The Senators are idle this weekend, with a bye, but the other six circuit members are to put the finishing touches on the first half today. Yakima has clinched the first half pennant.

Other opening series in the second half put Eugene's Emeralds at Wenatchee and Lewiston at the Yakims. The Spokane Indians draw the four-game bye for the first portion of the week.

Salem moves from Tri-City to Eugene on Friday, Saturday and Sunday of this week, and since the Senators owe two rainouts at Eugene, one or both may be made up this week.

The Senators return home for a four-game series with the Eugene on Monday, July 16. Eugene owes a makeup game here for a rainout, and it may be taken care of during the local series next week.

After standing idle for three days, the Senators will be ready to use any member of the pitching staff in the opener at Tri-City. It's lefty Jerry Cade's turn, however, and the young rookie may get Mr. Hugh Luby's opening call Monday. Cade has a 4-3 record.

Luby continues to search for "a capable starter as well as a reliever" for his mound staff, one who will fit in with Andy George, Cade, Ad Stalich and Bill Walsh as regulars. The manager feels the Senators will be able to hold their own with any club in the loop if such a flinger can be found before the second half gets too far along.

# PCC Studies USC Case But Maintains Silence

## Probe Covers Three Schools Cal, WSC Involved In Athletic Quiz

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The Pacific Coast Conference Saturday studied charges of illegal payments to athletes by University of Southern California alumni and boosters. But after seven hours of discussion—a spokesman said there would be no announcement until Sunday.

Dr. Glenn P. Seaborg of the University of California, acting as spokesman for the faculty representatives and athletic directors, said the entire day had been spent discussing the USC case and that it was not yet completed.

Questioned by newsmen after the closed door session, he added that both the University of California and Washington State College would be under scrutiny.

Information Promised  
He said that Washington State's representative, Prof. Emmett Moore, the conference president, had volunteered Saturday that he had information to submit before the two-day meeting ends. Seaborg said he had no information as to what the evidence might be.

It was not clear whether the discussion would be confined to the three schools mentioned since Dr. Seaborg said that "several" were being considered.

Previously handed stiff penalties by the conference and placed on probation for "slush" fund or "under-the-table" pay to athletes have been the University of Washington and UCLA.

The athletic directors and faculty representatives are continuing their meeting through Saturday evening and will begin again the first thing Sunday morning. Seaborg said there would be no further announcements until deliberations are completed.

All Reports Not In  
He said that all of the reports from members schools on athletic payments, asked by July 15, are not yet in; that no specific athletes were named in Saturday's discussion of USC financial aid, and that Stanford University is one that has not yet submitted its report.

Dr. Seaborg declined to comment on whether Internal Revenue Service information was being used in considering athletic "under-the-table" payments or whether if such information was used the conference might be liable to legal action.

"These are things which will have to wait until final determinations are made," he said. "Any discussions now would be getting ahead of the story."

He added that no legal representatives of institutions or persons.

Sponsored by the Capital Auto Racing Association, the evening was replete with the crunching collisions, flying wheels and wild driving that fans have come to associate with destruction derbies.

While Jackson won the featured race, Red Duffy turned in some of the fanciest driving of the evening, winning the Class-B Main as well as one of the 6-lap heats.

Other heats were won by Roy Vibbert, and Rick Simons, the latter being pushed across the finish line in a jolting four-car collision that left the cars stopped right on the finish line at the end of the race.

In the 10-lap consolation race a red model-A Ford driven by Jerry Williams captured the fancy of the fans, and they cheered lustily when he won the race. His car, appearing for the second time this season, had an old-fashioned, kitchen-style hot-water tank on its front-end in place of a conventional radiator.

The 3-lap trophy dash was won by Glen Sheek. The race was tragically narrowly averted when Larry Beck's car swung into the infield and nearly ran down a pitman.

# Shirley Fry Nabs Net Win

## Yanks Capture Mixed Doubles

Althea Gibson, Pal Top Aussie Girls

WIMBLEDON, England (AP)—Shirley Fry's 12-year quest for a major singles title was successful Saturday when the steady veteran from Ohio won the Wimbledon women's championship, one of three honors salvaged by Americans on the final day.

The 28-year-old Miss Fry, her backcourt game bristling with accuracy, cut down Britain's intent Angela Buxton in a workmanlike, 50-minute final, 6-3, 6-1. The American, who lost her service, later Miss Fry, born in Akron but now a resident of St. Petersburg, Fla., teamed with Vic Seixas of Philadelphia to capture the mixed doubles, beating Althea Gibson of New York and Gardmur Mulloy of Denver, 2-6, 6-2, 7-5.

Althea Teams For Win  
The sensational Miss Gibson, who fashioned an 18-tournament winning streak stretching halfway around the world before Wimbledon, was not denied her moment of glory.

