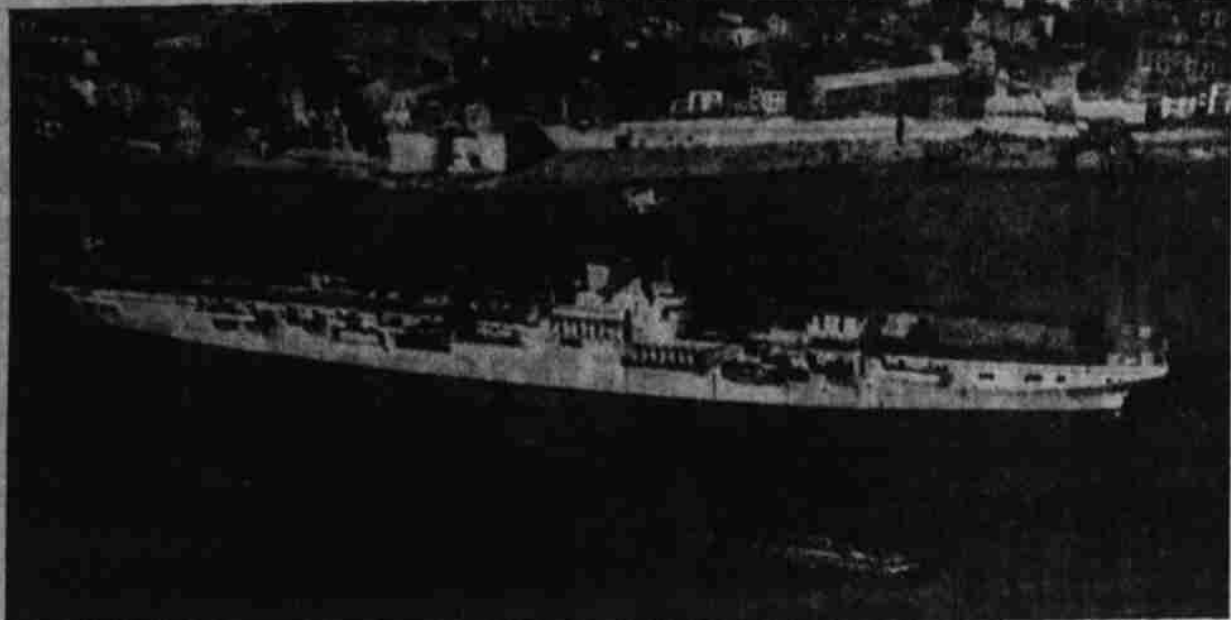


British Sea Giant Mediterranean Bound

Convicted Red Loses Plea for War Pension

WASHINGTON — The Veterans Administration said Tuesday Robert G. Thompson — convicted as a Communist leader in 1951 — has lost his final appeal for restoration of his pension for a World War II disability.

The VA pointed out that Thompson now is serving a term in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta on a Smith Act conviction, and added:

"The Board of Veterans Appeals held that this background and the speeches he delivered against the United States after the Korean conflict started, constituted assistance to an enemy of the United States."

A 1944 law prohibits disability payments to anyone who renders assistance to an enemy in time of hostilities, an agency spokesman said. The decision does not affect the \$30.15 the VA pays monthly to Thompson's wife and two children.

There is no further appeal from the decision.

Thompson contracted tuberculosis in the Pacific during World War II, and for a time drew total disability payments of \$150 monthly.

Kansan Loses Reelection Bid

Gov. Fred Hall of Kansas Tuesday night conceded defeat in his Republican primary battle for re-nomination. His concession came as his opponent, State Rep. Warren W. Shaw, built up a widening lead.

In Michigan, Detroit's Mayor Albert E. Cobo appeared to have defeated Donald S. Leonard, former state police commissioner, in a race for the Republican gubernatorial nomination.

In Missouri, lawyers Albert E. Schoenbeck of St. Louis and Herbert Douglas of Neosho were locked in a tight contest for the GOP senatorial nomination.

Hall's apparent defeat marked only the second time in 26 years that a Kansas Republican governor had failed in a bid for a second term.

In the Kansas Democratic gubernatorial primary, Harry Woodring, a former governor and longtime Secretary of War, was battling nose-to-nose with George Docking.

Sen. Frank Carlson was having little trouble in his try for re-nomination on the GOP ticket. Four candidates were entered in the Democratic senatorial nomination contest, and Paul Aylward, an Ellsworth lawyer, was leading on the basis of partial returns.

Gov. G. Mennen Williams, who was unopposed for re-nomination on the Democratic ticket, defeated Leonard by a wide margin in the 1954 election.

Portland Lists Multi-Million Property Deal

PORTLAND — The impending sale of valuable business property in downtown Portland was reported by The Oregonian in Wednesday's edition.

Virtually all downtown real estate of the Corbett Investment Co. would be included in the sale, the report said. The prospective buyers were listed as Henry A. Kuckenberg, Portland contractor, Paul F. Murphy, real estate investor in nearby Oswego, and "possibly some other associates."

