

# Mid-Valley to Take Active Role In Nationwide Civil Defense Test

"Operation Alert," the nationwide civil defense exercise that begins Friday, will be observed with varying, but noticeable, effect through the mid-valley area.

In Salem there will be simulated care of Portland evacuees at the State Fairgrounds, registration of some state workers and a scurrying of city, county and state civil defense workers on their assignments.

Dallas will actually register, here for, and feed any volunteer

evacuees who appear at the Polk County Fairgrounds at Rickreall after the early morning "attack." While at the Canby emergency reception center, an estimated 4,000 evacuees, including Gov. Elmo Smith and his staff, will be cared for and given an emergency meal.

**Radio Blackout**

Throughout the nation and its territories there will be a complete 15-minute radio blackout beginning at 12:10 p.m. During this drill the air waves will carry only broadcasts from official CONELRAD stations operating at both 660 and 1340 on the radio dial.

The basic assumption of Operation Alert is that imaginary air and submarine attacks will be made simultaneously against 76 areas in the United States, of which Portland is one. In general, the test plan in Oregon will be to provide simulated care and housing for evacuees from Portland, and to provide support for that city after the hypothetical attack.

**Communications Test**

At the same time, regional, county and city civil defense units are given the opportunity to test their communications and air raid warning networks.

The state civil defense center in Salem will be in constant contact with all county centers and the federal civil defense administration regional office at Santa Rosa, Calif. In Oregon, control of the direct play of the problems will be from the state center; such as decisions on problems of traffic control, food, petroleum and medical supplies; rescue and damage control services; and security and policing details.

Marion County's civil defense unit will be headquartered in the County courthouse, from which the initial alert will be transmitted to each county sub-center. Salem "epicenter" communications center at the state police headquarters will serve to alert CD units in Polk, Yamhill, Clackamas, Washington and Clatsop counties.

**Sirens to Sound**

All fire departments in Salem and Marion County will signal the alert by sounding their sirens. Another Salem aspect of the test will occur in the Public Service building where employees will volunteer to test the refugee registration facilities of the county CD branch. This will be conducted during the noon hour by two registration teams in the building lobby.

Throughout the exercise a skeleton crew, headed by Leo G. Spitzbart, will man the reception center at the State Fairgrounds. While the control and communications center in the courthouse will be staffed by CD workers who will assemble when the warning alert is received. County CD Director Wallace Wharton said Members of the Salem Amateur Radio Club have volunteered to operate two amateur radio network bands.

**2,000 Possible**

Ted Westfall, Polk County CD director, said Tuesday he hoped as many as 2,000 volunteer evacuees would appear to test the facilities of his unit operating at Rickreall. The alert will begin at 9:45 a.m. in Polk County when sirens in Monmouth, Rickreall, Independence, Falls City and Dal-

**Traffic Violation Court Methods Hit in Portland**

PORTLAND (U.S.) — The present dual court system for traffic violations was criticized Wednesday in a report from the city's Traffic Safety Commission.

The commission, noting the rising accident rate, also appealed for more stringent enforcement of traffic laws. Its report was submitted in resolution form to Mayor Fred L. Peterson.

Under the present system, speeding and reckless driving violations go to Municipal Court while arrests for improper driver licenses or automobile plates are handled in District Court.

The safety commission said this system has resulted in lax enforcement and fewer arrests because of delays officers have encountered in District Court, located in the county courthouse.

## Lane DA Asks Residents Not To Sign Recall

EUGENE (U.S.) — Dist. Atty. Eugene Venn, target of a recall movement here, Wednesday asked Lane County residents not to sign the recall petitions.

The Recall Venn Committee is headed by Fred J. Bartels, Springfield mining engineer. Bartels was foreman of a grand jury which Venn contends was improperly impeached. The grand jury was dismissed and a new one was called. It indicted a Eugene attorney on charges of larceny by bail and receiving stolen money.

In a statement issued here Wednesday, Venn said he would not resign. "If I had anything to hide or fear of a personal nature, I would never have undertaken to expose this mess which up to now has been so carefully swept under the rug. No rug, however, is big enough to cover this dirt. The real issue is whether people want it exposed and those who have violated the law to face prosecution. I ask the citizens not to sign the petitions if they want just that."

