Sprint Record Broken Again

BERLIN—Pvt. Willie Williams, 24-year-old soldier from Gary, Ind., Sunday shattered the official world record for the 100-meter dash in the second round within 72 hours with a brilliant sprint of 10.1 seconds on a rain-soaked track.

Williams nosed out his buddy, Pfc Ira J. Murchison, a member of the Olympic team from Chicago, who equaled the 20-year-old official mark of 10.2.

Williams and Murchison, before the race, had expressed hope that they would win in a photo finish in the long sought time of ten seconds.

German track officials, accredited by the international Amateur Athletic Federation, held five watches on Williams as he broke the tape. All registered 10.1.

All juvenile hunters between the ages of 14 and 17 will be eligible to apply for shooting dates. Juvenile hunters must be accompanied by an adult.

Prall Takes Medalist Toga With 68 Shanty 1 Wins Seafair Trophy Race

Bob Prall, the youthful Salem golfer who will lead the University of Oregon links team for another two years yet, started on the victory trail towards his second straight club championship at the Salem Golf Club Sunday as he took medalist honors with a four-under-par 68 in the annual Seafair Men's Golf club tournament.

Prall, who as defending champ didn't need to shoot in Sunday's qualifying round, carded a 34-34 for his 68 total, one stroke better than the 35-34-69 turned in by Cliff Ellis. Because he did top the qualifiers for the championship trophy, Prall added the medalist honors to his mantle.

Thirty golfers shot qualifying rounds with 16 making the championship flight. One of the annual favorites, Jack Brande, failed to make the grade when he and Mike Raschke lost out to Del Gwynn in a playoff after the three had tied with 79s for the final berth.

Weston Wins Coast Golf Title

ASTORIA, Ore.—Steady Harold Weston of Portland won the men-under-40 title at the 46th annual Oregon Coast Golf Championships Sunday, protecting a 1-up lead with an eight-foot putt to defeat Ralph Dichter of Astoria.

Weston, a Portland Golf Club weekend player, shot one-under-par golf over a fast course in the playoff match. It was Dichter's third defeat in four title-round attempts to win the crown, and Weston's first major state victory.

The new champion made it just in time, for he will be 40 years old next Wednesday. Weston, at his best in match play, came from behind and moved ahead of Dichter with a 20-foot birdie putt on the 24th. Then Weston rammed in his vital eight-footer to halve the 30th hole and preserve his winning one-up margin.

Three other champions emerged from Sunday's finale which closed the eight-day tournament. Dr. Ed Palmrose, 43-year-old Astoria physician, shaded Ken Fields, 44, of Yakima, 2 and 1, to win the 40-to-50 title.

'Report' Clouds PCC Meet

Opening Session Scheduled Today

PORTLAND—Pacific Coast Conference officials, arriving here for Monday's opening session of the PCC athletic upheaval, declined Sunday to comment on a Los Angeles Times story of a secret report to come before the Portland meeting.

The three-day series of meetings will bring together the nine faculty advisors for athletics, who take official action for the conference, and the powerful PCC Presidents' Council. The faculty men meet Monday and Tuesday and then hold a joint session with the presidents on Wednesday.

These officials, here to "reach conclusions," will review athletic code violations and penalties charged against UCLA, California, Southern California and Washington. The four schools have been placed on probation and nearly 100 football players have been docked a year's eligibility.

In addition, the officials will study "self evaluation" reports from the member schools. Of the five non-penalized schools—Stanford, Oregon, Oregon State, Washington State and Idaho—some may be punished at the sessions here. Stanford has admitted violations but called them "minor."

The Los Angeles Times, in a story by Sports Editor Paul Zimmerman, said Conference Commissioner Victor O. Schmidt summarized the "self evaluation" reports of the member schools in a 47-page resume to be submitted at the Portland meeting.

Schmidt wrote that the significant evidence of athletic code violations by the five non-penalized schools, and said the five "disclaimed any knowledge of vital violations."

