

Destructive Winds Pound Kansas, Missouri Locales

Destructive storms with winds up to 115 mph pounded Eastern Kansas and Western Missouri Wednesday.
The highest wind velocity was recorded at Kansas City, Kan. A spokesman for the Kansas City

(Mo.) Power & Light Co. said the storm damage, mostly from falling trees, was the worst in 10 years. Wind gusts reached 80 mph at Topeka Kan., but no injuries were reported.
At Kansas City, Mo., one storm-connected death was reported and

several other persons were reported injured. The fatality occurred when a man stepped from an auto onto a felled power line and died of electric shock.
The whipping winds brought warm weather back to the Great Plains. Winds reaching peaks of 40 to 55 mph fanned cooler air over the Great Lakes region. Cooler and drier air pushed into the Eastern states.

A few thundershowers cracked over the mid-Atlantic coastal states, Southern New England, the North Carolina mountains, in the hot air over Georgia and Florida, over Eastern Colorado and portions of Missouri and Nebraska. A half inch of hail fell at Colorado Springs, Colo.
Skies were mostly clear in the Far West. Temperatures were cool along the coast but climbed into the high 90s over the interior sections of California.

Assessor, Health Chief Win County Pay Hikes

Salary boosts for Marion County Assessor Harold Domogalla and Dr. Willard Stone, county health officer, were authorized Wednesday as the county court gave final approval to the 1956-57 budget.
The budget committee, which

had already worked out the new budget several weeks ago, made a few minor changes Wednesday. These included bookkeeping changes in the health department and county clerk's office.

Assessor Domogalla's annual salary was raised from \$5,640 to \$6,000. This places him equal, salarywise, with the sheriff and county judge.

A \$200 lid was added to Dr. Stone's \$10,000 yearly wage in order to gain reimbursement for a part of the salary from federal funds. County Judge Rex Hartley explained.

The new \$112,246 budget is approximately \$14,000 under the six per cent allowable increase. It is \$188,407 more than the current year's operating expense of \$2,938,830.

Yank Pilot Flies Reds Over Moscow

MOSCOW (AP)—William P. Lear, wealthy American plane equipment maker, flew his Russian hosts around Moscow Wednesday in the small plane he brought into Russia Tuesday. But he was cold-shouldered by the visiting Gen. Nathan Twining, U. S. Air Force chief when their paths crossed briefly.
Twining has been refused permission by the Russians to fly his own plane on a visit to Stalin's home tomorrow. Instead, he will be flown in a Soviet plane and for the first time will be permitted to take American newsmen with him on an inspection trip.

Lear and his wife came into a hotel room where Twining was briefing reporters on a trip to Soviet air factories where U. S. British and French official air delegations saw jet engines and an improved type transport.

Twining had just been asked by a reporter about military implications of Lear's flight into the Soviet Union with gear that has been banned by NATO for export to Soviet bloc countries. Twining expressed surprise. Then he said emphatically it was a civilian matter and the Air Force was not involved.

A reporter then told Twining: "General, here's an old friend of yours." He barely said hello and made no move to shake hands with Lear.
The Lear retired into the corridor. Later Lear said he understood the gathering was a cocktail party.

Joker Plays Tricks on British Queen

LONDON (AP)—Queen Elizabeth II was the victim of a practical joker Tuesday as she reviewed 300 holders of the Victoria Cross, Britain's highest military decoration.
She met the holders of the award, many bowed with age and some in wheel chairs, at a ceremony in Hyde Park. But one man in a chair, with whom she chatted, wasn't a Victoria Cross holder at all.

He was Thomas Meagher, a car park attendant at an Uxbridge theater. He was chuckling about his escapade Wednesday, while high brass at the war office, which arranged the pageantry, fumed.
Meagher, 64-year-old veteran, showed up at the park wearing what looked like a Victoria Cross ribbon. A policeman noticed that he limped. He hustled Meagher into a wheel chair. In a moment the Queen was at his side. She asked whether he was going to a dinner for cross holders, and he seemed concerned when he said he didn't feel up to it.
Several of the authentic Victoria Cross holders present were suspicious, but no one felt like breaking ranks to make a scene in the presence of the queen.
"I enjoyed the day very much, especially meeting the queen," Meagher said. "It was a lark, and I thought it would be a good laugh which many of my old army chums would appreciate."

PORTLAND (AP)—The Presbyterian Synod of Oregon expressed concern Wednesday about some singing television commercials.
It said these "impress themselves on the minds of our children until they go about singing the praises of cigarettes and beer instead of singing praises to our Lord."
The church group said children's "indiscrimination as potential liquor consumers is commencing in the cradle."

In other action, the Synod praised The Oregonian for its recent series of articles on reported vice conditions in the Portland area. It also commended Gov. Elmo Smith and Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton "for their energetic direction of investigation into the charges and for their sincere and unspectacular methods of operation."
The Presbyterians went on to urge that the governor and attorney general "prosecute without delay or partisanship" any persons who might be cited by the grand jury investigating the matter "in case the charges are proved to their satisfaction."

The Synod also renewed its attack on dog and horse race gambling and urged a statewide vote on a proposal to outlaw all such "legalized gambling." It also urged the next Legislature to put income from pari mutuel betting into the state's general fund "in order to put backbone in rural legislators, at present bribed into silence by their cuts of the income."