The Corbett property includes the ten-story quarter-block Corbett Building, the Pacific Building, half of the Lipman Wolfe & Co. department store building, and a large parking garage.

The Oregonian said the property was valued in excess of \$6 million dollars, and that negotiations on the sale have been under way for some time.

Salem Pastor Reelected at Session Here

The Rev. William S. Deal of Salem was reelected district superintendent at the 17th annual conference of the Pacific Northwest district of the Pilgrim Holiness Church on the campground on Carlton Way Monday.

The conference also voted to open a new church at Lebanon Aug. 19, with the Rev. and Mrs. Roy L. Dworshack, formerly of Eugene, as pastors. Mrs. Dworshack is an ordained deaconess.

With the almost solid ballot for another two-year term for the Rev. Mr. Deal, he begins his seventh year as superintendent of the district covering western Oregon and Washington.

Other officers elected were the Rev. John J. Connor, Vancouver, Wash., assistant district superintendent; the Rev. E. W. Burton, Portland, district secretary; and the Rev. V. G. Story, Salem, treasurer. Advisory council members elected to complete the conference board were the Rev. Sherman Moore, Medford; the Rev. H. L. Solter, Portland; and the Rev. Floyd Morgan, Seattle.

Selected to lead the Sunday school promotional activities was the Rev. Leo Futrell, Marysville, Wash. Youth activities of the conference will be under the direction of the Rev. Jim Sheets, Aurora.

Legislation was passed urging pastors to augment the denomination's Forward Movement program by opening new churches and endeavoring to secure a 25 per cent increase in membership in the coming year.

The Rev. V. G. Story, Salem, district treasurer, reported that finances for the year had increased considerably over the previous year. The Rev. John R. Price, Silverton, reported for the statistical committee that there were increases in all departments of the church and Sunday schools.

The Rev. Paul W. Thomas, Indianapolis, Ind., editor-in-chief of church publications, presided at the conference.

Log Conveyor Mangles Leg Of Youngster

SWEET HOME — Necia Bowser, 9, suffered serious injuries Tuesday when her leg became caught in the hook of a logging chain conveyor. The machine had been turned on while she and her companions were playing in a lumber mill near here.

Her leg was mangled from the knee to the ankle, but hospital attendants said amputation would not be necessary.

The Benjo Milling Co. plant, where the accident occurred, had been shut down and no employees were there.

One of the hooks in the chain caught the girl's leg, pulled her along the conveyor and through a hole in the floor. It was necessary to saw through several beams in the floor to release the child.

1 Million Battle Typhoon Floods In Red China

HONG KONG — More than one million people are fighting a dangerous flood situation in Ho-peh province, Peiping Radio reported Tuesday.

It said nearly every river in the province is flooding because of recent heavy rains across North China.

Red China's State Council announced it is sending six teams into areas hit last week by Typhoon Wanda to study the situation and help in relief work. The typhoon's death toll, Peiping announced, is 2,161.

Demo Delegates From Salem Ready Departure for Chicago

Three Salem residents were busy making last minute preparations Tuesday night for their trip to Chicago as delegates to the Democratic National Convention next week.

Although they will arrive at about the same time, Jason Lee and Roy Hewitt, Salem attorneys and official delegates, and Mrs. Elmer Berg, alternate delegate, will leave at different times.

Mrs. Berg, who just returned Tuesday night with Mr. Berg from a seven-week tour of Europe, said she will probably fly to Chicago Sunday.

Asked who she hopes will be nominated, she quickly replied, "Stevenson," but she would not commit herself on her choice for the vice-presidential candidate. "I would be happy to see anyone get it (the vice-presidency) who will carry on the good tradition of Mr. Stevenson," she said.

Jason Lee was more certain of his choice for the two top government jobs. "I hope that it will be a Stevenson-Kefauver ticket," Lee declared. He also hoped the convention would end quickly. "To give me plenty of time for campaigning" for Congress.

Lee will leave by train today, topping for a day in Banff, Canada, and arriving in Chicago Sunday. "In time for the Stevenson reception for Mrs. Roosevelt," "I also will attend Harriman's reception Monday night," Lee said.

Roy Hewitt has plane reservations for Saturday evening. Hewitt said he will support a Stevenson-Kefauver ticket in line with write-in vote results in the May Oregon primary election. Hewitt, who will take a son and grandson with him on the convention trip, said he plans to attend the receptions for Stevenson and Harriman.

They met with Glenn McCormick, present holder of the KSLM permit.

Council Vote Due on Sports Center Plan

PORTLAND — A new proposal for settling the controversy over location of Portland's eight million dollar sports center is to go before the City Council.

As recommended by Commissioner Ormond Bean, the plan calls for a split development with a downtown convention hall and an exposition building in the Vanport area north of the city.

Bean also proposed a special tax to raise \$1,650,000 in the next three years. The money would be divided into three shares for development of the 640-acre Vanport site, for a harbor recreation area near Oaks Park and for improvements at the existing auditorium downtown for eventual incorporation into a sports center.
