A Portland man was sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary after he pleaded guilty in Marion County Circuit Court Monday to a charge of being an ex-convict carrying a concealed weapon.

Walter Alvin Reid, a 40-year-old laborer, received the sentence from Circuit Judge George Duncan. He had been held in the county jail since his arrest on the charge June 25.

Three Fined For Driving While Drunk

Marion County District Judge Edward O. Stadler Jr. imposed \$475 in fines in three cases Monday involving drunk driving.

The day's highest fine, \$200 was imposed on George Albert Peck, 45, Silverton, who pleaded guilty to the charge after being arrested by state police while driving along Highway 92E.

James Miller, 39, Turner, paid a \$175 fine. He was arrested by sheriff's deputies Saturday while driving on Highway 22 at Aumsville.

The third man was Willie Whitman Maynard, 54, Norfolk, Va., who was arrested last Friday on Highway 219 about 3 miles north of St. Paul. After pleading guilty, Maynard was fined \$100.

Burglary Case Turned Over To Grand Jury

Ervin Wayne Speer, 27, Aumsville, was bound over to the Marion County grand jury Monday after he waived preliminary hearing on a charge of burglary not in a dwelling.

Both Speer and Raymond Clarence Bashor, 43, Portland, were arrested Saturday by state police on a charge of breaking into a North River road service station. Speer was apprehended in the service station, while Bashor was arrested as he drove up to the station.

Bashor, at his District Court appearance Monday, requested a preliminary hearing, which is still to be set by District Judge Edward O. Stadler Jr. Bail was continued at \$2,000 each.

Fatal Mishap Blamed in Suit For \$20,000

A \$20,000 suit, based on an accident last fall in which two teenage girls died and three other youths were injured, was filed in Marion County Circuit Court Monday by the parents of one of the dead girls.

The complaint was filed by Wilbur F. and Louise Lesley, Stayton, parents of Gay Lesley, who was killed Nov. 29, 1955, on Highway 90E near Tangent when the car she was riding in collided with the rear end of a stopped truck. The suit charges negligence on the part of the Freres Lumber Company, Larry Freres and William R. Weddle.

The company is named as owner of the death car, Freres as agent of the company, and Weddle as driver of the car. Both Freres, who is the son of the lumber company owner, and Weddle were injured in the accident.

A judgment of \$20,000 is asked by the girl's parents who are acting as administrators of her estate.
