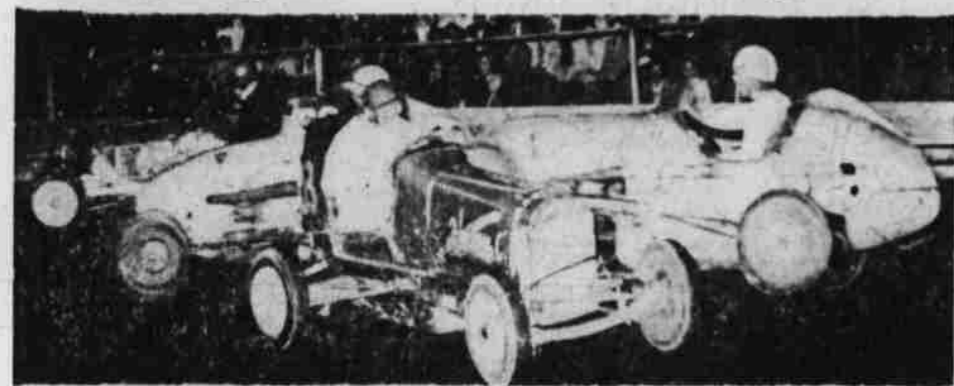


Homers Bring Victory to Redlegs; Braves' Buhl Blanks Phils 10-0

Yankees Up Lead To Eleven Games

A two-run homer by Smokey Burgess carried Cincinnati to a 6-4, 12-inning victory over Pittsburgh Friday night as the Redlegs called on their heavy hitters once again to keep within two games of Milwaukee's National League leading Braves, who thumped Philadelphia 10-0 behind Bob Buhl's two-hitter.

Burgess' seventh home run came off rookie Fred Waters, breaking a four-inning tie. Ted Kluszewski had walloped his 24th homer, with two on and Wally Post had socked his 17th to overhaul a 4-0 Pirate lead.

Third place Brooklyn, still six games back, lengthened St. Louis' winless streak to five games as Don Newcombe won his 13th, 4-1. It was big Newk's seventh straight against the Cardinals. In the lone day game, the Chicago Cubs beat last place New York, 7-4.

Ford Wins for Yanks
The New York Yankees opened up an 11-game lead, their best of the season in the American League run-away, as Whitey Ford won his 12th with a 6-2 decision over the Kansas City A's. Ford tied an AL record with six straight strikeouts while posting his 13th complete game.

Detroit belted fourth place Boston, 9-6. Raul Ibanez cleaved at Baltimore and Chicago at Washington.

Johnny Klippstein, fourth Redleg pitcher, won his eighth. The Pirates tagged starter Don Gross for six hits and their four runs in the first four frames. Tom Ackers, relief pitcher, fanned eight of the 15 men he faced.

Aaron, Atwell Homer
Hank Aaron, who drove in four runs, and Toby Atwell each socked two-run homers off Stu Miller as the Braves ran up a 4-0 lead in two frames. It was Atwell's first at bat since being picked up as a catching reserve. Buhl, who won his 12th gave up only a third-inning single to Gran Hamner and one to Richie Ashburn in the sixth.

Newcombe, who hasn't lost to the Cards since August, 1951, gave up five hits—including a home run and single by Stan Musial. (Cont. page 10, Col. 4)

Knights Reveals Stanford Payoff

SACRAMENTO—Gov. Goodwin J. Knight involved Stanford's old alma mater—in the Pacific Coast Conference athletic mess.

He said ex-Indian gridders, a "great many" in fact, have informed him they were paid for performing "licitious tasks" while attending and playing football for the university.

Knight's remarks, made at a press conference, drew a prompt suggestion that perhaps the governor had fumbled.

At Masters, Stanford's athletic director, said the governor "exaggerated the situation," that he ought to journey to Palo Alto "to see exactly what we are doing."

Masters, however, acknowledged that "there may be an occasional case where a boy is not putting enough time on his job."

The governor said Raymond B. Allen, UCLA chancellor, made similar charges against Stanford, charges Knight said were never denied.

Knight said "nobody is supporting dishonest tactics on the part of the students but we ought to bring everything out into the open."

The governor recalled he and others spoke out after the PCC slapped fines and suspensions on UCLA and Washington and that subsequently the PCC acted against USC and California.

He said everyone should protest against "unrealistic practices which threaten to destroy intercollegiate football."

