WASHINGTON (U) — Navy scientists announced Monday they have picked up radio waves from Venus, indicating that the nearest planet is much too warm for life as earthlings understand it.

'For Burning' Cast Warms Chilled Pentacle Audience

The two Smith brothers, reliable as always, Bill as the incisive, non-blowing mayor, (a type character in which he always excels) and Dick as the not-too-desirable elder son of Barbara Rhule, character actors who's played many parts on the Willamette stage.

Funds Sought For Buildings At Fairview

Hoping to go ahead with construction of three new buildings at Fairview Home, the State Board of Control decided Monday to ask the Emergency Board for the additional \$22,000 needed for the combined project.

When bids turned out higher than estimated last week, there was some talk of going ahead with only two buildings. Viesko and Post was low bidder at \$94,000, but to this the state would have to add about \$100,000 in furnishings and architect's fees.

By putting off some of the furnishing work and by using some capital outlay funds in addition to the \$939,000 legislative appropriation, the state officials were figuring Monday, a start on all three buildings could be possible if the emergency grant of \$22,000 is made.

The proposed building program at Fairview calls for a bed patient building, administration building and multi-purpose building.

The Emergency Board will convene here today to take final action on the \$14 million state hospital site near Willamette. An afternoon session at the Capitol will follow inspection of the site.

which can now be seen as the bright evening star in the sky.

Dr. John D. Kraus, director of Ohio State University's radio observatory received strong radio signals from the planet.

He said the signals were observed on each occasion for a period of several hours. The distinct signals, Dr. Kraus said, consisted of crackling sounds somewhat similar to radio static from thunderstorms on earth.

Navy scientists Cornell H. Mayer, Russell M. Sloanaker and Timothy P. McCullough told reporters the radio waves were received on a radio telescope equipped with a meter which is ultrasensitive to very low power radio emissions.

Over Belling Mark
The scientists said that their readings, which can be heard as a faint hissing, show that the temperature in the cloud bank surrounding Venus is about 220 degrees Fahrenheit, eight degrees more than the boiling point of water at sea level. They expressed belief that the temperature on the planet's surface must be even higher.

The Navy laboratory has been getting radio readings from Venus since the first week in May and expects the waves to come in even stronger about June 22, when Venus will be only 37 million miles from earth.

Other Planets Silent
The 50-foot radio telescope at the Naval research laboratory is specially designed with equipment to receive radio frequencies up to three centimeters, or 1 1/4 inches.

The Navy scientists said they have yet to pick up radio waves from other planets, although this will be attempted.

They explained that it was the heat around Venus that set up the radio emissions.

City Council Okehs Budget For Silverton

SILVERTON — The Silverton City Council Monday night recommended adoption of a \$282,610 budget as presented by the budget committee. If no objections are heard at a July 2 hearing, the budget will be accepted.

The budget shows an increase of 4 mills above last year's with the jump providing for new transmission lines for the City Water Department and a five per cent rise across the board in city salaries.

The new budget lists total expenditures of \$239,800 and \$31,712 as reserve fund. A total tax levy of \$23,872 is needed, of which \$18,272 is inside the six per cent limitation. The \$7,200 outside the limitation has been provided by special levies in past years.

The salary increase will be the first in four years for Silverton municipal employees. Allen Reber is chairman of the budget committee and C. H. Dickerson serves as secretary.

Rose Festival Events Begin

PORTLAND (U) — Preliminary events of the 48th annual Portland Rose Festival began Monday with the appearance of the eight princesses at a Chamber of Commerce luncheon.

Highlights of the festival include the queen selection and coronation Wednesday night at Multnomah Stadium, with one of the eight princesses to be named to rule over the week-long celebration. Rehearsal for the queen selection is to be held Tuesday.

On Saturday the floral parade, with colorful floats from all over the West, will attract thousands of spectators. The parade theme will be "Disneyland in Flowers."

