Stocks Score Biggest Jump In 17 Years

NEW YORK (AP) — The Stock Market in its tremendous advance Tuesday scored its widest gain in 17 years.

The lunge ahead snapped off a three-week reaction that had started when the market was near record high levels. Wide gains in prices were ascribed by brokers to buyers anxious to add to their holdings at the unusually low prices brought on by the sharp reaction. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up \$3.30 to \$178.50, greatest gain since Sept. 5, 1939. That was when Hitler was marching through Poland at the outset of World War II.

Gauged against the average, the quoted value of securities listed on the New York Stock Exchange gained an estimated four billion dollars. During the reaction, an estimated 18 billion dollars was lost from the quoted value. There were 2,430,000 shares traded as against 2,780 shares Monday when the market was lower.
