

Domestic, Export Wheat Needs Met

In spite of attempts to channel more wheat into export, there is still enough wheat, as the marketing year draws to a close June 30, to take care of all domestic and export needs for more than two full years. This is according to a report issued Monday by Ezra Benson, Secretary of Agriculture.

The carryover again will exceed a billion bushels, Benson said as he added that "while we are hopeful about holding down the carryover into 1957-58, wheat continues as one of the most serious problems in the whole farm economy."

Benson, at the same time, named the marketing quotas for the 1957 wheat crop. However, Benson's proclamation does not automatically put quotas into effect for the crop. A referendum vote has been set for July 20 when wheat growers affected by

the quotas will vote on whether the quotas should be put into operation. A two-thirds vote favoring the quotas is necessary if they are to be effective.

This is the fourth successive year that abnormally large wheat supplies have required the proclamation of marketing quotas for the next wheat crop. It is the third successive year for which the national acreage allotment has had to be set at 35 million acres, the minimum specified by law. Benson, in his report, objects a little to the "legal minimum."

"All the wheat we are likely to need for 1957 production, could be produced on an acreage of about 12.4 million acres. If it were not for the legal minimum, the national allotment could have dropped to that level," he stated in the Monday report.

The national agricultural secretary also took time out to bring in a plug for the administration's proposed Soil Bank.

"This situation (referring to the wheat) points up the need for the Soil Bank, which farmers can use to bring about additional adjustments in production without further reducing their incomes," he said.

In the same report, Marvin L. McLean, assistant secretary of agriculture, said that "until agricultural surpluses are put down to manageable levels no program will have an opportunity to work effectively." He expressed the opinion that the proposed soil bank program would help the "producer get his supplies more nearly in line with demand, thus improving his free market generally. It will help the middleman, because his welfare is tied up directly with the welfare of the producer, and it will help the consumer, because they have a big stake in adequate supplies at fair prices."

Report Clears U.W. Students Financially

SEATTLE (AP) — The University of Washington Monday cited a report from the State Auditor's office giving the Associated Students a "clean bill of health" in financial matters.

The disclosure followed findings Saturday by the Legislative Council's subcommittee on education, charging the University with poor management policies, particularly in the field of athletics. Both the ASUW and the administration were criticized.

Meredith Harris, chairman of the university's board of regents, then said the abuses referred to in the report had been corrected. The report disclosed Monday by the university was made by C. W. Yeakum, chief examiner, Division of Departmental Audits, and sent to State Auditor Cliff Yeller.

"In general, the ASUW is operated in a businesslike and efficient manner," Yeakum reported.

Farmers' Gas Tax Refund Deadline Set

PORTLAND — Farmers have until Oct. 1 to apply for refunds for the 2-cent federal tax on gasoline, diesel oil and special motor fuels used in farming, the Oregon Association of Public Accountants' tax information committee reminded farmers in this area.

Refunds cover the period from January 1 through next June 30. The necessity for complete records is cited as important.

The internal revenue service reports that refunds will total an estimated \$80,000,000 per year. This will average about \$12 annually for each of Oregon's farmers.

Refunds are restricted to gasoline and motor fuels used by a farmer or a person he hires for work on his own farm or for special jobs.

The committee said that farmers must apply for the refunds at district internal revenue offices.

There are four district offices on the U.S. aircraft carrier Saratoga.

Man Faces Drunk Counts

Harry Wampole Casebeer, 6580 Lake Labish Road, was charged Monday with driving while intoxicated shortly after a Marion County District Court appearance at which he pleaded innocent to another charge of being intoxicated on a public highway.

The 54-year-old laborer was arrested last Friday by state police in the vicinity of Hazel Green Road and Highway 99E. Both charges involve the same arrest. A trial is to be set on the intoxicated on a public highway charge, and Casebeer has been released on \$250 bail. No hearing has been had yet on the driving while intoxicated charge.

Greek Leader Pledges Aid to Cypriot Cause

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Evangelos Averoff, the new Greek foreign minister, proclaimed Monday his intention to work for the "satisfaction of the Cypriot struggle for freedom" and return of Archbishop Makarios from British exile.

Averoff, regarded here as anti-British, was named by Prime Minister Constantine Karamanlis to succeed Spyros Theodorakis, who had been assailed as having pro-British sentiments.

Averoff asserted that "with unflinching determination we will use all appropriate means for achieving satisfaction in the Cypriot struggle and... liberation of Archbishop Makarios."

He said he would continue the government's foreign policy which "coincides with the viewpoints of most political parties of Greece."

Makarios was removed in March from Cyprus to the Seychelles Islands in the Indian Ocean. The British accused him of fomenting rebel violence on Cyprus.

Primary Vote Campaign Costs Light

Campaign expenditures during the recent primary election generally were light, if first figures from the State Elections Bureau are any indication. Several candidates from Salem and Marion county were among those who kept expenses to relatively low figures.

The bureau said R. F. Cook, Silverton, spent \$317 in his unsuccessful campaign for nomination to Congress on the Republican ticket.

A committee supporting W. W. Chadwick, Salem, in his successful run for reelection as Republican state representative, listed an expenditure of \$151.28. Thomas C. Enright, Salem, successful Democratic candidate for Marion County district attorney, showed expenses of \$148.89.

Other figures included: David G. Cromwell, defeated Republican candidate for state representative, \$72.28; Guy Jonas, Salem, unopposed Democratic candidate for state representative, \$2.

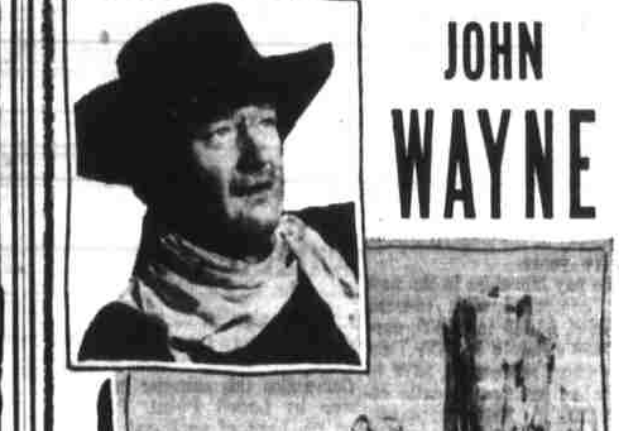
Railroad Bridge Plagues Family

Grazing Land Fencing Wins Court's Okeh

Fencing of a 1/4-mile section of grazing land bordering Highway 22 near Mehama was authorized Monday by county court members following complaints of Stayton, Mehama, and Lyons residents concerning the danger of cattle wandering onto the road.

The complaints were in the form of a petition that asserted a cattle guard which formerly kept the cattle confined had been relocated by county road crews leaving the 1/4 mile stretch exposed.

Fred A. Lindemann, Lyons, was one of the petitioners present in court. He emphasized that some 500 head of cattle owned by about 50 residents roamed the open range land in question. Residents requested that the cattle guard either be replaced or the gap fenced, Lindemann said.

County Engineer John Anderson said a fence would be installed as soon as possible.

Crash Kills Eugene Man
