Loan Official Predicts Many New Homes

New housing starts in the United States this year will probably range between 1.1 and 1.2 million units, a Washington official said here Tuesday during closing sessions of the three-day northwest conference Savings and Loan Associations.

Chairman Walter W. McAllister of the Federal Home Loan Bank Board told the approximately 100 savings and loan executives at the Senator Hotel that adequate mortgage money will be available for the new homes.

In his talk, McAllister pointed out that America's economy, in terms of available labor, material and funds, could not sustain a building program this year in excess of 1,200,000 housing units.

Referring to the outlook for savings and loan business, the speaker said he expects associations' assets, lending, new savings, reserves and surplus to continue their upward trend, but possible not at the same rate of growth as in the past several years.

Delegates voted to hold next year's convention at Great Falls. The conference opened Sunday.

Ruling Clears Real Estate Broker Law

Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton ruled here Tuesday that a "regular employee" of a real estate development firm is not required to be licensed as a real estate broker under the Oregon real estate law.

Thornton noted that the real estate law is not applicable to "regular employees of a corporation performing acts with reference to property owned by the corporation where such acts are performed in the regular course of the management of an investment in the corporate property."
