Salem's Kent Meyers deserves a big hand for his performance in the Rose City Amateur during the past week. Somehow sent a great effort escaped the papers almost entirely. Ken Doughty of Columbia Edgewater Country Club won the Portland classic not by much. He had to dump Portland's Tab Boyer in a sudden death playoff to gain the trophy. Meyers led the Salem entries with a score of 214 for the 54 holes. The two winners who finished in front of Meyers shot scores of 212 each, only two better, to keep Kent from gaining a tie for his first title. The Albany school teacher had consistent rounds of 73, 70, 71. Meyers may be teaching in Albany but we will still claim him as he still resides in Salem.

The Oregon Ducks came through as expected and won the Northern Division title at Corvallis last weekend. But the scores shot by the college boys looked more like those of a junior golf tourney. Ray Lindquist of Oregon State was medalist with a 36-hole total of 150. Ray will be remembered as the slim young man who played in the Elks tourney last year with OSC's Jerry Cloninger.

I don't know what they could do at the Corvallis pasture to make it that tough but most of the boys had trouble breaking 80. Bob Prall of the Ducks shot 158, which is about ten over his season average. Jerry Plank of Woodburn played for the Orange and turned in 160. Plank has come a long way for the lad who hails from the sand greens of the Woodburn course. By the way, we heard the other day that Woodburn plans soon to convert to grass greens. With the new air base going in next door to the course, the Woodburn layout should have no trouble keeping the course full.

Bobby Burns of the Riverwood golf club should pick up a few extra players also. Bob reports that his course is in top shape now. Lots of work has been done on the greens and the club house has been renovated to handle larger crowds. Riverwood is only a half hour's drive from downtown Salem and affords some real pleasure for people in the McMinnville area.

Two weeks ago we expressed that no one had made a hole-in-one in Salem for some time—so what happens? Clay Dyer went out and shot one, his first in a long golfing career. The Dyers were with Tom and Ruth Hill when the ace came.

Dyer wasn't the only Salem shooter to score an ace last week. Roy Maltby journeyed to Tacoma for the weekend and came away with his first hole-in-one. Roy was playing the Alamo course with some relatives when he holed an 8 iron on the 123-yard third hole. He brought home press clippings to prove his feat.

Dyer and Maltby are in line for some nice rewards for their golfing prowess. The prize list varies from time to time but they might get anything from a case of Wheaties to a case of ginger ale for their aces. An unidentified young man came into my shop one day last week about 7:30 a.m. and laid a score card in front of my nose with a hole-in-one on the 12th. He had just done the worst thing that can happen to a golfer—make an ace while playing by himself.

It looks like Texas has another great in young Don January. He proved his determination and ability when he holed a shot out of a trap on the 72nd hole to beat Dow Flinstewald and Doug Ford at Dallas to win the \$30,000 Colonial Open Sunday. January punctuated his round with three eagles. I've never heard anything to top that. Flinstewald must wonder what it takes to win these days. He shot rounds of 66, 67, 66 and 69 and finished only second.

PORTLAND—(Special)—Holiday horse racing programs at Portland Meadows have been set for Wednesday and Saturday this week with 10 races in each card. Post times will be 1 p.m.
The Memorial Day Handicap is set for Wednesday and is expected to lure the best distance runners on the grounds. The handicap will be at a distance of 1 1/16 miles.
Saturday's feature will be the Oregon Breeders' Championship at a flat mile, for 3-year-olds and up, bred in Oregon.
Scottie D, winner of the Multnomah Handicap and the Invitational Handicap here this season, will be among the favorites Wednesday.
Portland Meadows will be dark Thursday, but another night card is set for Friday, with post time at 6 o'clock.

Al Simmons' Services Held

Great Ball Hitter
Paid Final Respects

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Al Simmons returned in death Tuesday to the parish church he attended as a boy, before he set out on the baseball career that touched three decades and left him enshrined in the game's Hall of Fame.
Simmons, who died of a heart attack Saturday as he was about to enter the Milwaukee Athletic Club where he lived, was buried from St. Hyacinth's Roman Catholic Church on Milwaukee's south side.
It was the same church, and the same neighborhood where young Anastos Szymanski started with sandlot baseball 40 years ago.
Floral tributes to Simmons, the all-time great hitter with a 21-year major league batting average of .334, came from all over the country, as did veteran baseball figures like Tom Yawkey and Joe Cronin of the Red Sox, Jimmy Dykes and Mickey Cochrane, who played with Simmons for most of the nine great years on Connie Mack's old Athletics.
After a requiem high mass sung by the Rev. Raymond Kurkiewicz, Simmons' body was taken to St. Adalbert's Cemetery for burial.

