

Ex-Sen. Cain, President Confer On 'Abuses' of Loyalty Program

WASHINGTON (AP) — Harry P. Cain had a long talk with President Eisenhower Thursday about Cain's feeling that the loyalty security program has been unfair, and reported afterward he felt much better.

Cain, a member of the Subversive Activities Control Board, told reporters: "I derived more satisfaction and felt more hopeful about the future in this extraordinary field of internal security than I ever have before in all my life put together."

Lion-Mauled Youth Dies

LONDON (AP) — Tony Murphy, the 10-year-old London boy who was mauled by a lion at Whipsnade zoo a week ago, died Thursday night at Luton hospital.

Both his arms had been amputated after fearful injuries inflicted by the lion.

Tony visited the zoo with a group of Cub Scouts. The most disconcerting part as he died was a scoutmaster-priest, Father Donald Aylward, who was in charge of the group on an outing.

Father Aylward ran to the boy's aid, beat the lion on the head with an iron bar, and managed to drag Tony away from the cage.

Indonesia Ready To Cut Embargo To Red Chinese

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — The Indonesian cabinet has decided to abandon the U.N. embargo on rubber shipments to Red China, a reliable source said Wednesday.

The source said the decision was made at a cabinet meeting last night but announcement of the action was being delayed in the interests of "good timing."

Foreign ministry officials said they did not know of such a general decision. They admitted the cabinet had discussed the British announcement that Singapore and Malaya are resuming the sale of rubber to the Chinese Reds.

Hollywoodites Often Forget Their Roots

HOLLYWOOD — STARR REPORT: One of the great hypocrisies of our time is the unfortunate veneer of snobbery which overlays Hollywood. Nor is Hollywood alone in this snobbery; for the veneer is even thicker and shinier in New York.

It is a conceit of many show business people that the sun rises and sets in these two warring places and that the area lying between them, variously known as the sticks, the hinterlands or Rubentown, is to be avoided at all costs.

Unless, of course a commodity known as money can be withdrawn therefrom.

The odd thing about this ingrained provincial attitude is that the vast majority of Hollywood's citizens were born and brought up in Altoona, Pa., or Omaha, Neb., or East Cupcake, Ill. The native Hollywoodite is an extremely rare animal. The only one of any stature I can think of offhand is Shirley Temple, and she was born in Santa Monica, 20 miles west of Hollywood and Vine.

Hollywood's so-called social set, which is particularly guilty of having forsaken its roots and wouldn't think of having dinner anywhere but at Chasen's, comes from all over the map. Joseph Cotton, for example, is a native of Petersburg, Va. Tyrone Power comes from Cincinnati. Alan Ladd was born in Hot Springs, Ark. Dick Powell in Mountain View, Calif. Bob Cummings in Joplin, Mo. Judy Garland in Grand Rapids, Mich.

The stars, of course, are not alone. Producers, directors, writers and all the others come from everywhere but Hollywood. Trouble is, they've been in Hollywood so long that most of them have long since lost their perspective, and it is this lack of perspective that shows up all too often on the screen, be it movies or TV.

I thus make this suggestion that every network studio put a new clause in its contracts with talent, specifying that the talent to back home for three weeks out of every year—travel and living expenses to be paid by the network or studio.
