WOODBURN — With the third annual Fourth of July Chuck Wagon Breakfast approaching, the sponsoring Woodburn Junior Chamber of Commerce is making plans to serve even more than the 1,100 who took part in the event last year.

The breakfast will be served from 6 to 10 a.m. at Settlemier Park.

The menu will feature pancakes and eggs. Arrangements have been made for 400 pounds of boned ham, 200 pounds of pancake flour, 210 dozen eggs, 16 gallons of syrup, 60 pounds of butter and 30 pounds of coffee.

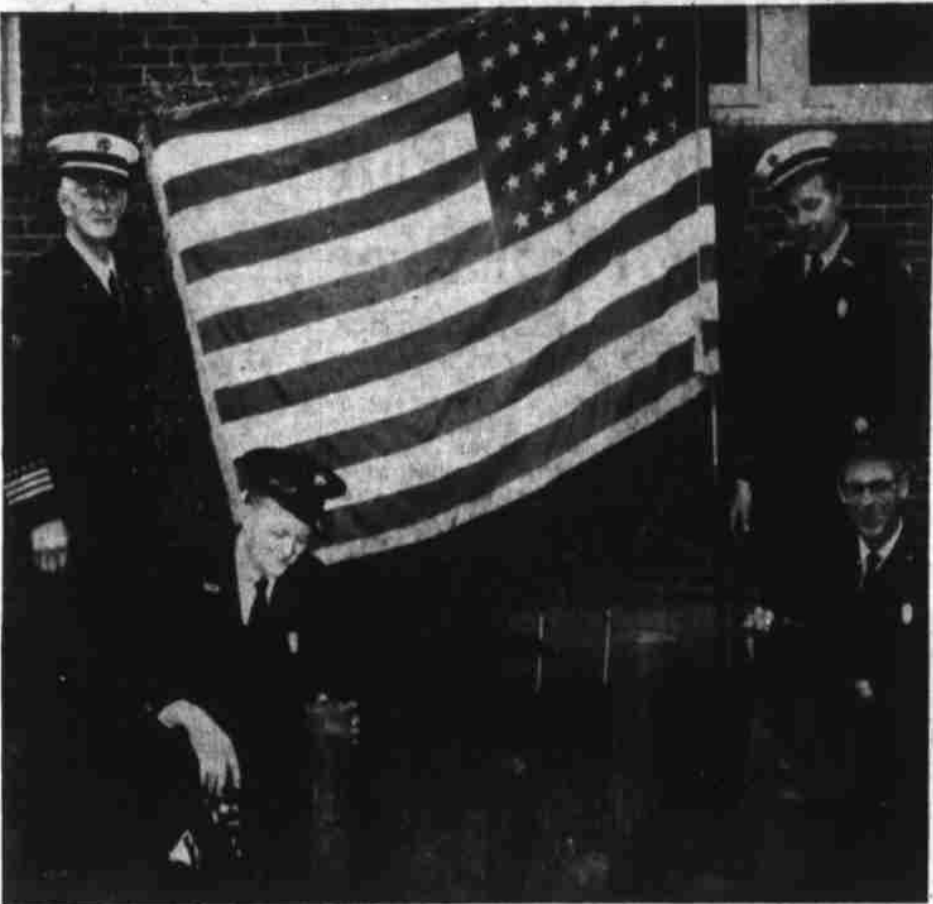
Cooking facilities will include eight large gas stoves. Adequate seating is promised around a large bonfire. Part of the seating area will be covered, and the breakfast will be held "rain or shine," sponsors reported.

The event began three years ago as a fund-raising project for youth welfare in Woodburn. Special prices will prevail for children. The price includes "all you can eat," the JCs reported.

Mickey McClure is general chairman for the event. Other chairmen include: Publicity, Hal Livesay; cooks, Red Eason; food, Max Murray; dishwashing, Joe Walker Jr.; table service, Max Ohman; equipment, E. A. Biachman and Al Ringo; tickets, Wilbur Green.

Jaycee-Eltes will assist with the event. A group of 16 folk dancers from Portland, Salem and Corvallis will present entertainment at 8:30 a.m.

who is dean of the store employees and who will function as the ribbon cutter at the ceremony. With her will be Mayor Robert F. White, Downtown Merchants President Douglas Yeater, Store Manager J. E. Culp and Chamber of Commerce Manager Stanley Grove.

Principal feature of the remodeling is elimination of aisle congestion by use of more modern merchandising tables, counters

fixtures grouped in smaller units to allow easy customer selection. More stock can be displayed in less space, Manager Culp explains.

Entirely new lighting for the store, a cash register system, space for additional lines of merchandise are among the other features.

During reopening day, Bernie Phillips will play organ music in the store.
