Burning Truck Stops Traffic

SANTIAM JUNCTION—A loaded trailer-truck blocked traffic on the North Santiam highway near here for almost an hour Wednesday after its driver was forced to abandon the vehicle because of fire, state police reported. The truck was totally damaged.

Harry C. Brinson, Bend, told officers he set the truck's brakes on a grade and left it after noting the vehicle was "getting awfully hot."

But the truck's brake linings burned, causing the vehicle to jackknife across the highway on the grade.

The truck, loaded with powdered pumice, reportedly caught fire about 3 p.m. after a drive line broke and struck the gas tank.

Eugene Water Bacteria Rises

EUGENE — Lane County, state and city officials are seeking the source of an increasingly high bacterial count in the city's water supply.

Since summer of 1955, the bacterial count in the supply has been on the increase. But Dr. Harold Osterlund, county health officer, said there is no cause for alarm among water users. He explained that the water treatment routine reduces the bacteria count to a safe point.

The officials are exploring the possibility that the bacteria is coming from one or several contaminated sloughs emptying into the McKenzie River near the water intake at the Eugene Water and Electric Board filtration plant.

Martial Law in Argentine Ends

BUENOS AIRES — President Pedro Aramburu Wednesday revoked the martial law clamped on Argentina in last weekend's bloody revolt. Pending death sentences were suspended.

A nationwide hunt went on for Gen. Raul Tanco and other leaders of an uprising blamed by the government on supporters of Juan D. Peron, ousted president.

Firing squads shot 27 military and civilian rebels, sources close to the government said. From 150 to 200 other death sentences were commuted to life. Press reports estimated at least 900 persons were arrested.

A-PACT SIGNED

WASHINGTON — The United States and New Zealand have signed an agreement to cooperate in research in the peaceful use of atomic energy.

Debt Ceiling Cut Okehd

WASHINGTON — Sen. Byrd (D-Va.) said Wednesday Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey has agreed to a three billion dollar decrease in the temporary ceiling on the national debt.

Byrd, who heads the Senate Finance Committee, said in a statement he will propose a reduction in the ceiling, effective July 1, from the present 281 billion dollars to 278 billions.

Byrd, a leading congressional advocate of reducing government spending, said unexpended balances in appropriated funds would climb to 141 billion in the fiscal year starting July 1 under President Eisenhower's budget proposals. In view of that, he said, the debt ceiling offers "an important control over federal expenditures."

Douglas Fir Orders Dip

PORTLAND — Douglas fir orders, shipments and production fell off in May, the West Coast Lumbermen's Assn. said Wednesday.

For the first five months of the year, the industry is running behind the pace set the previous two years, Secretary Harris E. Smith said.

At the end of May unfilled orders were listed at 700,201,000 board feet, and stocks on hand at 967,061,000.

For the first five months of the year, production totaled 3,922,984,000 board feet, compared to 4,344,677,000 for the same period in 1955. Orders were 3,976,820,000, compared to 4,233,499,000, and shipments were 3,990,676,000, compared to 4,182,593,000.

Court to Hear Kermit Smith State Proposal

PORTLAND — A proposal to settle the \$32,500 estate of Kermit Smith, who was slain in a bomb blast last year, will go before Circuit Judge William L. Dickson for approval Thursday.

Victor L. Wolf was convicted of murder. Smith's widow, Marjorie, was acquitted of complicity. Alan Davis, Portland attorney, confirmed the agreement provides that the widow will get \$2,500, and the rest of the estate will go to the Smiths' 3-year-old daughter, Susan.

Leading U.S. Air Chiefs Tapped for Visit to Russia

WASHINGTON — Top technicians of the Air Force will be among the nine officers accompanying Gen. Nathan F. Twining to the Russian air show in Moscow on June 24.

Twining, the Air Force chief of staff, announced the list Wednesday. In selecting his deputy chiefs of staff for operations, development and materiel to make this trip, he underlined his intention of making it a working visit that will test Soviet willingness to more than the staged demonstrations and exhibits that will be seen by visitors from many lands at the show.

Firemen Ask Outside Work Law Removed

Removal of the controversial "no-work" law for city employees was asked Wednesday night when a delegation of firemen appeared before the Salem Civil Service Commission. The matter was taken under consideration after firemen complained the law "caused much trouble and dissatisfaction."

Other business included the setting of dates for police entrance and sergeant's examinations. Entrance exams are scheduled July 12 and the promotion exams on July 19.

