## Darling Vegetable Time Has Come to Dress Up Green Peas

Summer vegetables are no longer to be dreamed about all winter and welcomed in the markets only for a brief but exciting season. Most of 'em are now year around foods for sophisticated appetites.

But all-year or not, those certain vegetables meant to be eaten in summer are more welcome then. We'll admit it's easier to open a package of frozen peas than to shell a bagful, but the fresh ones are very, very good.

Most French cooks, and many wise American ones cook green peas with a few leaves of lettuce shredder up in them. This gives moisture and seasoning to the green peas.

At first we want peas only with butter or a bit of cream, but later when some of the novelty is gone, a few extra tricks are welcomed. Here's an idea for adding extra flavor to green peas.

**Green Peas ala French Cuisine**

12 young onions  
Bouquet garni\*  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup butter

1/2 teaspoon sugar  
1 small head lettuce cut in ribbons  
4 tablespoons water

For a bouquet garni, tie some sprigs of parsley and basil or other preferred herbs together.

Put peas, herbs, half the butter seasonings, lettuce and water into a saucepan. Bring to a boil, reduce heat to low and cook until done. Add last half of butter when removing bouquet garni just before serving. Tilt saucepan to distribute butter over vegetables.

Or if you want to become a French farmer, cook the peas thus:

**GREEN PEAS PROVINCIAL**

5 tablespoons olive oil  
1 medium sized onion  
6 small potatoes  
4 cups boiling water  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
4 cups shelled green peas

3 crushed cloves garlic  
Herbs as desired  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon saffron  
4 eggs  
French bread

Put oil in casserole that has a good tight cover. Add onion and brown lightly over low heat. Add potatoes, cut in 1/2 inch thick slices. Stir around until coated with oil. Add water, peas and other ingredients except the eggs and bread. Cover and boil gently. When peas and potatoes are done, slice eggs onto surface but keep from touching each other. Gently pour 2 tablespoons of the juice over the eggs to form a film. Cut bread in 1/2 inch slices and put on plates, spoon sauce and eggs on bread.
