

## Air Directors Said Overworked In Airliner Crash Killing 128

WASHINGTON (AP) — Too little authority and too much work for air traffic directors were blamed Saturday for the failure to warn the pilots of two airliners that they were bound for collision in a stormy sky.

The Civil Aeronautics Board heard testimony in the final session of a four-day public hearing on the collision last June 30 of a United Air Lines DC7 and a Trans World Airlines Constellation.

### Plasterers' Meet Told Labor's Role In Cities Climbs

All of the 128 persons aboard the two planes died in the collision and plunge into the Grand Canyon.

Transcripts of radio messages exchanged between the individual aircraft and ground control points showed this:

Upwards of thirty minutes before the crash, ground control points had received messages that both planes were heading toward a point over the Painted Desert, that both estimated their arrival time at the point at the same minute and that both were flying at the same altitude.

The question was why none of the several Civil Aeronautics Administration (CAA) control points in the general area — Los Angeles, Albuquerque, Las Vegas, Needles, Salt Lake — had sent advisory messages to the two captains telling them they were bound for unwitting rendezvous.

The first answer came from David D. Thomas, director of air traffic control for the CAA. He told the CAB investigators that controllers are responsible for

## Aly Khan in Court for 2nd Rita Divorce

GENEVA, Switzerland (AP) — Prince Aly Khan appeared at a private hearing in a Geneva court Saturday in the first stage of a second divorce suit from Rita Hayworth.

The action became necessary because Swiss and French courts refused to recognize Rita's Nevada divorce. This made it virtually impossible for Aly to remarry in any western European country.

Aly is reportedly planning to marry 31-year-old French model, Simone Rodin, known as Bettina. Aly still has a legal domicile in Switzerland and he and Rita decided to submit a joint divorce petition, on grounds of incompatibility. Such a divorce is relatively easy, but requires a "meeting of conciliation" at which—according to the law—an attempt is made to bring the couple together again.

Aly appeared at the "conciliation" and reportedly testified that he had no intention of becoming reconciled. Rita, since married to and divorced from Crooner Dick Haymes, was not required to appear in person at the hearing.

She has no residence in Switzerland. She was represented by Geneva Attorney Jean Pionier, who said Rita has no wish to be reconciled with Aly.

Final decision is expected before the end of the year.

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## Gov. Shivers' Forces Win Texas Battle

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—The forces of Gov. Allan Shivers, fighting back after their devastating defeat by senate majority leader Lyndon Johnson in May, Saturday night placed the question of control of the Texas Democratic party up to the Sept 11 state convention.

They did this by tying up 598 state convention votes, about a third of the total of 1,900 votes, in disputes in eight county conventions. Each faction will send delegates to the state convention at Fort Worth and the convention will decide which delegation will be seated.

With about one-half of the delegates accounted for, Johnson forces had 466 certain votes and Shivers' forces 201.

The September State Democratic convention will elect a new state Democratic executive committee for the next two years.

Gov. Shivers and the present state committee supported President Eisenhower in 1952 when Texas went Republican. The Shivers' forces in Saturday's county conventions sought to send delegates to the state convention who were not pledged to party loyalty.

## Attempt to Swim Across Erie Slows

SANDUSKY, Ohio (AP) — A 35-year-old Marine Corps reservist attempted to swim across Lake Erie Saturday, but when last reported he was making slow progress in the 33-mile effort.

Harry H. Briggs Jr., who has been stationed in Toledo, left Pelee Point, Ont., Saturday morning with Cedar Point, near here, as his goal.

During the day choppy waves impeded his progress, but by nightfall the waters calmed down and the four-foot waves dropped to two-foot size. He was making less than one mile an hour.

## Freighters Ram Near Suez Canal

PORT SAID, Egypt (AP) — The 2,031-ton British freighter Hendi was damaged in a collision with the 4,959-ton Polish ship Pokoj at the entrance to Port Said harbor Saturday.

Harbor officials said the Hendi's officers' cabins were damaged and that repairs will take about four days. There were no casualties.

The officials added that such collisions are common in the crowded waters near Port Said. The two ships were not in the Suez Canal when they collided.

## Klan Members Cheer Blast of Supreme Court

STARKE, Fla. (AP) — Masked and robed members of the Ku Klux Klan, including many women, cheered an unidentified leader Saturday night as he denounced the U.S. Supreme Court and described Gov. Leroy Collins as "one of the worst enemies of states rights in Florida."

The rally, witnessed from behind a roped-off area by 500 spectators, was held in an open field just south of this north central Florida city. About 125 robed figures attended.

Newsmen were permitted inside the barrier only after promising not to use names, Klan titles or make photographs.

The white robed speaker, terming himself a "Sunday School teacher," said the Klan members are "upstanding Christian and God-fearing people."

A 10-foot cross, traditional emblem of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, was in the center of the circled Klansmen.

The speaker directed a few acid remarks toward the United States Supreme Court. His comments were applauded loudly by those present.

The speaker termed the members of the nation's highest court as "the nine doddling old men in Washington, D.C., who want the races to mix and mingle and hug each other's necks."

## Mother of Abandoned Baby Found

ELDORADO SPRINGS, Mo. (AP) — The mother of a newborn infant abandoned after birth in an Eldorado motel Friday was found Saturday.

Authorities identified her as Mrs. Earline Lucille Foster, a 25-year-old Vernon, Ore., widow, who has been living at the home of an uncle in nearby Roscoe. She was taken into custody there.

Prosecutor Joe Collins said a warrant had been filed against her pending disposition of the infant Aug. 4 in court. Meanwhile, the child is being cared for at a nursing home. Collins said the baby boy was in good health, and indicated no specific charge is planned against Mrs. Foster.

She has three other children, 6, 4 and 1, and in a note left with the infant said she did not have the means to provide for them all.

## Woolson Rites To Draw Top Army Brass

Woolson, 109, died Thursday in a Duluth hospital from lung congestion.

The Pentagon in Washington said Saturday that a plane leaving Washington early Monday for Duluth will stop in Michigan to pick up Brucker, who is vacationing there.

Aboard the plane will be Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.), Rep. Blatnik (D-Minn.) and Asst. Secretary of the Army Hugh M. Milton II. The Army had announced earlier that Milton, Lt. Gen. Walter Weible, deputy chief of staff, and Lt. Gen. William H. Arnold,
