Strawberry Preserves, Jam Recipes Favorites

Strawberries are just about ready for canning and jamming now, though we always advise folks to wait until the very last minute for the berries they are going to freeze. The more sunny weather we get, the sweeter th strawberries and the better they

Here are three old standbyr that we've used for years and have passed on many years too, for we don't know any better recipes. The first is cooked by the clock and is a bright flavorful jam. The second, an old timer with an odd method of cooking that's good in color and flavor. It's much like the kind we used to thicker

The third combines two distinctively flavored berries

15-MINUTE STRAWBERRY JAM

1 quart washed berries 1 quart sugar

2 tablespoons lemon juice Put hulled, well washed berries into a large broad kettle or

saucepan, add half the sugar and bring slowly to the boiling point, boil for 2 minutes, add remaining sugar and boil 3 minutes, still stirring. Stir in lemon juice. Pour into a shallow bowl and as it cools, stir occasionally. Allow to stand overnight, so berries will plump up. Spoon jam into sterilized small jars and cover with lids, seal at once. This makes 2 pints bright colored jam.

SALEM PRESERVES

quart sugar

Add half of sugar to water, boil to a crack, almost to a cara-mel. Add berries, then remaining sugar. Bring to a boil, cook 12 to 15 minutes. Do not stir. Stand overnight in same kettle. Bottle cold in sterilized jars.

STRAWBERRY GOOSEBERBY JAM

1 pound strawberries 11/2 pounds gooseberries 2 pounds sugar

Slice strawberries and cover with sugar. Let stand one be add gooseberries and cook until it jells when a little is placed on a

We have our favorite way to prepare strawberries for the freezer, and believe it to be the best, no matter how many fancy books tell you otherwise.

Here's the precedure: Wash about a quart of berries at a time, putting into a large bowl of water, pushing down then dipping out with the hands into

Now halve each berry, even the smaller ones. This allows fresh-tasting

To the quart of berries in a bowl, add 1/4 cup sugar and lightly toss to distribute sugar. Pile lightly into containers, filling full (these will settle to the

proper depth and allow headroom for freezing. Put into freezer

Some suggest putting down in syrup, but this method we be lieve to be inferior to our own, when best quality berries are used

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
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
