Hollywood Takes 4-0 Shutout From Beavers

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Ben Wade pitched his fifth shutout of the season Wednesday night as Hollywood bested Portland, 4-0. Dick Fiedler, the loser, had a shutout going into the eighth, when the Stars scored all their runs. The Hollywood win squared the series at a game apiece. San Francisco trounced league-leading Los Angeles, 9-4. Seattle trimmed Sacramento, 5-3, and San Diego outscored Vancouver in a 10-6 battle.

A sacrifice fly by Roman Mejias, R. C. Stevens' double, and a two-run single by Danny Kravitz produced the runs.

The veteran Wade registered eight strike-outs and gave six hits, but Fiedler allowed only five.

In the fifth the Beavers had runners on second and third with none down. Dick Young singled, stole second and went to third when Spook Jacobs dropped Luis Marquez' pop fly for a two-base error. But Wade slammed the short, Bob Borkowski dribbling to short, Ed Mickelson popping out, and Sam Calderone fanning.

Umpire Gordon Ford threw Jack Littrell out of the game in the seventh for hurling his bat after missing a third strike.

The game drew 2,660.

Cleveland Splits With Washingtons

Detroit ended New York's winning streak at 11 games by taking a doubleheader from the American League leading Yankees 8-4 and 4-3 Wednesday while the Chicago White Sox were collared with the longest losing string in the majors this year as Baltimore extended the slump to 11 games 4-5.

Detroit's sweep, nailed by a dramatic, two-out, two-on fielding play by Al Kaline, gave young Frank Lary his fourth victory over the Yankees this season and whittled their lead to 9½ games over Cleveland. The Indians split a two-night pair at Washington, winning 11-1 after a 7-5 defeat.

Early Wynn, who started for the Tribe, was smacked on the chin by Jose Valdivielso's line drive in the second inning opening slash that required 16 stitches.

Boston Beats A's
The Boston Red Sox, winning 10 of their last 12, climbed to within six points of Cleveland by beating Kansas City 7-3, although the A's had seven hits off Mel Parrelli—making his first start since Saturday's no-hitter against Chicago.

Kaline, who broke a 3-all tie in the sixth inning with his 14th homer, packed away Lary's eighth triumph with a leaping snare of a drive to right-center that required 16 stitches.

Fines Handed Gomez, Adcock

MILWAUKEE (AP)—One of the wildest melees of the current National League season resulted Wednesday in a \$250 fine for pitcher Ruben Gomez of the New York Giants, a \$100 fine for first baseman Joe Adcock of the Milwaukee Braves and a three-day suspension for Gomez.

In addition, Gomez drew a severe reprimand from Warren C. Giles, league president, who stipulated that the fine be paid personally by the Giants' pitcher, not his team. Adcock was not suspended.

The Puerto Rican right-hander touched off a mad fracas involving players of both teams in the second inning of Tuesday night's game when he twice hit Adcock—once with a pitched ball and once with a deliberately thrown ball. Adcock, with most of his team mates in pursuit, charged after Gomez who ran to the dugout and disappeared up the ramp leading to the clubhouse. Order was restored by the umpires and half a dozen police officers. The Giants eventually won in 11 innings, 6-6.

Frustration Results From PCC Meet North-South Rivalry Noted

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Reaction to the meeting of the Pacific Coast Conference Presidents' Council, at which there was much talk but little action on the loops tangled athletic problems, ranged from utter frustration to outright anger Wednesday.

The presidents are to meet in Portland Aug. 8. For the two preceding days the faculty representatives, tagged by one writer as the "foundering fathers" of the conference, will convene.

There isn't much hope here that a solution to the mess will be found or that peace will come in the bitter civil war between the North-West and the Deep South (California variety).

Few observers, it appeared, really felt Tuesday that the presidents at San Francisco would suspend the eligibility bans imposed on some 100 football players at Southern California, UCLA, Washington and California.

Seniors Have Hopes
Southern Cal and UCLA had asked for such a suspension until the conference could take a broad new look at an athletic code its own people have called outmoded and unworkable.

USC and UCLA were voted down, 6-2.

Boiled down, about all the presidents did was indicate that maybe the ineligibility slapped on senior football players might be lifted.

Why the seniors but not the juniors and sophomores?
Dr. Robert Gordon Sproul of chairman, was quoted as saying: "Perhaps something should be done about the seniors. Their loss might wreck the entire program."

"Might wreck what program, Dr. Sproul? The 1956 box office program?" So wrote one columnist, Maxwell Stiles of the Mirror News.

