## Gunman Kills Deputy, Blind Man's Helper

TOLEDO, Ohio (AP)—A gunman climaxed a wild chase Tuesday by killing a deputy sheriff. Speeding away again, he struck and killed a young woman leading a blind man. Then he was captured.

The blind man was injured. Deputy Sheriff Ray Westover, 35, father of three children, was fatally shot by one of the men he had halted because of an alert from State Highway patrolman Robert Newell. The state policeman had chased their car for speeding.

Police identified the gunman as John Bowen, 35, of Brooklyn, N.Y., and said that after shooting Westover in Newell's presence he broke away and continued the flight.

As Bowen swerved to avoid a final roadblock in front of St. Charles Hospital, his car struck and killed Ann Marie Martin, 19, an X-ray student at the hospital.

She had been leading Jay Francis, 31, across the street. Blind, he also is an hospital employee. He was reported in fair condition.

Newell, who stayed behind at the shooting scene, brought the other two men into police headquarters, where they were identified as Walter Bryant, 32, of New York City, and Phillip Powell, 24, of Philadelphia. Detectives said they admitted their car had been stolen in New York.

Bowen, still armed, came out of the car at the final roadblock and was disarmed by two patrolmen.

They quoted him as saying, "I could have splattered you all over the place, but I already killed one man and I thought I had enough."

## \$175,000 Deal Involves Farm, Court Trade

A \$175,000 transaction involving the trade of a 7-unit residential court in Salem for a 434-acre farm 10 miles north on the Wallace Road was disclosed Tuesday.

The farm, owned by Bonnie and Wade Jones and valued at around \$250,000, was acquired by George Barza, 503 Judds St., Salem, who traded his Bellevue Street Court just south of Willamette University as part payment. The court is valued at approximately \$50,000.

Barza is to have a manager operate the farm and the Joneses will move to Salem, Chet Nelson of Nelson & Nelson Realtors, who handled the negotiations, said Tuesday. Representing both parties in the legal work involved was De-Ann and Sherman, attorneys.

The 434-acre place formerly was known as the Lane Bros. Ranch. The Jones have owned it the last year. It has been largely in hay.

## Mrs. Walker, 65, Succumbs

Mrs. May Belle Walker, former Salem resident, died Tuesday in a Portland hospital at the age of 65. She had been ill for several years.

Mrs. Walker lived in Salem for about a year with a brother, Ernest L. Frederickson. She moved to Pendleton about eight years ago, where she lived until returning to the Portland hospital.

She was born Aug. 3, 1890, at Kendrick, Idaho.

Besides her brother in Salem, she leaves a son, Warren Walker, Winchester, Idaho, and two other brothers, Frank Frederickson, Hermiston, and George Frederickson, Pullman, Wash.

Arrangements are pending at W. T. Rigdon Mortuary.

## Firebreak to Be Cut in Bull Run Watershed Area

PORTLAND (AP)—A 15-mile-long road and firebreak is to be cut through the Bull Run watershed on the west slope of Mt. Hood. James Langdon, district forest ranger, announced Tuesday.

The project is to protect the area source of Portland's water supply, from fire. Langdon said it might take five years to complete the project.

## 4 Azerbaijan Leaders Slain As Beria Aides

MOSCOW (AP)—Mir Dzhafar Bagirov, former premier of Azerbaijan, has been executed with three other former officials of that Soviet republic.

They were convicted as traitors and accomplices of the former Soviet police boss Lavrenty Beria, executed as a traitor in 1953.

They were convicted also of counter-revolutionary activity, use of improper police methods, intrigue against faithful Communists and loyal Soviet citizens, and of employing security organs against the state.

The trials, convictions and executions were disclosed in a Baku newspaper, The Worker, which reached Moscow Tuesday. Baku is the capital of Soviet Azerbaijan and the center of an important oil producing region.

The execution of Bagirov may mean trials for other Beria henchmen in the Republics of Armenia and Georgia.

## 1,900 More Acres Flooded On Kootenai

BONNERS FERRY, Idaho (AP)—The flooding Kootenai River claimed another 1,900 acres of farmland Tuesday with half the heavy mountain snowpack still to melt and join the torrent.

