

\$2.3 Billion Appropriations Bill, Last of '56, Gains Okeh

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Appropriations Committee Tuesday night reported out a catch-all \$2.311,301,432 appropriations bill — last money measure of the 1956 session.

The House passed the bill earlier in the evening.

Poison Plot Against Children Told by DA

PORTLAND (AP) — Dist. Atty. William Langley said in a newspaper article Tuesday that he had learned a year ago of a plot to poison his children. He also said he was the victim of a blackmail attempt but did not retaliate because of fear of harm to his family.

Langley told of the plot in the second of a series of Oregon Journal articles, telling his side in the controversy over Portland vice conditions.

The Oregonian has accused him of plotting with Seattle gamblers to open Portland to organized vice.

In his reply, Langley said that the poison plot against his children had no direct connection with the current trouble.

He said that James B. Elkins, Portland nightclub backer, had come to him with "phony" tape recordings...between me and Tom Maloney and me and the late Gov. Paul L. Patterson. He said that the tapes had cost him \$10,000 but he did not ask me directly for the money at this stage. I told him to get out."

Elkins subsequently gave The Oregonian a number of tape recordings, and these formed the basis of the newspaper's charges. Langley said that he had not brought charges against Elkins because of his wife's fear and because of the "immunity" which Elkins holds.

The district attorney, said that some recordings seized in a May 17 raid on the home of Raymond F. Clark — an employee of Elkins — "demonstrate my innocence of the Oregonian's fantastic charges."

Langley said he would explain in Wednesday's article why he had refused to testify voluntarily before a grand jury investigating the charges.

NW Senators To Continue Power Fight

WASHINGTON (AP) — Six Northwest Democrats said Tuesday they are continuing in the Senate a comprehensive river development battle symbolized by the Hells Canyon issue.

The six — Sens. Magnuson and Jackson, Washington; Morse and Neuberger, Oregon; and Murray and Mansfield, Montana — said they are proposing an amendment to the Federal Power Act to define "comprehensive plan."

Magnuson said the amendment would be designed so that "the Federal Power Commission (FPC) may never again twist the meaning of the statute."

In a Senate speech Magnuson said:

"The FPC obviously ignored the meaning of 'comprehensive plan' as it has evolved over the past 50 years, and misapplied the statute in the Hells Canyon case."

"The FPC has disregarded the law. This amendment should prevent recurrence of any such disregard for the law."

The amendment "was made necessary," Magnuson said, by the FPC's licensing of the low-dam plan of the Idaho Power Co. for developing the Hells Canyon area of the Snake River and by the Senate's vote against authorizing a high federal dam there.

Magnuson said the amendment defines the geographic scope of "comprehensive plan" as "a river basin and its watershed," and calls for "optimum public benefit."

It has the additional proviso that "no projects shall result in an unnecessary limitation upon the multiple purpose use."

The amendment is being offered at this time, he said, so that it can be studied and discussed between sessions of Congress.

'Rivet Fatigue' Blamed for Air Mishap

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (AP) — Air Force investigators announced Tuesday that material failure, not an unknown object or aircraft, caused an Air Force cargo plane to go into a dive Sunday. The pilot was able to make an emergency landing.

The accident was caused by rivet fatigue in the plane's tail section, according to a board of investigators from Edwards Air Force base and Convair Aviation. The plane was a Convair C131D.

The twin-engine plane was flying at 15,000 feet, en route from Hamilton Air Force base to San Antonio, Tex., when its crew of four reported there was a loud noise. Shuddering, the craft nosed into a steep dive.

It pulled out at 7,000 feet and the pilot made an emergency landing at Kern county airport. There it was discovered that part of the left elevator control surface was missing.

Police 'Cool' Peddler Pitch On 'Hot' Items

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — "Hey, Bud, want to buy a watch at a bargain because it's 'hot'?"

A peddler made a tour of downtown bars here, and frankly admitted to prospective customers he was selling the valuable watches at the "bargain price of \$15" because they were stolen.

Police arrested the peddler, who confessed he bought the watches for \$5 and the "hot" angle was to make them more enticing to buyers.

He was released by police, who warned him to keep his merchandise "cool."

Stagecoach Tips; 13 Hurt

BUENA PARK, Calif. (AP) — A touch of the old west proved too much for modern folks Tuesday. A stagecoach tipped over at an amusement park, injuring 13 persons, none seriously.

It happened as the team was coming around the far turn of the half-mile stagecoach run at Knott's Berry Farm. The horses got going a bit too fast for driver Walter Johnston, 41, of Buena Park, and turned if the whole rig didn't flip over on its side.