Possible relaxation of the penalty on seniors was made contingent on member schools taking action against coaches or athletic heads involved in illegal payoff practices to athletes.

Severe Penalty Possible
Dr. Sproul said this action could range from a reprimand to dismissal.

Mulcahy gave Ed Luedke needed relief. Luedke had weathered a three-run Tri-City outburst in the first inning.

Ron Carlson and George Huffman had triples for the winners who had five one-run innings and a two-run outburst in the fifth. Altogether the Spokane crew collected 12 hits.

There was a short-lived free-for-all in the Spokane dugout during the Spokane fifth. Tri-City player-manager Don Pries drove into the Spokane beehive to start the fight. He was ejected from the game. Cause of the fight was not revealed.

And at Wenatchee, Ted Herrera ran his string of scoreless innings to 16 as he blanked the Chiefs, 5-0, in the nightcap to give the Yakima Bears a split after the Chiefs won the opener, 6-3.

The Chiefs came from behind to win the abbreviated opener on Bob Duretto's two-run homer in the sixth. The hit was Duretto's fourth in four trips, the round-tripper being preceded by three singles.

Glenn Irsinghaus went all the way to chalk up his ninth win against seven losses.

First baseman Roy Nixon was the big gun for the Bears with a two-run double in the third and a carbon-copy two bagger in the fifth. Bob Ward, who relieved starter Jack Alliman in the third was the loser.

Cade's Hurling Saves Opener Before 2,179

Salem Leads Series 6-3; Final Tonight

The Salem Senators and Eugene Emeralds broke even in their Northwest League baseball doubleheader last night at Waters Field, the Senators nipping the Emms 2-1 in the 7-inning opener on the strength of some tremendous relief work by wee Jerry Cade, and the visitors nabbing the second 7-4 as they finally broke away from the run-famine that has been plaguing them during the long series.

A sweltering crowd of 2,179, largest "paid" gathering of the campaign, and one that was dotted with the red-fuzzed gents for the annual "Shriners Night", sat in on the twin bill.

Even though they got nothing more than a split in the duet, the Salems are still clinging to second place in the standings and are 6-3 up on Cliff Dapper's dandies in the series. Final clash of the long stand is set for tonight at eight o'clock, following another of the Salem Junior Baseball Class C League's six o'clock prelims, this one featuring the Dickson Market and Jackson Jewelry teams.

Although Chuck Essegian provided the Salems with their winning margin in last night's first game, by whacking his 12th home run of the season over the left field wall in the third inning off Lefty Bill Griffin, it was Cade who turned out to be the No. 1 hero of the close tussle.

A Great Feat
Little Jerry had blanked the Emms the last two times he faced them. He was called on to rescue Bob Daly, who had done such a fine relief job in Tuesday's game, and who had taken over for a faltering Ad Satalich in the seventh and final inning. Satalich had given two hits, and Daly one to fill the bases, with nobody out.

Cade had hardly time enough to get heated up when he was waved in. All he did was this: Make three straight pitches to pinch-hitter Dapper to fan him... make four to Jack Keller to fan him, too... make one to Carl Hutzler who bounced back to Cade on the mound for an easy third out.

It was a tremendous piece of work by the 150-pound freshman from Drain, and it saved Satalich's seventh win for him.

Three hits had cost Satalich the only Eugene run in the sixth.

Brady Steals Home
Brady picked up an unearned run in the first when Pete Brady was safe on an error, romped to third on Jack Dunn's double and then stole home during a Griffin windup, a spectacular home debut for Brady.

Essegian made it 2-0 in the third by lifting one over the Hotel Marion fence ad.

Salem got off to a 4-0 lead in the nightcap also, but rookie Arlie Alderman couldn't hold it. He was hit for a run in the fifth and then kayoed in the sixth when the Emms unbuckled a four-run blast on four singles, two walks, a wild pitch and a passed ball.

The last two Eugene runs were engineered quickly and convincingly by Bob Gauthier and Jerry Exley, who smashed back-to-back homers in the eighth, off Daly who was again on the firing line after Alderman, and then Satalich had walked the plank.

Salem got all four runs in the fourth on four walks, a hit batter, a sacrifice fly and doubles by Russ Skarbidge and Ronnie King. These were at the expense of starter Paul Schulte and Bob Marten.

The second game saw 27 men go into action as both Uncle Hugh Luby and Dapper pulled all strings in attempts to win it. Dapper used 14, including four pitchers, and it was Terry Loy who came out of it (Cont. on page 14, col. 6)

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