Venn has charged in an affidavit filed in circuit court here that Circuit Judge Frank Reid had Bartels placed on the jury. Venn said he would welcome a libel suit or charges that he has made false statements under oath. Such actions would prove his accusations he said.

**Suicide Blast Kills Infant In New York**

NEW YORK (U.S.) — A violent gas explosion, apparently touched off by a suicide attempt, Wednesday took an infant's life and wrecked three two-story homes.

Five persons, including the baby's mother, were hurt in the blast on the Queens side of the East River, in Long Island City. Four other brick-frame houses in the neighborhood were damaged.

Asst. Dist. Atty. Thomas P. Cullen announced that one of the victims, critically injured William Kulka, 40, was booked on a manslaughter charge.

Cullen said Kulka, depressed since the death of his wife last April, turned on four gas jets "and apparently tried to commit suicide."

The dead baby was Margaret de Gregorio, six weeks old. She died in St. John's Hospital four hours after the late afternoon explosion. Her mother, Florence, 29, was in poor condition.

**Klamath Dance Juveniles Nabbed**

KLAMATH FALLS (U.S.) — City police and state liquor inspectors arrested 14 juveniles outside the Klamath Falls Amory Monday night on charges of illegal possession of liquor.

Inside the Amory, some 1,500 dancers, mostly teenagers rocked and rolled to the music of a nationally known orchestra led by Fats Domino.

Police said the youngsters were turned over to juvenile authorities.

**Champoeg Creek Bridge Contract Awarded by State**

A \$25,694 contract for construction of a 200-foot reinforced concrete bridge across Champoeg Creek near Newberg was awarded by the State Highway Commission Wednesday to United Builders, Inc., Beaverton.

The Beaverton firm submitted the lowest of seven bids for the new bridge. The project is along the Newberg-Yeggers Corridor Road, about three miles west of Newberg. Marion County will be responsible for constructing approaches to the bridge, which will replace a narrow timber bridge at the same site.

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## Tito, Nasser Reveal New National Ties

BRIONI, Yugoslavia (U.S.) — Presidents Tito and Nasser Wednesday announced a tightening of bonds between Yugoslavia and Egypt. Then they traded views for 5 1/2 hours with Prime Minister Nehru of India.

Nehru said the three-nation talks were only a friendly exchange without any decisions.

"We have not settled all the questions of the world — I repeat, not," Nehru said. "It is really extraordinary that we cannot hold a friendly meeting without you of the press attaching the highest importance to it."

Tito, however, called the three-nation talks "very, very successful — cordial and friendly."

They will continue Thursday. Nehru is scheduled to accompany Nasser to Cairo later in the day.

An effort by Algerian Nationalists to persuade the three prominent advocates of neutralism to say something on the French-Algeria conflict apparently failed.

An Indian source said Nehru was cold on the idea. An Egyptian said Nasser was irritated by the appearance of four Algerian Nationalists in nearby Tunis and did not push the Algerian issue.

Tanjung, the Yugoslav news agency, said the Egyptian-Yugoslav communique reaffirmed the Tito-Nasser views on active coexistence and steering clear of bloc alignments.

In Tunis, the Algerians had said they "presented a 10-point program here, including demands for sovereignty and independence of Algeria and freeing of all Algerians in jail or exile."

It was indicated that another communique would be issued at the end of the three-nation talks.

Tanjung said Nasser and Tito in their joint communique announced support of resolutions of the Bandung Conference of African and Asian nations last year dealing with the Middle East. The resolutions contained a blanket attack on colonialism.

Nasser was accompanied by Koca Popovic, and Vice President Evard Kordelj and Alexander Rankovic sat with Tito. Nehru had only a few aides with him.

Nehru came here from Paris in an Indian air force plane after talking over North African problems with French leaders. Nehru said in Paris afterward that the 20-month fighting in Algeria must be brought to an end. He said the French appeared to desire that.

