Radio Spreads False Report Of H-Fallout

(Picture on Wirephoto Page) PALO ALTO, Calif. A-A fake broadcast over Standford Univer-sity's student radio station that fallout from the H-bomb blast was burning "hundreds of people in San Francisco" left an experimentminded newscaster with a lot of explaining to do Tuesday. Lloyd Downton, 25, said his false

rumors kept the station telephone ringing for three and a half hours after he inserted the following into an otherwise factual news broad-

"Hundreds of people in San Francisco are swarming to hospitals because of dark, smog-like clouds that are burning them and causing dark brown and black stains on their skin'

Downton, a graduate student in journalism who edits the weekly Belmont Courier - Bulletin, ex-plained that he is taking a course in social psychology.

Prepared Report One of his assignments, he said, was to study the ways rumors spread and how they are altered in the process. Knowing the Hbomb blast was coming Sunday, he prepared the fake news report

well in advance.
Originally, the fictitious victim city was to be Mexico City, he said, but at the last moment be decided to localize it by naming Piped Into Dorms

Although the station, KXSU, is a "carrier frequency" station that cannot normally be heard off the campus, its newscasts are piped into Stanford dormitories. Downton got quick results. To some callers be told the truth. Others had to find out for themselves. His estimate of the effect of the hoax was somewhat different from that of the station's student manager. Downton gave the impres-

telephone queries. Manager Terry Bateman, however, reported that the program brought only 15 calls. Bateman hurried to the station when he heard of Downton's stunt at 8:55 p.m. (PDT) Sunday, and broadcast a retraction an hour later. Bateman said he wasn't firing his newscaster, though, be-"I think I've got him straightened around now. University officials have declined

Although Equity sometimes per mits aliens to appear in productions in this country, particularly if they created a starring role in a show, Harding said the council "did not feel Haymes made a sufficient case to justify an exception" Haymes has not previously performed in the comedy

Haymes' request for membership was turned down decause only citizens may belong to Equity. He may be able to rejoin, Harding said, when he gains U.S. citizenship, expected in a few months

Klamath Falls **Canal Study** Wins Approval

WASHINGTON P - The Senate Monday passed a bill authorizing a \$5,000 study to determine the best means of eliminating the hazard of an open irrigation canal flowing through Klamath Falls.

In the 38 years since the canal's construction. 25 persons have drowned there.

The Senate Interior Committee, in sending the bill to the Senate said that "in view of the appalling loss of life over the years, attrib utable to the operations of the canal, no time should be lost in developing a workable plan for protective measures. The bill goes to the House.



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