Body of Canada Solon Near Slaying Scene

ERSKINE, Alta. (U) — Police Monday found the body of John E. Clark, a member of the Alberta legislature on whose farm seven persons were slain Sunday.

The body was found lying face down in a mudhole with a bullet hole in the head.

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police at Edmonton said police are satisfied the case is one of multiple murder and suicide.

Clark had been sought for questioning in the rifle slayings of his wife and their four children and two men. All seven were found with a .22-caliber bullet in the head.

Police said Clark's body was found about 600 yards from the faded yellow farmhouse. He was dressed in night clothes. A single-shot .22 rifle was found at his feet.

The 41-year-old lawmaker had represented the Stettler district in the provincial legislature since 1952.

Those killed around breakfast time were Mrs. Margaret Clark, 36, her four children—Jenena, 8, Ross, 7, Ann, 5, and Linda, 4—George Anderson, 20, a hired man on the farm, and William Olah, 30, of Medicine Hat, a Royal Canadian Navy sailor visiting the Clark home.

A former school teacher, Clark was known for his interest in aiding delinquent youths. He recently had two working on probation on his farm in an attempt to rehabilitate them.

His father-in-law, George W. Dinwoodie of Vancouver, B. C., said Clark suffered a nervous breakdown in 1954 and was in a hospital for about 1 1/2 months.

He again suffered a minor breakdown while delivering a speech during this year's session of the legislature.

Shock Fatal to Electrician

KLAMATH FALLS (U) — An electrical contractor died Monday when a gust of wind caught a guy wire and brushed it against a 4,000-volt high tension line. An assistant going to the victim's aid was injured critically.

David Kenneth Light, 36, was killed. He had tossed a guy wire for an electric sign he was installing at a new garage on Highway 97 about 2 1/2 miles north of here.

The wind blew the wire against the power line.

Light was holding on to an iron post at the time, and the current grounded through his body to the post.

Duane Lee Wanser, 19, suffered severe burns in trying to pull Light free. Wanser was brought here to a hospital, unconscious.

Rites Held Monday For Longtime Doctor

GRANTS PASS (U) — Dr. Charles Herbert Atwood, former Eugene physician, was buried here Monday. He died Saturday at the age of 75.

Dr. Atwood practiced medicine in Eugene for 50 years before moving here two years ago.

State Met Condemnation Follows Federal Pattern

The trial program of state meat inspection has resulted in condemnation of about the same proportion of meat animals as is condemned in federal inspection.

This was the report Monday upon completion of the first round of slaughterhouse inspection over the state, as started last September under a pilot program appropriation from the 1955 Legislature.

Dr. Rolla Sexauer, assistant state veterinarian, said Monday that less than one-half of one per cent of animals was condemned after the inspection by state department of agriculture crews.

"This percentage is in line with federal condemnations," said the veterinarian.

The inspection crews now have covered the entire state, and have started a second run of inspections. They spend about two weeks in each area.

In the first round, 24,611 animals were inspected before and after slaughter, and 63 were condemned. Also condemned were 3,406 parts of animals and 16,248 pounds of meat products.

The results will be submitted to the 1957 legislature, which will decide whether state inspection is needed.

Possible Shift Here Eyed By UAL Chiefs

Tentative plans for transferring Portland International Airport airline operations to McNary Field in case of flood emergency were made in a meeting Monday in Portland, Harold F. Sweeney, Salem manager for United Air Lines, said.

Persons attending the meeting were hopeful, however, that the move will not be necessary as flood protection at the Portland field has been strengthened since the 1948 flood, he added.

Airline operations were moved to Salem in the flood of eight years ago, but a similar transfer now would bring at least three times the activity of the 1948 transfer, Sweeney estimated.

Flying Trips To Reward Four Pupils

Four fourth graders from Garfield School will be rewarded today with airplane rides for being "good citizens."

The four, Melvin Holmes, Celia Steinbock, Linda Turney and Helen Ball, were selected by the vote of their classmates as the "best citizens" in the class.

