Trojans Underdogs For NCAA Track Go

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) - Southern California's Trojans, monarchs of collegiate track and field the past seven years, appear headed for a fall this weekend. It's almost unique when USC isn't rated the favorite for the NCAA championships. They've won 19 out of 26 years. But for this 33th annual meet here Friday and Saturday the data points to Kansas, Villanova and UCLA, not necessarily in that order.

The first two have solid possibilities for event winners and the Uclans have a depth of talent which can pick up place points. None of the three favorites has ever won the title although UCLA finished second, losers to USC in the final event, and Kansas was third last year.

UCLA this season deposed USC as champion of the Pacific Coast Conference, the first track and field title for the Bruins. The Trojans had won the title the past 13 times but this season have been plagued with injuries that sidelined some of their top point makers.
