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Construction Round-Up School, Church, Homes Underway at 4 Corners

FOUR CORNERS—With the beginning of summer, construction has taken a definite upswing here. Hampton C. Platt, contractor for the Four Corners school addition, reports that they are right on schedule at this date with the prospect of meeting the deadline date of August 15 for completion. The roof trusses are all up for the four classroom and two rest rooms being added on to the east end of the present building. This will make 12 classrooms. It will be finished in brick to correspond to the present building.

Work has begun on the new Methodist Church expansion program. A 90 by 40 building two stories high will join the present building on the east. It will house class rooms, church office and recreational rooms.

Wild Horses Plentiful For Rodeo at St. Paul

ST. PAUL—Wild horse races will be featured again this year at the St. Paul Rodeo. The rodeo, one of the oldest and richest in the west, will be held July 1 through 4.

Approximately 75 wild horses will be captured in various parts of the state, including Warm Springs and Tygh Valley areas, for delivery to the rodeo here. Some of them are already on the scene.

The wild horse races have provided some of the most spectacular action of the rodeo here for the past several years. Cowboys must take these horses, which have never been ridden, saddle them and then ride them across the arena and through an exit.

The horses are sold to the public following the rodeo.

There will be several added attractions in connection with the 21st annual rodeo, including free fireworks following the night performances on July 2 and 3, dancing each night in an open pavilion, a spaghetti and meatball dinner from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. July 1 in the City hall, a turkey dinner from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. July 4 in the City hall and a western parade starting at 10 a.m. on July 4.

The July 1 and 4 shows will be held in the afternoon, starting at 1:30 p.m. The night shows on July 2 and 3 will get under way at 8 p.m.

Specially performers on the regular rodeo program will include the Hendrick's Family, featuring Roman-style riding and jumping along with trained dogs; Wes Curtis and Sherman Crane, clowns and bullfighters; and the Lane Trio and Homer, a trampoline act.