Cause of Fatal Fire Remains Undetermined

Origin of a bedroom fire which Sunday cost the life of 17-year-old Dennis Leroy Pryzbilla remained a mystery Monday.

However Fire Marshal Glenn Shebeck said a short circuit in an electric blanket or a cigarette were possible causes.

Young Pryzbilla, recent graduate of Sacred Heart Academy, died from suffocation when flames broke out in a bedroom at the family home at 1970 N. Church St. He was alone in the house at time of the 5:30 a.m. fire.

An electric blanket reportedly was on the youth's bed at time of the tragedy, Shebeck said. The cigarette possibility was not ruled out, though the victim was known as an infrequent smoker.

Study of the fire indicated Dennis' first thought may have been safety of his two small sisters when he dashed into an adjoining bedroom, only to die on a corner bed in thick smoke and heat.

The sisters, Jacqueline Jo, 8, and Robin Sedonia, 7, normally occupants of the other room, spent the night with friends but the youth might have forgotten that in his confusion.

The victim's mother, Mrs. Coranell Pryzbilla, was in North Bend at time of the tragedy. Firemen estimated fire damage to the upstairs of the home at about \$2,000.

Bloodmobile Due Thursday

The Salem Junior Chamber of Commerce committee in charge of the Red Cross blood drawing Thursday in Salem is boosting for 50 pints of Jaycee blood to insure meeting Marion County's 150-pint quota for the month.

The quota has not been met for several months and county hospitals have been drawing soldiers' blood from Ft. Lewis, Wash., to meet their needs, according to Lawrence Feldschau, chairman of the Jaycee committee.

The bloodmobile will be at Salem Armory from noon to 4 p.m. Thursday.

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Vet of State's 'Horseless' Carriage Division Retires

A woman who began pushing a pencil and pounding a typewriter in the State's Motor Vehicle Division in 1911 under Secretary of State Ben Olcott retires this week after long service with the state.

Mrs. Lorilla Yantis, 285 S. 21st St., who can remember the vehicle department when it contained a crew of five women and a scattering of "horseless carriage" registrations, will be honored today at a retirement party in the Secretary of State's office.

Mrs. Yantis will be honored by some 300 friends and fellow workers and will receive a gift of remembrance from Secretary of State Earl Newberry.

The retiring Mrs. Yantis has seen 23 years actual service with the state. She left in 1911 to get married but returned to the payroll in 1933 after the death of her husband, James C. Yantis. For the past 15 years she has worked under Auditor Donald Neave in the Secretary of State's Department.

In addition to Olcott and Newberry, the veteran employee has worked under Secretaries of State Sam Kozar, Hal E. Hoss, P. J. Stadelman, Earl Snell and Robert S. Farrel Jr.

In bridging the gap of almost 45 years in the motor vehicle division, Mrs. Yantis can remember when it cost as low as \$3 for an auto license. She can recall, too, when driving licenses were not required—not until a new law was put into the books in 1920. Inaugural driving license fee was 25 cents.

But in her recollections, Mrs. Yantis is especially cognizant of one fact—the fantastic growth in numbers of motor vehicles. Memory compares the handful of car registrations of 1911 with the hundreds of thousands of registrations today.

Nations Solve Saar Problem

LUXEMBOURG (U) — French and West German leaders reached agreement on the Saar problem early Monday after an unexpected "last-minute" battle over some disputed coal mines.

German foreign minister Heinrich Von Brentano announced a "happy end" to the talks when he left the French embassy here Monday morning.

The talks broke up in disagreement Sunday night, only two hours after West German chancellor Konrad Adenauer said "everything has been settled."

The talks were resumed after a brief rest from Von Brentano and West Germany's ambassador to Paris, Baron Voltrath Von Maltzahn, went to the French embassy to confer with French Premier Guy Mollet and foreign minister Christian Pineau.