The Times' story added, however, that some of the members' reports were incomplete in that not all the alumni groups and (Cont. page 10, col. 3)

Harrison Wins All American Golf Tourney

CHICAGO—E. J. "Dutch" Harrison, Father Time of the golf pros, methodically battered back the bid of his younger colleagues Sunday to win the All American championship at Tam O'Shanter with a closing round of 67.

The wry-witted Arkansas traveler, who admits to the age of 46, thus became the oldest pro ever to win one of the Tam O'Shanter galas. His 72-hole total was 278, 10 strokes under par.

Harrison smashed out a 4-under-par 33 on the front side Sunday and returned in 35.

Stewart Nabs Second
Another club pro, Earl Stewart of Dallas, Tex., finished with a 35-36-71 for 280 and second place. He led the field by a stroke entering the last round.

The victory was worth \$3,420 to Harrison and set him up to aim for the \$50,000 prize accompanying the rich "world" championships that start at Tam next Thursday.

Stewart, 34, received \$2,360 for second.

Ed Furgol, the 1954 national open champion, grabbed third and a \$2,000 award with a finishing 35-36-71 for 281.

Jim Ferrier fired his second straight 69, good for fourth place at 282 and \$1,700. Jack Burke, with a closing 70, and Stan Leonard with 69, shared fifth at 284 and bagged \$1,375 each.

Suggs Tops Women
Louise Suggs of Sea Island, Ga., closed with a 3-under-par 73 for 301 to win the \$1,000 All American women's pro jackpot by two strokes over Joyce Zinke of Watford, Wis.

Wanda Sanchez, 26-year-old florist's assistant from Baton Rouge, La., took the women's amateur honors with 77 for 215. Rubie Jensen of Seattle was second with 217 after a windup 77.

Jim Hiskey became the new men's amateur champion, stroking a 74 for 296 and a seven-stroke edge over Walter Kolodziej, a metal finisher from Hobart, Ind. Hiskey hails from Pocatello, Idaho, and was a member of the University of Houston's 1955 national intercollegiate championship golf team.

Weird 6-5, 8-7 Nods Taken; Alderman Spears Both Wins; Vanni Protests Second Mix

The Salem Senators nailed both ends of an off-weird Sunday Northwest League baseball doubleheader at Waters Field, and hung onto their newly won roost atop the circuit standings. The scores were 8-7 in the seven-inning opener, 6-5 in the hectic nine-inning series finale, and Arlie Alderman, the hard-throwing rookie from Prineville who hadn't won a ball game since June 10, grabbed up both victories with relief appearances.

The two wins meant all four series games for Uncle Hugh Luby's Indians, and their eighth triumph in the last nine outings.

One of the Sabbath nods may not last long, however. Mgr. Edo Vanni played the second game under protest after a stormy rharubur with Umps Paul Kelley and Don Vandervort in the first inning, and according to the rule book, the loquacious Vanni will finally win an argument with the arbiters after all these years of fruitless trying.

Krause Starts Reel
The beef came when Mel Krause was on third base and a ground foul was hit in his direction. Mel was standing about three feet off the bag in foul territory, and unthinkingly grabbed the apparently harmless bounce. This brought an uproar from Vanni & Co., but after a deliberation to talk it over, Kelley and Vandervort decided it was nothing more than a foul ball.

Vanni then filed his protest, and it should stick, causing the game to be thrown from the won-lost records of both clubs, if league presy Jim Fleishman says so.

Baseball rule 7.08 "C" reads: "A base runner is out when he intentionally deflects the course of a foul ball in any manner."

The error by the ump's had a direct bearing on the outcome of the game, for Krause eventually scored on Russ Rosburg's single.

Kelley Overrules Van
Vandervort, who was umpiring Sunday in the sudden absence of Gordon Bogie, told after the game that he quoted the rule, but that Kelley overruled him.

However, Jim Fleishman has his final say-so, the game is a win for the Senators.

The protest was about the only thing Vanni's warriors did right all afternoon.