Army infantrymen, engineers and civilian volunteers abandoned efforts to save dirt dikes around 950 acres in the Nystrom District near the Canadian border Tuesday morning. Tuesday afternoon, they gave up on the 930 acres in diking District No. 9.

The river stood at 35.4 feet late Tuesday and the forecast called for a level of 36 by Friday.

Troops working in near 90-degree heat surrendered to the Kootenai downstream at Nystrom when water started to lap over the top of dikes.

The hot weather was melting more snow and adding to the menace to the town of 2,000 persons. The only water in town, however, has been from seepage through 37-foot dikes.

## Negroes Vote Bus Boycott in Florida City

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—More than 200 Negroes voted Tuesday night to boycott city buses until consideration is given a three-point request including the hiring of Negro drivers.

The Negroes, including civic leaders, teachers, ministers and representatives of the Florida A. & M. University student body, made the decision at a meeting from which reporters were barred.

It was learned they are asking that Negro bus drivers be employed "at some time in the future" on predominantly Negro routes, that passengers be seated on a first come, first served basis on predominantly Negro routes and that white drivers "be more courteous and stop intimidating Negro passengers."

Plans were made for a car pool to supply transportation to Negroes who ordinarily ride the buses.

## Road Board Accused in \$42,987 Suit

A \$42,987 civil suit against the state was begun Tuesday by the construction firm of Morrison and Lamping.

Filing the complaint are James W. Morrison and Leonard L. Lamping against the state highway commission, and is based on a 5-mile road construction job in Wallawa County.

The plaintiffs allege that the road project cost them \$42,987 more than they bid for the job, allegedly because the state did not provide adequate right-of-way for the work. The complaint states the right-of-way was impeded by flooding brought about by some drainage work by residents of the area. This should have been prevented or compensated for by the state, the complaint asserts.

Because of "conditions of an unusual nature," the complaint avers, the state should be held responsible for the company's increased costs.

## Tests Offer Sagebrush Land Hope

PORTLAND (AP)—Tests at the Squaw Butte Experiment Station in Southeastern Oregon offer hope for reclaiming of sagebrush land. Douglas McKay told the Pacific Seaboard's Assn. Tuesday.

McKay, GOP nominee for U.S. senator, said that aerial spraying of 4,000 acres of sagebrush resulted in 99 per cent of the sage being killed.

## Water Pipe Relocation Costs Argued

The question of whether Marion County can include the cost of relocating water pipes in its assessments of residents for street improvements was raised Tuesday when representatives of two suburban water districts visited county court.

Involved is the cost of relocating water mains and service connections along Vista and Peace streets south of Salem, both of which are being improved by county road crews following a petition by residents for the work.

Because the road improvements necessitate moving the existing water pipes some concern was voiced over who would pay for the relocation.

Opinion Sought  
William Troth, representing the Vista Heights Water District, and Don Gardner of Salem Heights Water District, were present to get the court's opinion on the matter.

Troth suggested that only residents directly affected by the improvements should pay for relocating the water system. He believed that the costs should be included in the county's assessments for the road improvements.

Approval Given  
However, County Judge Rex Hartley pointed out that before the road improvements were authorized the water district directors had given their approval that any costs for moving district-owned pipes would be financed by the district. Hartley also commented that as water districts are public utilities it would be unfair to other such organizations if the pipe moving costs were paid for through county assessments.

Hartley implied that it would be up to the individual districts to determine, possibly by vote, whether individual members of the district as a whole should be made to bear the cost.

## Governor 'Stolen'

It looks like Gov. Elmo Smith will have to sign two proclamations for the price of one. Joseph V. Tompkins, commercial photographer, said Tuesday night.

Tompkins, 3680 Hulseley Ave., reported to police that approximately eight film holders containing exposed film were stolen from his station wagon parked in the 100 block South High Street Tuesday afternoon.

Loss of the holders does not bother him so much, but several of the pictures were of the governor signing a proclamation. Tompkins said.
