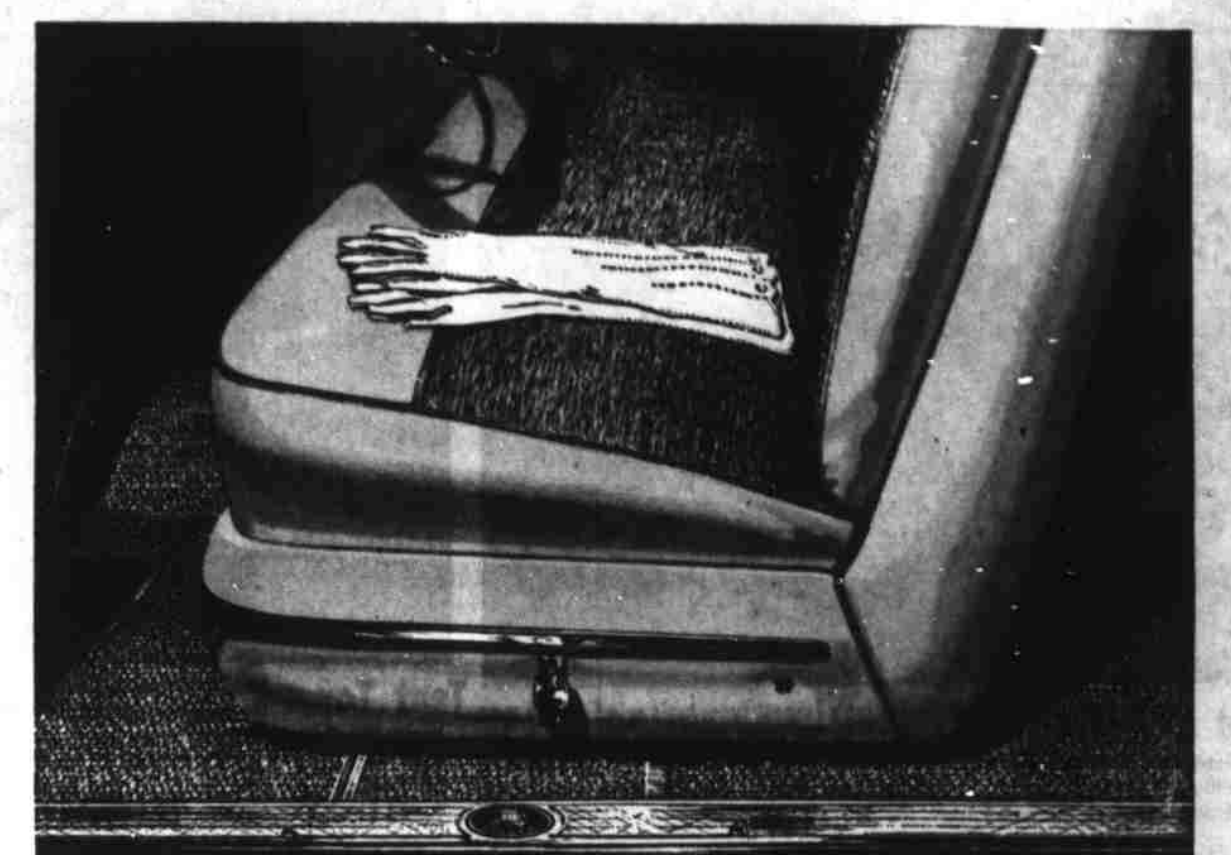
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