There were nine on 17 folk aboard. Those sitting topside got the worst pitch. Seven children were among those treated for cuts and bruises at St. Joseph's Hospital in nearby Orange.

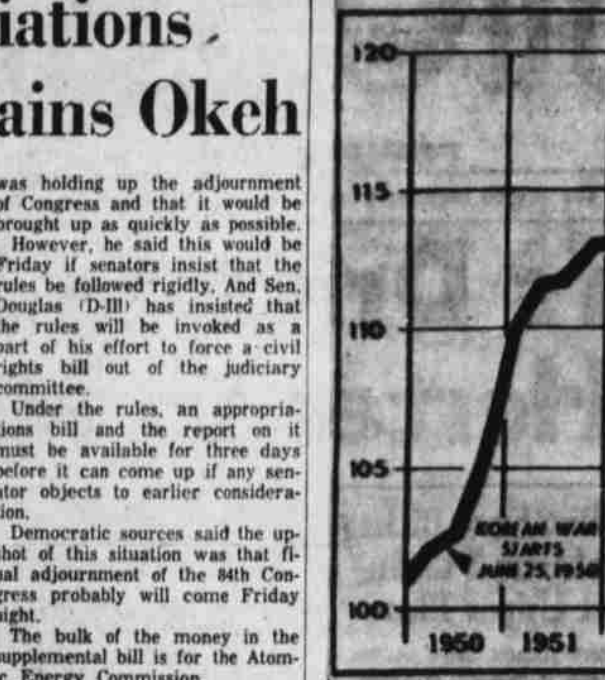

Omnibus Bill For Health Passed to Ike

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate passage Tuesday night sent to President Eisenhower an omnibus health bill carrying out several in the health field.

Sen. Hill (D-Ala.), who originally piloted the bill through the Senate last month, won Senate agreement to minor House amendments which completed legislative action on the bill.

The measure would:

Extend the Hill-Burton Act for two years to June 30, 1959. Under this law, annual appropriations of 210 million dollars are authorized for grants to the states for construction of hospitals, diagnostic centers, rehabilitation facilities and nursing homes.

Authorize five million dollars a year in grants to the states under a new program for training of practical nurses.

Authorize a three-year program of federal traineeship awards to simulate training of more professional public health personnel. Cost of the program in the first year is estimated at one million dollars.

Provide a three-year program of federal grants to training institutions to increase the number of professional nurses.

Authorize federal research and training grants to state mental institutions with emphasis on projects designed to improve operation of such hospitals for the care of the mentally ill. Cost of the program in the first year is estimated at \$1,500,000.

'Monster' on Alaska Beach Called Whale

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) — That shaggy "monster" lying on a beach south of Yakutat probably is just a sperm whale "turned upside down," E. I. Keithahn, curator of Alaska's Territorial Museum, said Tuesday.

Keithahn said published descriptions of "the thing" — the teeth, movable jaw, dimensions, knobby hump — generally fit the description of a sperm whale.

The "red brown hair" mentioned in several reports of the carcass is actually fibre-like material "common to the decaying flesh of whales," he said. Keithahn, who has not seen the animal, said positive identification could be made if he could get a specimen of the teeth.

The carcass has lain on a beach at Dry Harbor, 60 miles south of Yakutat, for more than two months. It is almost completely covered by sand. Estimates of its length, originally reported to be more than 100 feet, have gradually been scaled down to 60 feet.

Harry Percy, Longtime Area Nurseryman, Dies at Age 64

KEIZER—Harry Percy, Keizer Area wholesale nurseryman more than 30 years, died Tuesday in a Salem hospital apparently of a heart illness, at the age of 64. He had become ill last week and was taken to the hospital Saturday.

A 1916 Oregon State College graduate, Percy moved to Salem from Portland about 1920, after service in World War I. He bought the nursery farm near Clear Lake about 1924 and moved to the farm from Salem about 1927. He was known as a specialist in rhododendrons, camellias and azaleas.

He was a former president of Northwest Nurseries Association, officer of Oregon Nurserymen and member of Masons and Men's Garden club. He also was a member of the school board for many years.

He and Vivian Marsters, Salem schoolteacher, were married in Roseburg in 1926. Mrs. Percy died about nine years ago.

Percy was born Feb. 29, 1892, at Kelso, Wash., and moved to Portland at an early age with his parents, Joel and Mary Percy.

He leaves two daughters, Mrs. Ruth Ann Davies, Oakland, Calif., and Mrs. Martha Jane Tufts, Salem; sister Mrs. Hazel McClymont, Petaluma, Calif.; three brothers, Knight Percy, Salem; Earl Percy, Sumas, Wash.; and Frank Percy, Dallas, Texas; and one grandson, Jeffrey Davies, Oakland.
