Eggs Make Main Dish Whenever You Like

Eggs make the main dish any time of year, but they're especially handy to serve when quicker meals are necessary, and rather light dishes are desirable—such as summertime of course. Omelets, rarebits, scalloped eggs and baked ones, souffles and boiled eggs—all have innumerable variations that make wonderful eating. Here's a recipe where the flavor's contrasting.

Sweet and Sour Eggs

1 tablespoon butter
1 small onion, minced
1 teaspoon flour
1/2 cup water
3 or 4 cloves
2 bay leaves
2 tablespoons vinegar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon sugar
12 eggs
Cook onion slowly in the butter in a saucepan, but do not brown it. Add flour and brown lightly, add water, seasonings and cook until smooth, stirring constantly. Simmer 15 minutes longer. Add vinegar and salt, pepper and sugar and as soon as sauce comes to a boil, add eggs one at a time, breaking each into a saucer and slipping them carefully into the boiling liquid. Cover and cook a few minutes as liked. The Scandinavians and great ones for using eggs as main dishes, and here is a good example of such a dish:

EGGS A LA GRETA

6 or 8 hard cooked eggs
1 package green peas (or equivalent in fresh)
3 tablespoons butter
1/2 teaspoon salt
Dash of cayenne pepper
2 tablespoons breadcrumbs
2 tablespoons grated cheese
Halve eggs lengthwise, remove yolks and mash or rub through sieve. Cook until tender, sieve. Combine with yolks and seasonings, fill egg whites with the mixture, arrange in a greased shallow baking dish. Mound up generously. Sprinkle with breadcrumbs and cheese, bake at 400 degrees for 20 minutes or until well heated through. Garnish with parsley. This should serve 8 persons. Eggs make dessert in this sweeter recipe use up the yolks from angel cake or meringues.

EGGS PIROUETTE

1 1/2 cups sugar
1 1/2 cups boiling water
1/2 cup butter
Make a light syrup of the granulated sugar and boiling water. Boil for 10 minutes. When it cools, mix egg yolks well with the syrup, one tablespoon syrup for each egg. After straining mixture, pour it into a pan which has been covered with burnt sugar. Cook in double boiler until a toothpick comes out clean. Chill and serve cold.