Conference residents plan to meet next month in Portland and have indicated penalties, particularly player eligibilities, may be reduced.

Changes Suggested
Last week the governor said California schools should pull out of the conference and form their own. He also recommended changing the system of helping athletes.

"My purpose in my comments," he said, "was to bring some common sense into the controversy."

Knight made his PCC remarks after saying he wasn't avoiding the meeting of the University of California's Board of Regents later in the day. He said the agenda had nothing but routine items on it and that he had more important business here.

HUNTINGTON, W. Va.—Pat Lesser, the defending champion from Seattle, and Anne Quast, the medalist from Everett, Wash., proved the late pressure winners Friday to go into Saturday's golfing finals of the Women's Western amateur.

Two down after 12 holes in a see-saw semi-final match, the 23-year-old Miss Lesser won 2 up by taking four of the last five holes from Mary Patton Janssen, international competitor and British amateur runner-up, who cracked steady.

Anthony Stops Johnson in 10
NEW YORK (AP)—Lanky Tony Anthony stopped blinding punching speed and improved ability to take a wallop Friday night in stopping rugged Tony Johnson on a technical knockout in 1:36 of the 10th and last round at Madison Square Garden. Anthony weighed 170, Johnson 175.

Anthony let Johnson punch himself out with a wild attack early in the 10th and then pinned him against the ropes near his own corner for a unmerciful pasting until referee Mark Conn stopped it.

Johnson, crudely winging body punches out of a half crouch, refused to go down as he sagged into the ropes. The 21-year-old Anthony, an alternate on the 1952 Olympic team, rained at least 30 punches on his opponent before Conn intervened.

Anthony Pleases Fans
Although there was a solid Johnson box in the small turnout of about 1,500, the fans marvelled at Anthony's quick hands.

With Archie Moore more interested in heavyweights than in defending his own lightweight crown, it is possible that Anthony can become an important factor in the 175-pound division.

SPOKANE (Special)—The battle for first place in the second half Northwest league race between the Spokane Indians and the Salem Senators, a couple of first half also-rans, didn't get underway here last night as rain forced cancellation of the opener of their crucial four-game series.

A doubleheader has been set for tonight. Spokane manager Joe Rossi indicated it would be Bill Bottler (7-7) and the promising newcomer Bud Gaggero (2-1) for pitching duty for the league leading Indians.

Sensor coach Ron King apparently will go with rookies Andy George (10-3) and Jerry Cade (6-8). The youngsters each chalked up a pair of wins against Eugene in recent play.

King Handles Team
King will manage the Senators through Sunday's twin bill in the absence of manager-general manager Hugh Luby who remained in Salem to complete plans for some upcoming special baseball nights at the Oregon capital.

Cal Regents Order Study
BERKELEY, Calif.—The board of regents of the University of California moved into the troubled Pacific Coast Conference athletic situation Friday and directed that a study be made of the controversy.

A resolution also directed its committee on educational policy to study the athletic policies of the university, which would include both the campuses at Berkeley and UCLA.

First committee session is expected before the Aug. 6-8 conference meetings in Portland at which conclusion are due in the conference controversy involving under-the-table aid to athletes by alumni and booster groups.

Advisory Basis
Committee conclusions prior to the Portland meetings are to be considered "advisory" by the University of California president.

The regents committee on educational policy, composed of nine members, also was requested to study and report on general policy on football and related activities.

Such a report would be made Aug. 24 when the regents next meet in Berkeley.

Regent Brodie Alipport of Los Angeles objected somewhat to referring the study to a committee and said the group's accomplishments might be smothered and "the boys be under a bill of attainder" for another indefinite time.

Penalties assessed by the Pacific Coast Conference against California, UCLA, Southern California and Washington cost many football players a year's eligibility. The majority to date has been at UCLA, which also is under the direction of the California regents, and USC.

Wardy Statement
The resolution, adopted without dissent by the regents, stated: "Be it resolved that the regents authorize the chairman of the board to assign to the committee on educational policy all matters pertaining to the current athletic situation now before the Pacific Coast Conference, with the request that the committee study not only the current situation but also the athletic policy of the universities in general."

"The committee recommendation with regard to the current situation shall be advisory to the president (Robert Gordon Sproul), but it is not intended that his current freedom in dealing with the question now under consideration should be limited in any way by the recommendations or pending recommendations of the committee until such time as the regents have considered the report of the committee."
