Truman Gets \$85,000 for Library Fund

CHICAGO (U) — Former President Harry S. Truman, obviously enjoying the role of Democratic elder statesman, received \$85,000 for his library Tuesday, and just about all the political attention he could absorb.

Told that President Eisenhower had reaffirmed that he is willing to be the Republican nominee for a second term, Truman grinned at newsmen and said, "That's not headline news to me."

He said he was pleased with selection of Gov. Frank Clement, 36-year-old Tennessee, as keynote of the Aug. 13 Democratic convention.

Prattis Clement
"You couldn't have a better keynote than Clement," he told a news conference, dismissing a suggestion that the Clement choice represented a victory for supporters of Adlai Stevenson.

Truman stressed that he is not taking a pre-convention stand for any candidate. He had undergone his neutrality earlier by breakfasting with Stevenson, thereby matching his conference in New York last week with Gov. Averell Harriman, another contender for the nomination.

Mr. Truman said, also, that he had visited in New York with the campaign manager of Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee, who is battling Stevenson and Harriman for the nomination.

Fund for Building
The 72-year-old former President received an \$85,000 check to a luncheon from the All-Chicago Committee for the Truman Library. Chairman Dan Ryan said the committee has more than reached its mark of \$1,000 for every Truman birthday.

The money will go toward completion of the massive Truman Library at Independence, Mo., now a building.

Eden to Visit Soviet Union

LONDON (U) — Prime Minister Eden announced Tuesday that he and Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd will visit the Soviet Union next May.

Announcement of the visit on an invitation extended by Soviet leaders when they were here last April brought cheers from both sides of the House of Commons.

Hugh Galskell, Labor party leader, said Eden's statement would be welcomed.

Eden said his party would leave London May 5.

Mediators, Steelworkers Hold Session

WASHINGTON (U) — Federal mediators conferred for more than an hour Tuesday night with top officials of the striking United Steelworkers, Chief Mediator Joseph F. Finnegan said.

Finnegan, director of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, nevertheless expressed confidence that both the union and management are ready to cooperate in new bargaining efforts to end the 10-day-old strike which has idled some 730,000 workers.

Session Thursday
Tuesday's meeting was a step toward resumption of joint union-management negotiations, which Finnegan said would get under way Thursday in Pittsburgh.

David J. McDonald, steelworkers president, said after the session that the steel industry "forced" the nationwide strike but that the union is "ready and willing to enter into collective bargaining at any time."

Finnegan said the "preliminary" meeting with union leaders would be followed by a similar session Wednesday with a management team headed by John A. Stephens, a vice president of U.S. Steel.

"No Magic Wand"
Following the conference, Finnegan emphasized to newsmen that the government has "no magic wand" to solve the bargaining deadlock.

"This is a collective bargaining problem," said Finnegan. "Our function is to help in whatever way we can."

"A solution will be worked out only by bargaining between union and management representatives. It will not be imposed by the government."

Termed Emergency
Finnegan added he would not term the strike a national emergency at this time.

McDonald said he and the union appreciated Finnegan's statement with regard to not forcing a solution.

Tuesday's meeting with steel officials will be held in Finnegan's office here, with the scene shifting to Pittsburgh the following day for the joint talks.

Girl Scouts Break Camp, Head Home

MILFORD, Mich. (U) — Half a tent city folded Tuesday at 2,000 girl scouts headed home from their national roundup.

The final contingent of 2,200 teenagers leaves tomorrow when army crews will move in to clean up the 1,500-acre camp site.

For traveling the girls donned skirts for the first time in 12 days, packing up the Bermuda shorts, knee socks and shirts that made up the official roundup uniform.

General feminine reaction was voiced by Betty Erickson, of Lewiston, Mont., who said, "It feels good to dress up again. We all looked the same in those shorts; now we can look different."

Some murmurs were heard about the last day "leftovers" menu as the girls nibbled at chopped beef and cheese sandwiches. Others struggled to pack up the many extra items collected at the swap tent such as dried snakeskins and miniature hats.

"The tents are the easiest to pack," said Mary Jo Maronick of Great Falls, Mont. "It's the little things like knives and forks I can't find room for."

Japanese Report Another A-Blast

TOKYO (U) — The Japanese weather bureau announced its instruments indicated the United States set off still another nuclear explosion Wednesday at the Bikini testing grounds.

It was the fifth such Japanese report since the United States detonated a hydrogen bomb in the Bikini area May 21 in a test witnessed by American reporters.

The U. S. Atomic Energy Commission has refused to confirm or deny the subsequent Japanese reports.

Portland May Vote on Pinball Issue Again

PORTLAND (U) — Representatives of the pinball machine business filed petitions Tuesday, calling for Portland to vote again on whether to outlaw the machines.

If 18,316 of the 23,502 signatures filed Tuesday are validated, the measure will be on the November ballot.

Nude Body of Man Found in Columbia

BINGEN, Wash. (U) — The nude body of an unidentified man was recovered from the Columbia River here Tuesday by T. W. Mitchell, coroner's deputy, after tugboat and mill workers had sighted it floating near shore.

Nuclear Missiles Near, Navy Chiefs Claim

WASHINGTON (U) — The Navy says it will be only "a few years" before it will be firing ballistic missiles fitted with "high-yield nuclear warheads."

Progress in the field of naval missiles was disclosed by Adm. John E. Clark and Vice Adm. Thomas S. Combs in testimony given to a Senate armed services subcommittee and made public Tuesday in highly censored form.

Driver Charged With Negligence In Death of Girl

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Graham and his brother, Freeman Lee Graham, 32, were arrested shortly after the girl was struck fatally by an automobile, but each insisted the other was driving the car and the only immediate charge was one of drunkenness.