**Woolmen Ask Top Incentive Level in '57**

HELENA, Mont. (U.S.) — The National Wool Growers Assn. executed a committee Wednesday voted to petition the government to set the incentive level for wool in 1957 at the maximum permitted by law, 110 per cent of parity.

The executive committee met in the 11 western states and Texas wound up their summer meeting in Helena Wednesday.

The group reaffirmed a previous request that the Commodity Credit Corp. adhere to its present sales program of not handling more than 6,250,000 pounds of stockpile wool a month.

A ruling by the U.S. Department of Agriculture regarding incentive payments was announced at the meeting.

The ruling states that incentive payments covering the wool on feeder lambs cannot be assigned to a sheep producer to a feeder lamb buyer.

Some sheep producers on the committee had expressed concern over the fact that buyers of feeding lambs are making their price offers contingent on the sheep producer assigning over the incentive payment he will receive next summer.

The incentive payment will be made on the wool grown on unshorn lambs which the producer raises, as provided under the National Wool Act. The USDA has advised that such assignments are illegal and will not be recognized.

**MPs, Dogs Search for 82-Year-Old Woman**

TACOMA (U.S.) — Sixty military policemen and eight Scout dogs left Ft. Lewis Wednesday to aid in the search for Mrs. Mary Drawsky, 82-year-old Elma woman who disappeared Sunday.

Plans call for the party to assemble at Elma and search the Grays Harbor area. They will return Thursday if the woman has not been found.

## Noted Editor of Christian Herald Visiting in Salem

"Television, if used rightly, can be of great service in the advancement of religious principles," Dr. Daniel A. Poling, one of America's foremost churchmen, said Wednesday while on a visit to Salem.

Dr. Poling, for the past 30 years editor of the non-denominational Christian Herald, is here as guest of his brother, Dr. Paul Newton Poling, pastor of First Presbyterian Church.

The noted visitor, a native of Portland and from a family line that has produced nine ministers, is en-route to Asia with his wife, Mrs. Lillian Poling, to dedicate an orphan home at Hong Kong. Mrs. Poling also plans to visit Madam Chiang Kai-Chek in Formosa.

Dr. Daniel A. Poling, who attended the academy at Dallas, Ore., also is longtime international president of Christian Endeavor and plans to attend a forthcoming CE meet at Oslo, Norway.

"Advent of television gives the church great opportunity to spread the gospel over a larger area and with greater impact," commented the 72-year-old visiting church leader. However, he cautioned against using the medium unwisely.

The Christian Herald editor, whose national publication out of New York City has a circulation of about 400,000, said religious interest is steadily growing.

"More people are going to church all the time," he observed.

Another role of the visiting Poling is chairman of the chapel at Temple University. The chapel is a shrine for the four armed forces chaplains lost with the troopship Dorchester during World War II.

One of the four chaplains was Clark V. Poling, a son of Dr. Daniel A. Poling.

The reunion Wednesday evening at the home of Dr. Paul Poling featured a family dinner. Also present was Daniel W. Poling, a cousin and dean of men at Oregon State College.

Elmer Preachers

Dr. Daniel A. Poling, who said he always enjoys returning to his native state, is particularly proud of one fact. He has heard eight members of his family preach from the pulpit. He listed them as both his grandfathers, his father, C. C. Poling, former pastor of Evangelical EUB Church in Salem; an uncle, The Rev. David V. Poling, his brothers, Dr. Paul Poling and Dr. Charles Poling of Wickenburg, Ariz.; and his two sons, Daniel K. Poling, pastor of Port Washington Collegiate Church in New York City, and the late Clark Poling.

The Poling family has been curiously receptive to the given name, Daniel. Six of the family line carry it, but different middle names help avert some of the confusion.

Dr. and Mrs. Daniel A. will end their Salem visit today as they take a plane for the Far East.

## Hells Canyon Issue Brings Heated Debate

WASHINGTON (U.S.) — Sens. Watkins (R-Utah) and Neuberger (D-Ore) engaged in a sharp dispute Wednesday night over the truth of a Democratic charge that the Eisenhower administration wants to "give away" the Hells Canyon dam site in the Northwest.

