Pries Barred After Ruckus

Squabble With Ump Brings Suspension

PORTLAND—A heated argument over an umpire's ruling in last Friday night's Wenatchee-Tri-City game led Tuesday to an indefinite suspension of Don Pries, playing manager of the Tri-City Braves of the Northwest League.

Jim Fleishman, league president, announced here that Pries would be suspended July 28. That date was picked, Fleishman said, because Tri-City fans had scheduled a "night" for Pries July 27.

News accounts of the game incident said Pries, incensed over a ruling by umpire Russ Fisher, butted the umpire in the rear with his knee as Fisher bent over to sweep off home plate. Pries, ejected from the game, denied he had kicked or kneed Fisher.

Kicking Not Mentioned
Fleishman said Tuesday that Fisher's written report on the incident said Pries merely kicked dirt between the umpire's legs as he swept the plate, but did not kick him.

In addition to the suspension, Pries was fined \$30, half of which resulted from another argument July 18 at Spokane when Pries charged the Spokane dugout.

Tommy Perez, who was thumbed along with Pries in the Wenatchee beef, was fined \$15.

Spokane Loses To Yak Bears

The Spokane Indians were lapped 11-1 by the Yakima Bears in their Northwest League baseball game at Yakima last night, but the setback failed to knock the Spokes from the top lead. They still hold it, by four percentage points over idle Wenatchee.

Yakima has climbed to within six points of fourth place Salem, and Lewiston is 11 points behind second place Wenatchee.

In the other game last night, Tri-City continued to make it rough on the sinking Eugene Emeralds, winning 5-2 at Eugene. The only two runs Eugene got came via a two-run homer by Cully Deck. Rick Scramaglia singled in the winning run for Tri-City.

Tacoma Divoter Tops Eugene Play; Salem's Prall in Third Place

EUGENE, Ore. — Defending champion Ockie Eliason, long-driving Tacoma pro, shot a 69 Tuesday for a two-stroke midpoint lead in the Northwest Open Golf Championship at Eugene Country Club.

An early finisher, Eliason's two-card card of 136 held up as the

large medal play field competed to qualify for the final 36 holes on Wednesday.

The first-round leader, powerful Rod Funseth of Spokane, slipped to a 74 Tuesday after his opening sub-par round of 66 Monday. A University of Oregon golfer from Salem, Bob Prall, was in third place with rounds of 69-72-141.

Duke Mathews, Eugene pro, shot a 72 for a mid-point total of 143. Sixty-four players qualified for Wednesday's final. It took a score of 156 or less to qualify.

Condor Six Back
Six strokes back of the leader at 144 were Chuck Congdon of Tacoma, and Yakima's Joe Greer. Each had identical rounds of 72-72. Three players tied at 145—Eddie Draper, Seattle professional, 73-72; Al Williams, Medford, Ore., pro, 74-71; and Harvey Hixon, Eugene pro, 71-74.

Eliason, now in a good position for top money of \$800, was the only player to break 70 in Tuesday's round. Wind carried many shots and the course had been opened to its full length of 6,800 yards.

The 33-year-old Eliason, who won the open last year at Walla Walla, twice chipped in birdies to overtake Funseth. The Spokane youth faded on the back nine for his two-over-par 74 and 140 total.

Redlegs Licked by Dodgers; Chisox Slice Yankee Margin

Johnny Logan's two-out home run in the ninth inning lifted Milwaukee to a 4-3 victory over the New York Giants Tuesday night and padded the Braves' National League to 3½ games over the runnerup Cincinnati Redlegs, who were walloped by the third-place Brooklyn Dodgers 10-5.

Sandy Amoros drove in five Dodger runs with a pair of triples and Duke Snider socked his 22nd and 23rd homers for three runs as Brooklyn raked the Redlegs and sent the Braves into the widest first-place margin enjoyed by any of the NL contenders this season.

The Braves now have won three straight — and 13 of their last 15. Philadelphia knocked the St. Louis Cardinals 7-3 and the Pittsburgh Pirates defeated the Chicago Cubs 6-2.

In the American, third-place Chicago White Sox trimmed the New York Yankees 11-3 to 8½ games with an 11-3 victory while the runnerup Cleveland Indians were mauling Washington 11-0. Detroit split a two-night pair with Baltimore, winning 9-7, then losing 11-5. Boston nipped Kansas City 3-2 on Mickey Vernon's homer with one on in the ninth.

There was no trouble whatsoever between the Braves and New York righthander Ruben Gomez, who had tangled with Milwaukee first baseman Joe Adcock in that hit-and-run romp of last Tuesday. Making his first appearance since the lifting of his three-day suspension resulting from the Milwaukee melee, Gomez took a four-hitter and a 3-2 lead into the ninth.

Then Hank Aaron tripled and scored on a doubleplay after Adcock had walked. Logan then broke it up with his home run, handing Warren Spahn his 10th victory and fifth over the last-place Giants. New York, losing six in a row and 15 of the last

18, had a two-run homer from Dusty Rhodes in the first inning. Adcock, hit by a Gomez pitch to start the fust last week, got nowhere against Ruben in this one. He grounded out, took a third strike and fouled out before the ninth-inning walk.

Amoros bases-loaded triple broke a 3-3 tie in the sixth for the Dodgers, then scored four in the seventh to salt it away. Snider's homers accounted for Brooklyn's first three runs, while Bob Thurman socked one for the Redlegs. Sal Maglie won it, squaring his record at 3-3 although giving 13 hits. The Brooks got 10 hits off loser Johnny Klippstein and two relievers.

Louis Aware Heart Ailing

NEW YORK — Mrs. Joe Louis said Tuesday the former heavyweight boxing champion had known for a month something was wrong with his heart, although at first he suspected he was suffering from an injured rib.

Louis, now a professional wrestler, was denied a license by the Illinois Athletic Commission when a commission doctor reported Monday the one-time Brown Bomber has a damaged heart.

When Louis first felt the pain in his chest, he visited a Detroit doctor and learned it was his heart. Mrs. Louis said before her departure for Chicago to join her husband.

She said that after the Chicago announcement Louis had telephoned her and told her he probably would quit the mat sport. He wrestled twice, she said, after learning in Detroit that it was his heart, not his ribs, that caused his pain.

In Dayton, Ohio, officials said Louis informed them by telephone he was cancelling a wrestling bout scheduled for Tuesday night.