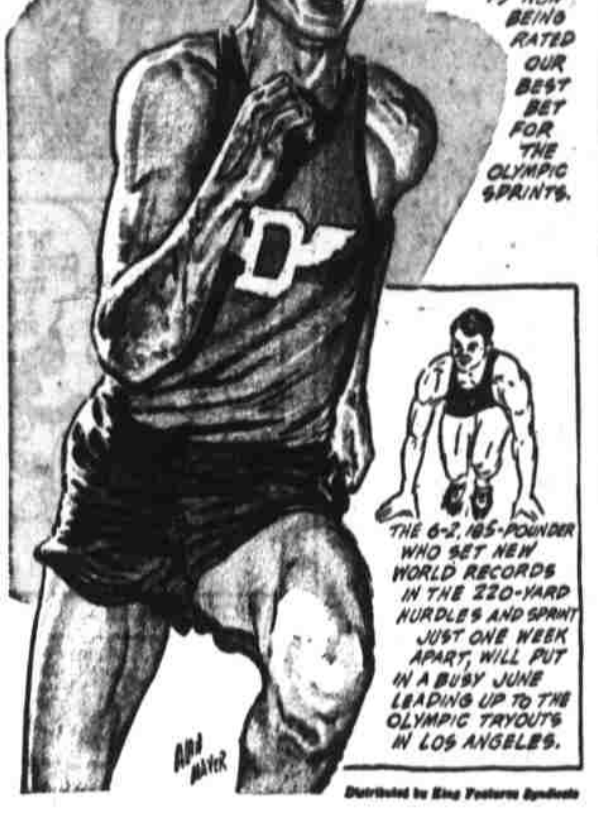

Suit Filed to Prevent Sale of Vancouver's Club to Hall

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP)—A suit was filed Tuesday to prevent sale of the Vancouver Coast League baseball club to Coley Hall, Vancouver businessman, for \$60,000.
The suit was filed in Superior Court in behalf of Ethel C. and A. Robert Miller, who said they owned 38 per cent of the stock in the Oakland Assn., former operator of the Oakland Club which was transferred to Vancouver.
It named as defendants C. L. Bricks, Laus, president of the Oakland Assn., and directors Edward Downer Jr. and Joe Blumenthal, the theater man.
The plaintiffs charged that, over their objections, the Board of Directors on May 24 voted to grant an option to Hall to purchase the entire assets of the Oakland Assn. for \$60,000.
This, the suit charged, was "not fair and reasonable price and not a fair market value of the corporation's assets."
The suit also declared the corporation's property was being misapplied by officers and directors and "the two factions of stock holders are so deadlocked that this business can no longer be properly operated."
The Millers said no dividends have been voted for 10 years "although assets were available."
The petition also asked that the corporation which operated the Oakland ball club before it was moved to Vancouver be dissolved.
Miller and Victor Devencenzi purchased the Oakland Assn. from the late Al Ewing in 1929, Miller becoming president. He and Devencenzi operated the Oaks for several years, and then Miller turned the club over to Devencenzi.
Devencenzi sold a majority interest in 1945 to Laus and Blumenthal for \$75,000.
The club reportedly made a gross profit of \$200,000 before taxes in 1946. In recent years falling attendance kept the organization in the red.
Laus was contacted last year by Hall and persuaded to move the team to Vancouver, which Laus did with Miller's approval.

Time trials for the card will get under way at 7:45 p.m., with trophy dashes, heat romps and main events to follow.
Dick Page, winner of the last hard tops mainer here on May 5 will lead the entry field for the Saturday meet. He beat Palmer Crowell in a close one here earlier. Crowell losing out on the final lap when he suffered a spinout.
Valley Sports promoter Ron All expects to have the full list of entries registered in the next day or two.

Little 'Indy' Rolls Today

PORTLAND—(Special)—Indianapolis-type racing cars, most of them equipped with Offenhauser engines, take to the Portland Speedway Wednesday for the annual Memorial Day "Little Indianapolis" race. Time trials start at 1:30 p.m., races at 2:30. Between 20 and 24 cars, from Oregon, Washington, California and Canada are entered.
Ernie Koch, who won the April 1 opener in this species of racing here, leads the field. Others include Vern Chamberlain of Minneapolis, who holds the mile dirt record at Portland Meadows; Ray Horst of San Francisco; Bill Hyde, Chuck Tombs and Lou Tolsted of Portland; Bud Beaver, Cliff Spaulding, Dave Cooper and veteran Del Fanning of Seattle.
The card will be capped by a 50-lap main event.

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—The 40th 500-mile Memorial Day auto race will be held at the Portland Meadows track on Wednesday.
Track—2 1/2 miles, all new rock asphalt except 8 mile of brick straightaway.
The plant—433 acres, with permanent grandstands and temporary bleachers seating about 60,000. Additional thousands watch from infield on general admission tickets.
The field—33 specially built race cars, all powered by four-cylinder Offenhauser engines except a V-8 Novi driven by Paul Russo.
The record—130.84 miles an hour, Bill Vukovich, 1954.
Pole car—Pat Flaherty, Chicago, who set 16-mile qualifying record of 145.506 miles an hour.
The purse—About \$250,000, determined by gate and cars' eligibility for special awards.
Mortality—46 persons have died at the Speedway including pre-1900 races of 1909 and 1910. Total includes 25 drivers, 14 mechanics, 6 spectators and 1 workman.