Watkins called it a "baseless, election-year smear attempt."

Neuberger retorted that the administration is "leaving no stone unturned in its fight to turn over Hells Canyon — the finest water power site left in our country — to a private utility company for wasteful, partial exploitation."

This rugged canyon on the Snake River between Idaho and Oregon is the deepest river gorge on the continent. The question of how to develop it has become a focal and bitter issue in the national public-private power quarrel.

Watkins was the first man up as the Senate plunged into debate on a Democratic-sponsored bill to construct a high federal dam, FPC Upheld.

The Utah senator upheld as a carefully considered decision, the license the Federal Power Commission has granted the Idaho Power Co. to build, instead three smaller dams in the canyon.

It is a clear-cut question of the federal dam, or the private dam — either project would flood the other.

Watkins said the three-dam project would do virtually everything the high federal dam would do and at no expense to the federal taxpayers. He also said the private development would provide power for the Northwest by 1958, several years ahead of deliveries from a single high dam.

Neuberger, disputing Watkins, also declared that the White House "is using all resources at its disposal to maintain a solid lineup of Republican senators against the Hells Canyon bill. . . . concentrating the strongest and most dissident pressure of the entire congressional session."

"Extensive Probe"

But Watkins contended that the power commission, which he called an independent bipartisan arm of Congress, licensed the private dam "by unanimous vote. . . . after the most extensive investigation ever," and added:

"No committee or Congress can match the experience, know-how and informational background that went into the Federal Power Commission's consideration."

The issue became national several months ago when Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler urged party leaders in Congress to press for passage of the Hells Canyon authorization bill to bolster "giveaway" charges and help party candidates in the Northwest.

**Political Issue**

Soon thereafter the bills were approved by Senate and House Interior committees where they had been stymied for a year.

The "giveaway" cries were voiced after Douglas McKay, President Eisenhower's first secretary of the interior, withdrew his department's opposition to Idaho Power's license applications several years ago.

After the power commission issued a license to Idaho Power which estimates its three dams can be built for 133 million dollars, public power groups challenged the legality of the license in the courts, where action is pending.

Proponents of the federal project say it would add a million kilowatts of generating capacity to the federal power system in the Northwest and provide important flood control and other benefits.

Idaho Power contends its three-dam plan would generate as much power and provide as many other benefits as the more costly federal proposal.

## Possibility Seen for Met To Revive Opera Season

NEW YORK (U.S.) — A possibility appeared Wednesday that the Metropolitan Opera's cancelled 1956-57 season may be revived.

The hope grew out of day-long mediation efforts of Al Manuti, president of the big local 802 of the Musicians' Union.

The musicians are not directly involved in the dispute which led the Metropolitan Opera Assn. to cancel the season last night.

The Met management blamed the American Guild of Musical Artists, which represents singers and dancers.

Manuti said he hoped to "save the opera season" and an estimated three-million dollar payroll.

## Gov. Shivers Doubts Demos To Beat Ike

NEW YORK (U.S.) — Democratic Gov. Allen Shivers of Texas said Wednesday he knew of no Democrat who could beat President Eisenhower in Texas in this fall's presidential race.

Shivers jumped party lines to support Eisenhower in the 1952 election. Shivers recently was defeated in his bid for leadership of the Texas delegation to the Democratic convention next month.

He told newsmen he doubted that Adlai Stevenson could "carry Texas against President Eisenhower this year, but it will be closer than in 1952."

Asked if he thought some other Democrat could win in the state, he said:

"I don't know offhand of any Democrat with a possibility of being nominated who could beat President Eisenhower in Texas."

Shivers made his political comments, following an address to the Independent Grocers' Alliance.

He told the Alliance he favored dissent rather than rebellion against the U. S. Supreme Court decision on racial integration in public schools.

"It is not my purpose, now or ever, to attack the Supreme Court as an institution or to advocate rebellion against its decision," he said.

"I am not questioning the court's power to decide as it has, although I am questioning its judgment."

"There is a vast difference between dissent and disobedience. I do advocate and exercise the right of vigorous protest."
