Salem Youth Awarded Yale Scholarship

Nicholas G. Error Jr., Salem scholar and football player, has just won his fourth scholarship award for Yale University.

Error, son of Mr. and Mrs. Nicholas G. Error, 1830 N. 5th St., was announced Thursday as winner of a \$400 scholarship from the American Society for Metals.

He is one of 53 U. S. and Canadian metallurgy engineering students rewarded for outstanding academic work.

Earlier this year Error's original \$1,800 annual scholarship from Yale University was renewed. He also won a \$100 prize awarded by the university for outstanding freshman work.

Besides maintaining scholarship standing at Yale last year, Error played freshman football. He is now toughening up for varsity football by working as a pipe layer with a heavy construction crew at Brookings, Ore., his family reports.

He is a 1955 graduate of North Salem High.

Salem YMCA board of directors started furnishing the new YM addition Thursday.

500 worth of locker room equipment and called for bids July 25 from local office equipment and furniture stores on a long list of furnishings.

42-Cent Hop Price Urged

Hopgrowers in Oregon, Washington and Idaho are planning to hold for a minimum of 42 cents on all future contracts, Ross E. Dwinell, executive secretary of the Hop Growers of America, said Thursday in a release from his Yakima, Wash., office.

When the wing is built, the YM will have four separate locker rooms—for boys, for senior men, for business members in a new "health department" and for women and girls.

"Because of increased costs and the fact that the majority of contracts in the past few years have not been high enough to meet growers' costs, the Hop Growers of America are suggesting to their members in the three hop producing states, that they hold for a minimum of 42 cents on all future contracts," the release said.

The loss was discovered by Mrs. William Ferguson, a technician in the office. The money was taken from a desk drawer in the office of Dr. Carl Benson and Dr. Ruth Dougherty, 301 Livesly Building. Entry was apparently gained through an unlocked private door, police said.

The hop growers in the hop growing states have now approved the program, Dwinell added.

The board also accepted a \$604 low bid from Sohan Co., Portland, for dryer racks used to dry swim and gym clothing for members who keep it at the Y. In a third purchase at what board members described a bargain price, the YM bought \$353 worth of baskets and racks from Oregon State College.

In other action, the YM board set July 29 as dedication date for the newly-completed new swimming pool at Camp Silver Creek. Salem Rotary Club, YM board members and others will take part at the camp, that day.
