Rites Pending For Victim of Traffic Crash
Alphie Pedro Wright, who died early Saturday morning following an automobile crash north of Keizer, had been a resident of Salem for the past 31 years.

Funeral arrangements are pending in care of the Howell-Edwards funeral home.

Born Aug. 29, 1907, in Louisville, Kentucky, Wright spent several years in Montrose, Colo., prior to moving to Salem in 1925. He attended Salem High School for a short time.

Wright had been an employee of Curly's Dairy for the last five years.

Survivors include a daughter, Sharon, 15, and a son, Allen, 12, both of Salem; a sister, Mrs. Ruby Hellet, Medford; a brother, Kay, Longview, Wash.; his stepmother, Mrs. Emily Brown, Salem; two step-sisters, Virginia Lee Brown, Salem, and Mrs. Vesta Knight, Sevensville, Tenn.; and a step-brother, Ralph Weaver, Seattle.

Wright's death was the 11th traffic fatality in Marion County, the 14th in the Marion-Polk County area.

The one-car accident occurred shortly before midnight at the intersection of Wheatland Road and the Clear Lake Road, one mile north of Keizer. Wright died en route to a Salem hospital by Willamette Ambulance Service.

Out-of-State Horses Take Lead At Annual Arabian Show Here

Oregon was crowded out of the picture when it came to championship placings in the 10th annual All Arabian Horse Show breeding classes which were judged Saturday at the Oregon State Fairgrounds.

Washington captured three of the top places, with the other going to Malibu, Calif. The horse show opened at 9 o'clock Saturday morning, with breeding classes judged throughout the day. The first of the two

performance events was Saturday night. This afternoon at 1:30 o'clock the performance classes will get underway again for the final event of the show. Like the two previous events, this one will be at the State Fairgrounds.

The shows are a benefit for Shrine Crippled Children's Hospital, and the Salem Shrine Club of Al Kader Temple is cooperating with the Arabian Horse Breeders Association in staging the events.

While only a small group of spectators watched the breeding classes being judged Saturday, the story was different Saturday night when a large crowd of spectators filled the arena. Advance sales for this afternoon indicate another good crowd, officials said.

Competition was keen in most classes, with some of the finest horses ever seen in this area being shown. Elmer L. Hampton, Portland, president of the Arabian Horse Association of Oregon, said. Close to 200 horses are entered.

Washington Horses
Two four-year-old mares, Donita, a chestnut, owned by Archer Arabians of Moses Lake, Wash., and Collette, a grey, owned by B. Field, Leavenworth, Wash., competed for top place in female classes, after they had showed against each other in their age division. Donita won the championship, and Collette was named reserve champion over other first place winners.

Aarief, a 10-year-old smooth grey stallion captured the purple in his division although the judge admitted that Nusayn, a three-year-old competing against him in the finals, was also the stuff from which champions are made. Aarief is owned by Lasma Arabian of Notlake, Terrace, Wash., and the reserve champion by Edno C. Williamson, Malibu.

Valley Horses
While a number of mid-Willamette horses were on display, and will perform again this afternoon, they did not place first in the breeding classes, shown Saturday.

Williamson, Malibu, Calif.; fillies, Clarissa, owned by Fields (Rohita, owned by Carol Garrison, Salem placed third).

Field Training Marks Guard Summer Camp

A full ration of field problems and Army spit-and-pol-har already been received by Salem area National Guardsmen midway through a two-week summer training program at Camp Clatsop, near Seaside, according to a report received in Salem Saturday from Battery D of the 722nd Anti-Aircraft Battalion.

Field problems that included setting up 40 mm and cal. 50 anti-aircraft mounts were undertaken Monday, after which gunners practiced tracking National Guard jets that buzzed the installations. Monday night maximum security guards were used at the gun mounts against aggressor forces attempting to knock out the units.

The remainder of the week was devoted chiefly to firing against radio controlled anti-aircraft targets. There was no report of how many were downed.

Major Gen. Ennis, deputy 6th Army commander, inspected the camp Friday, and the battalion's battery D was chosen honor guard for its high performance during the week.

Gov. Elmo Smith will inspect the camp Wednesday and witness various demonstrations by the units.

Police Exams to Fill Three City Patrolmen Vacancies

The City Police Department is now taking applications for positions of patrolman. Chief Clyde Warren reminded Saturday City service examinations will be held July 12 at the City Hall.

Three vacancies currently exist in patrolman ranks and these will be filled by the three applicants making highest grades in the coming exams, Warren said. Other men passing the exams will be placed on a waiting list to fill vacancies as they occur.

Warren wanted it emphasized that for the first time in a number of years applicants need not be residents of Salem. Voters decided at the last election to permit non-residents to apply.

After being accepted in the department, patrolmen will have a reasonable length of time in which to move inside the city. Exact length of time has not yet been decided.

Patrolmen get \$325 a month to start, with an increase to \$335 in six months. Maximum salary is \$355.

Mrs. Harrison Dies of Stroke