Tennessee Demos End Row; Delegation on Own

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP)—Tennessee Democrats headed off a knockdown family row Wednesday with an agreement between Gov. Frank Clement and presidential hopeful Sen. Estes Kefauver to send an uninstruced delegation to the party's national convention.
The agreement, reached on the eve of the party's state convention here, provides that Tennessee's 32 votes in the national conclave at Chicago in August be left free to support "any Tennesseean who has an opportunity to be nominated" president or vice president.

Ads 'Fail to Sway' Papers

VICTORIA, B.C. (AP)—No North American newspaper is ever swayed on any major issue by advertising considerations, Charles B. Lord, advertising director of the 376,000 circulation Indianapolis Star and News said here Wednesday.
In an interview before the start of the Newspaper Advertising Executives Assn. convention, of which he is second vice president, Lord said:
"I've never found any newspaper that could be influenced. Surely, all papers are prone to give little puffs to advertisers, but when advertising walks in and tries to control editorial thinking it gets rough treatment."
The convention, held for the first time in the Pacific Northwest, starts Thursday and ends Saturday. About 150 delegates will attend.
The association embraces 1,000 daily papers in Canada and the United States ranging in circulation from 4 million to under 10,000. Members account for 65 per cent of total advertising volume of daily newspapers.

New Wealth No Bar to Berth in Jail

SPOKANE (AP)—Mrs. Lucille Boyd Gallegos, the Indian woman who struck it rich on uranium rights for her reservation land, was back in city jail Tuesday on a drunkenness charge.
Mrs. Gallegos was also in jail for drunkenness last Wednesday when it was revealed she and her brother, Richard Boyd, 17, would share \$340,000 plus royalties for ore rights on 435 acres in the Spokane Indian Reservation north of here. She drew a suspended sentence then from Police Judge Gordon Lower who said Mrs. Gallegos had been before him "many times" on drunk charges.
She was scheduled to appear in court again Tuesday, but was reported too sick.

Dulles Says Stalin Attack Shakes Reds

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles said Wednesday Moscow's control over foreign Communist parties has been "very much shaken and loosened" by the Soviet government's revelations about Stalin's reign of terror.

Dulles broadly hinted at a news conference that perhaps even the future of party chief Nikita Khrushchev, the man who disclosed Stalin's crimes, might be at stake in the Communist party furor.

He told reporters he was "very much tempted" to say whether he thought Khrushchev's leadership was endangered but that "I had better contain myself."

Dulles said international communism is in a state of perplexity and at internal odds "because certain basic truths have caught up with it."

Guardsmen Parade, Show Fire Power

ASTORIA (AP)—Oregon National Guard anti-aircraft units gave firing demonstrations, then paraded for the annual governor's day review at Camp Clatsop near here Wednesday.

In the morning they shot the powerful 75-millimeter skyscraper gun, main weapon of the 732nd anti-aircraft artillery unit from southern Oregon. Lt. Gen. Robert Young, commander of the Sixth Army, San Francisco, watched the firing and made an inspection of the area.

House Speaker Ed Geary, who is acting chief executive in the absence of Gov. Elmo Smith from the state, presented distinguished service awards in the afternoon.

One went to Charles A. Sprague, a World War II governor and publisher of the Oregon Statesman, in recognition of Sprague's co-operation with the National Guard during his term of state office.

Mrs. Earl Snell, widow of another World War II governor, received an award posthumously. So did Mrs. Paul Patterson, widow of the governor who died early this year.

There was a large crowd and officers described the firing tests as highly successful.

The units are in the second week of summer training. Some 1,100 troops are on hand.

Crash Hurts Salem Man

Christ Disciples Adopt Two New Constitutions

TURNER — The Christian Churches of Oregon, sometimes known as the Disciples of Christ, adopted two new constitutions in business sessions at their annual convention Wednesday afternoon and evening.

The vote was nearly unanimous.
The change in organization amounts to the enlargement (along with minor revisions) of the old organization and the establishment of an additional organization.

Church leaders feel that the new set-up will lead to greater harmony.

Within Folds
The additional organization, which is to be known as the Oregon Christian Missionary Society, will be loosely within the folds of the larger organization. It will provide a working unit for congregations which favor cooperative support of missions.

Congregations which prefer to act independently in support of missions will not, presumably, join this organization.

The other organization is an inclusive group, to hold all the Christian Churches of Oregon, without regard to their method of missionary support. The new corporate name of the group is Oregon Christian Convention. This name replaces the one which the organization used for many years — Oregon Christian Missionary Convention.

Thigh's the Limit, Ladies Told in Court
WHITE PLAINS, N. Y. (AP)—The thigh's the limit around here these days.
A new anti-shorts ordinance has split the town. Opposed to it are women with a well turned leg and men who consider such attributes a thing of beauty and a joy to the beholder.

Two women—an out of town matron and a teen-ager—thus far have fallen afoul of the ban on too short shorts. Their cases were taken to court Wednesday.

The law says shorts have to extend at least half way between the knee and the hip. If they're shorter, the maximum penalty is 30 days in jail and a \$150 fine.

First to plead guilty under the ordinance was Mrs. John Kosa, a trim, 30-year-old brunette from Wichita, Kan. She was wearing brief brown shorts on a shopping trip Tuesday.

She showed up in court, demure in a full length dress with a high neck. Judge Seymour Robinson gave her a suspended sentence after she pleaded she was unaware of the ordinance.

"It seems rather silly," Mrs. Kosa told a reporter. "But I believe a law is a law and I was in the wrong. I've worn the same shorts in Kansas and they offended no one there."

Also arrested under the ordinance was 17-year-old Beverly Richman of New Rochelle. Her blue shorts were too brief. She also claimed ignorance of the law and her lawyer got an adjournment of her case.
