Farnes, a radio and Hi-Fi dealer in Salem, had 563 and Mrs. Laue, a Salem housewife, had 532. They will join Guy Jonas, Salem insurance man, who was the only candidate on the Democratic ballot.

Nearest competitor among the Republican candidates for the legislature was Herbert Barker, Salem labor leader, who ran last in a field of seven candidates for the four positions. He had 80 Democratic write-in votes. R. L. Elstrom, W. W. Chadwick, Eddie Ahrens and Winton Hunt all of whom won GOP nomination had 19, 17, 23 and 11 Democratic votes respectively.

Double Nomination Clerk Mattson was one of the double nomination candidates in seeking reelection. He had 99 votes on the Democratic totals. Surveyor A. D. Graham had 63, Treasurer Sam Butler had 49 and Coroner Lester Howell had 143. Democrats had no candidates for those positions.

President Eisenhower ran third in the write-in tally for president on the Democratic ballot where no candidates' names appeared. He had 210 votes, far behind Adlai Stevenson and Estes Kefauver who engaged in an active campaign for votes. Averill Harriman picked up 69 votes for president and Lyndon Johnson 12.

Valley Towns Vote School Consolidation

ALBANY—Voters of Shedd, Halsey and Brownville areas Wednesday voted overwhelmingly in favor of a consolidated school district. The margin was 216 to 152.

The new district officially begins operations on July 1st, with the Brownville board temporarily handling its affairs. A site for a district high school and a bond issue for its construction will be decided at a future election.

Plans call for the school to be situated at a neutral point. Matters relating to grade schools will be considered later.

In the Wednesday special election, Brownville voters favored the consolidation 238 to 21; Halsey approved by a 154 to 49 margin and Shedd approved 126 to 82.