The tall, mannish stroking New York Negro girl paired with Miss Buxton to win the women's doubles with a 6-1, 6-4 triumph over Fay Muller and Daphne Seecy of Australia. She thus became the first of her race to win a Wimbledon title, the most coveted in all tennis.

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# Yanks Dump Nats, Increase Lead as White Sox, Tribe Lose to Tigers, Athletics

The Cincinnati Reds hung on to their paper-thin National League lead Saturday night by defeating the St. Louis Cardinals, 5-2, while their relentless pursuers, the Milwaukee Braves, shut out the Chicago Cubs, 5-0. A half game and three percentage points is all that separates the two front runners.

The Brooklyn Dodgers, the third team in the red-hot race, dropped a game and a half off the pace by taking a 6-3 lacing at the hands of the Philadelphia Phillies.

Yank Rivals Lose  
In the American League, the fates smiled on the first-place New York Yankees. While they were clubbing the Washington Senators, 8-3, both their chief rivals, the Chicago White Sox and the Cleveland Indians, lost. The Yank lead thus widened to five games.

As usual, it was the long ball that won for the Redlegs. Home runs by Wally Post and Ted Kluszewski accounted for three runs in the sixth inning to give unbeaten Brooks Lawrence his 12th victory of the season—this one in relief. He held the Cards to one hit in the last four innings.

Law Burdette hurled his second straight shutout for the Braves. It also was his fourth of the season. Only two Cubs reached second base as Burdette spaced out six hits. Only Friday night, Warren Spahn shut out the Cubs on four hits. To top his performance off, Burdette drove in the first run—which was all he needed.

Reggie Gets Victory  
The Phillies broke up the ball game with the Dodgers by scoring five runs in the seventh inning to knock out Roger Craig. Saul Rogovin, who was lifted for a pinch hitter in the big seventh, was the winner.

Gil McDougald and Bill Skowron each blasted a three-run homer to send the Yankees to their 11th triumph in the last 13 games. Mickey McDermott went the distance for the first time this season for the Bombers. Camille Pascual, first of three Washington pitchers, lasted only three innings and was the loser.

The inevitable finally happened to both the Indians and White Sox. All Herb Score must do as a rule is show up against the Kansas City A's. He had won his last seven starts against them. But this time they turned on him. First four innings and went on to a 5-3 triumph.

A Similar Story  
It was much the same story in the White Sox-Detroit Tigers' afternoon game.

The Pale Hose had won six games without a defeat from the Tigers this season. But when the Bengals turned the tables, they did it emphatically, winning 13-4, and matching a major league record by hitting three successive home runs in one inning.

Dick Donovan was the victim of the Tiger uprising in the fifth inning in which Harvey Kuhn, Earl Torgeson and Charlie Maxwell all connected in a row. It's the 20th time in major league history that three straight home runs have been hit in an inning, but only the second time the Tigers have done it.

Philly Beats Homer  
Billy Hoert got credit for his tenth victory of the season, although the White Sox blasted him from the mound with a three-run homer in the fifth inning.


# Joyce Ziske Leading Syracuse Golf Open

# Trouble Among Pirates . . . Bragan Blasts Long's Attempt at Babe Ruth

NEW YORK (AP)—Pittsburgh manager Bobby Bragan Saturday put the rap on his star hitter, Dale Long, accusing the first baseman of "trying to be Babe Ruth" and being responsible for the Pirates' recent tailspin.

"If Dale Long would stop trying to be Babe Ruth and start being Dale Long again, we'd be all right," the brass Pittsburgh skipper said, in trying to explain the Bucs' fall from first place in the National League to fifth.

"Dale is a 200 hitter normally, and that's where I want him to be—normal. Right now, he's at 300, but it's a skidding 300. He's made only two hits in his last 33 at-bats and none in his last 17."

This was the second time this season that Bragan has chastized the 30-year-old player who came from nowhere this year to be chosen the National League's starting first baseman in Tuesday's major league all-star game.

Long Handed Pile  
On April 13 Bragan fumed Long and outfielder Roberto Clement \$25 each for careless play in a 5-4 loss to the New York Giants.

Off to a hot start which shot them into first place early in June the Pirates have lost 15 of their last 19 games to fall below the 300 mark. Long, who set a record of eight home runs in eight straight games, hasn't had a homer since June 9.

Bragan said Long's slump had not affected just himself but also pitcher Bob Friend and the entire team.

"Friend is the best pitcher in the National League, but he needs runs to win," the Pirate manager added. "Bob has lost three in a row but some hits by Long could have made a big difference."

Fame Brings Distractions  
Bragan admitted that Long carried the team in the early stages of the race but added that the slugger's sudden fame brought distractions.

"Wherever he walked he was getting," Bragan said. "He was getting phone calls for all sorts of appearances. The fans at Forbes Field had him do encores. It was the kind of thing he'd never faced before."

"There's no need kidding ourselves. When he quit, we quit. The way we're constructed, we need his big bat."

Long was not available for comment.
