200 Expected For NW Open

Mason, Prall Play First Round Today

EUGENE—The Northwest Open golf tournament, expected to draw nearly 200 players, opens Monday at the Eugene Country Club. The three-day grind will cover 72 holes, with the professionals shooting for \$3,500 prize money.

Ockie Eliason of Tacoma, the defending champion, will be here to defend his crown against some of the region's top swingers. The top contenders also include former-champs Al Zimmerman of Scotsdale, Ariz., and Eddie Hogan of Portland. Zimmerman is an ex-Portlander.

Bunny Mason Entered Among the other entries are Chuck Congdon of Tacoma, Eddie Draper and Ray Honsberger of Seattle, Joe Greer of Yakima, Al Williams of Medford, Bunny Mason of Salem and Bob McKendrick of Oswego.

Leading amateurs include Rod French of Spokane, Don Krieger of Portland, and Bob Prall, member of the University of Oregon golf team.

Monday's late comers were expected to boost the field to nearly 200.

Williams and Bill (Red) Eggers of Portland tied for top money in a Sunday sweepstakes which preceded the Northwest Open.

Williams, a 40-year-old veteran, came in early with a six-under-par 66. He paced the field until Eggers, one-time Portland Junior star, finished late with a card identical to Williams'. Eggers came up with a pair of eagles in his round, while Williams used only 23 putts in his 18 holes.

Green, the Northwest PGA champion, finished third with a 69. Tied at 70 were Harvey Hickson of Eugene and George Harrington, a Medford amateur. Mason and Farneth were knotted at 71 with two Portlanders, Tom Marlowe and John Hagey.

Eggers teamed with Portland's Jim West to capture best-ball honors in the pro-amateur event. They had a 63. Williams and his three Medford partners had 64s.

Stanford Grid Books Opened

PALO ALTO, Calif.—Eleven Palo Alto firms employing 41 Stanford football men readily spread open their records Saturday for an unofficial checkup on Gov. Goodwin J. Knight's statement that he had been told of rules violations by a "great many" ex-Stanford grid players. Sports writer Ed Schoenfeld of the Oakland Tribune, who made the check, said all 11 firms disclosed records showing athletes are paid only for time actually worked, in strict accordance with Pacific Coast Conference regulations.

The football men got good marks from their employers. Schoenfeld said, on a variety of jobs ranging from janitorial work to business-getters for sports shops.

Some Violations Noted: Some evidence of three-year-old violations by gridmen working for a motor car company turning up, the Tribune writer said, but Stanford, at best of the PCC, halted in 1953 the company's practice of paying the players a flat \$75 a month for a vaguely unspecified number of work hours.

Kroll Eliminates Snead in PGA Championships

Furgol, Burke In Semifinals

CANTON, Mass.—Ted Kroll, a tough little ex-infantry sergeant, cut down favorite Sam Snead in a grim, wordless battle Sunday 2 and 1, to enter the semi-finals of the Professional Golfers Assn. championship with two established champions and a young outsider from Utah.

Other survivors in the double round of eliminations over the dampened Blue Hill Country Club course were Ed Furgol, the lame-armed National Open champion of 1954; Masters champion Jackie Burke Jr., and tall, good-looking Bill Johnston, a 31-year-old teaching pro who is virtually unknown outside his own state.

In one of the most interesting PGA showdowns in years, Burke plays Furgol at 10 a. m. (EDT) Monday in the 36-hole semi-final with the remarkably relaxed (Cont. on page 18, col. 1)

Chiefs Sweep 2 From Braves

WENATCHEE—Wenatchee swept its 4-game Northwest League baseball series against Tri-City here Sunday night by taking both ends of Sunday's doubleheader, 2-1 and 6-5.

In another NWL doubleheader, the Lewiston Bronces took both games from the Eugene Emeralds. Lewiston edged by Eugene in the first game, 5-4, but exploded for 16 hits in the second for a 13-5 victory.

The Chiefs came from behind in both games, pushing over two runs in the sixth inning of the 7-inning opener on two walks and two singles and then scoring two runs in the last of the ninth on a triple and four walks.

The first-game victory gave Glenn Irsinghouse his 10th win of the season. Only homer in the two games was the solo blow by Bob Dureto of Tri-City in the fourth inning of the nightcap. It was his third home run in the last four games.

A walk followed by Bob Easterbrook's triple drove in the tying run in the ninth inning of the second game. Two more walks — the second intentional — loaded the bases. Then relief hurler Ev Aldridge walked Phil Marver, forcing in the winning run.

Redlegs Divvy Two With Pirate Club

By JOE REICHLER Associated Press Sports Writer Milwaukee's powerhouse Braves ripped off seven home runs, sweeping both ends of a Sunday doubleheader from Philadelphia, 8-7 and 16-5, to widen their National League lead over Cincinnati to three games.

The Redlegs had to bounce back with a 9-2 second game victory to gain a split with Pittsburgh after the Pirates had won the opener 6-4. Brooklyn's third place, Dodgers remained six games off the pace by downing the St. Louis Cardinals twice, 5-3 and 4-3.

In the other National League twin bill the Chicago Cubs climbed into sixth place by vanquishing the cellar-dwelling New York Giants twice, 4-1 and 2-1.

Yanks Split With A's The New York Yankees' first place lead in the American League was reduced to 9½ games when the Kansas City Athletics held them to a split while Cleveland was polishing off Baltimore, 9-0. The Yankees bounced back with a 13-4 triumph after Alex Kellner and Art Ditmar had combined to pitch the A's to a 7-4 victory.

Boston outslugged Detroit 8-4 and the Chicago White Sox defeated Washington 6-1 in the other games.

After a close first game slug-fest in which they handed Robin Roberts his 11th defeat, the Braves really went to town in the second game. Led by Bobby Thomson, Joe Adcock and Eddie Mathews, the Braves unleashed an 18-hit attack against seven Philly fingers including Granny Hamner, the veteran infidel-turned-pitcher for one inning.

Thompson had two homers in the nightcap, and Adcock and Mathews had one in each game. Adcock now has hit 11 home runs in his last 15 games. His season total is 21.

Home runs also helped Cincinnati gain its split with Pittsburgh. Gus Bell and Bob Thurman rapped two-run homers and pitcher Joe Nuxhall helped his cause with a four-bagger, his second of the season. Pittsburgh catcher Jack Shepard's two-run single in the ninth broke up a 6-6 tie in the opener.