The delegation from the fire department said they spoke in behalf of the entire organization in asking removal of the law which prohibits city employees from gainful outside work. Fire Marshall Glenn Shedeck represented Chief Ellsworth Smith, who was out of town.

Shedeck and Battalion Chiefs Robert Mills and Percy Clark said the law is most difficult to enforce and has long been a cause of "trouble and low morale" in the department. The delegation also included three hosemen.

Other Towns Cited

The firemen pointed out that similar regulations in Portland and Eugene have not been enforced for years and there are no such rules in Albany and Corvallis.

A main contention of the firemen held the law to be fair to some and unfair to others in the department. The question was raised by Shedeck as to why assignment of firemen as instructors for outside departments at extra pay should not be considered as "somebody mowing a lawn for 50 cents an hour. This was given as a chief cause of dissatisfaction.

Opinion Raised

William Entress, chairman of the commission, ventured the opinion that "no city employee should be working on the side and taking a job from somebody who needs it."

"If firemen are happy in their profession they should be willing to abide by rules and regulations," ventured Mayor Robert White. He took note of pay raises for firemen and pointed out that "only seven employees of the water department are making as much as starting firemen."

Hoseman Neal Nisbet said "if a fireman is willing to work in his off hours to build up savings, he should be free to do so."

Commission member Kenneth Perry posed the question as to whether an organization like the fire department might not be better off without civil service because of its different working schedules.

Monroe Cheek, third member of the commission, observed that "not many taxpayers would like to see a person whose wages they're paying, competing with them on a job."

Law's History

Battalion Chief Clark said he had dug into a history of the controversial law and found the law was originated in depression days in 1932 "when everybody was trying to end the depression."

The commission put aside for further study the matter of how soon an applicant for a police job would be required to move inside the city after his appointment.

Approved at last month's election was a plan to allow employment of policemen qualified under civil service before they have completed a year's residency here.

Chief Clyde Warren said he thought applicants should be given a reasonable time to move here after their six-months probationary period. Warren pointed out that applicants couldn't be sure of their jobs until after probation.

Competitive Exams

Warren also recommended competitive lieutenant's exams in the future rather than promotions to that level strictly on seniority. This would not apply to recent promotions, in which three sergeants were elevated to lieutenants on a City Council order.

Two patrolmen currently are on the eligibility list for positions of sergeants in the police department. Warren said some dozen men will take the exam for the other opening.

The Civil Service Commission accepted the resignation of Allen McRae from the detective force. McRae quit to take an insurance investigative job.

Loyalty Case Firing Revoked, Probe Promised As Cain Renews Attacks

WASHINGTON — Former Sen. Harry P. Cain unloaded a fresh attack Wednesday on the Eisenhower administration's loyalty-security program. A short time later one man was reoffered a job he had lost on security grounds, and senators pledged a quick investigation of other cases.

Cain, a member of the Subversive Activities Control Board, told a Senate judiciary subcommittee he thinks there is "serious question whether we need a so-called loyalty program in this country."

Continuing testimony he began Tuesday, Cain said that among the thousands of government workers listed as security risks over the years, it would be hard to count a dozen who actually were found to be disloyal.

The former Republican senator from Washington State declared that the security program has been marked by "fascist" type abuses which make even application for a federal job "a terrifying and inhuman trap."

In appearing before the same group Tuesday, Cain cited as an example of American "fascism" the case of an ex-GI who lost a Red Cross job after the Army raised security questions about him Wednesday night that the Red Cross has "offered" to re-

hire the veteran, Irving I. August of Seattle.

As to whether August would be permitted to go overseas with the Red Cross, a Pentagon spokesman said this would await the outcome of a subsequent security clearance.

And, he added, the Defense Department is making available to August "clearance facilities" which are available to other industrial workers.

Job Offered

The Defense Department an-

in Seattle, August said the Red Cross had called him from San Francisco and asked if he wanted the job back.

Ready to Work

"They hit me cold just after I had gotten out of bed," he said, "so I told them I would think it over. They said they would call me again tomorrow morning. When they do, I'll tell them I'll be delighted to go back to work."

He said he wanted a chance to clear his name under oath. He ascribed his troubles to a period of four to six months in 1943 when he was a member of the Progressive Party which he dropped out of when he decided "it was being influenced by Communists."

Investigation of all the cases cited by Cain was promised by the Senate subcommittee.
