

Cool, Dry, Warm Kids Expensive

Cost of keeping Salem school youngsters cool on the inside, warm on the outside and dry behind the ears runs into several figures, the Salem School Board decided Thursday night in awarding a series of supply contracts.

Wob Hill Laundry was awarded a one-year contract to keep schools supplied with 2,900 clean towels daily for physical education programs at five schools. The board took up the firm's offer to extend its 1955-56 contract for a rate of one and a half cents a towel for Leslie and Parrish Junior High schools and for North and South High schools. They decided to award the Keiser contract to the same firm at a two and quarter cent rate.

All in all, the contract involves laundering some 490,000 towels during the school year. Four other firms offered bids on laundering the towels.

Lots of Bad News

The board got \$5,635 worth of bad news from suppliers who bid on supplying the school district's fuel oil, gasoline and lubricants needs for the year, but awarded contracts to five firms who offered low quotations.

Major portion of the supply is for heating fuel oil with contracts going to Capital City Transfer. Price increases listed would boost the cost of the supply more than \$5,000, the board was told.

Deluxe Ice Cream Co. of Salem won all contracts for supply of ice cream, milk shake mix, ice milk and ice cream novelties during the coming year. The board chose to accept the two-year contract rates after determining it would save the district about \$1200 for the period.

Compromise Offer

Rising costs of transportation drew a compromise offer from the board for mileage rates on station wagon substitutes for buses. It approved an 11 cent a mile rate for persons furnishing station wagon service for use in Lincoln-Spring Valley-Zena, West Salem, Hills Ferry, Hayesville-Middle Grove-Auburn and special education.

The rate, up from 10 cents of last year, was half the amount asked by the drivers who also are paid bus driver rates for their time.

In other action the Board: Approved a contract with Salem Art Tile for furnishing tile for Parrish Junior High School.

Took under consideration a request for use of the North High gymnasium and auditorium for a Shrine affair scheduled for November.

Approved purchase of an International "actor."

Heard a state department of education recommendation that a covered break way be constructed to link the administration wing and the library of the new junior high school, decided to include intercommunication facilities in both projects.

Granted leave of absence to Mrs. Arlene Wilson, Keiser 7th and 8th grade teacher, and Mrs. Dorothy Claus, Highland 3rd grade teacher.

Approved hiring of Gene Bradford, 8th grade at Swope, Mrs. Ruby Jean Hammett, 3rd grade at Garfield, John A. Hepler, and Paul G. Arren, both Leslie Junior High School, and Miss Goldwyn Kulbel, South Salem.

Glen Schaffer, 443 S. 45th St., was taken to Salem Memorial Hospital by Willamette Ambulance Service where he was treated for a jaw fracture and facial lacerations. His condition was described as fair Thursday evening.

Lucky Welch, 333 S. 45th St., and Robert Williams, 745 S. Commercial St., were treated for lacerations at the hospital and released. Ambulance attendants said Williams also suffered an arm injury.

Stassen Sees Even Chance For Herter

WASHINGTON (AP) — Harold E. Stassen, pushing his dump-Nixon campaign, said Thursday there is now an even chance that the Republicans will nominate Gov. Christian Herter of Massachusetts for Vice President.

Stassen supplied this 50-50 estimate at a news conference. He said that when he started out July 3 on his effort to substitute Herter for Vice President Richard Nixon, the chance of a Herter nomination was probably only 1 in 100.

"I would say that the situation has been changing quite rapidly," Stassen commented.

Since July 30 Stassen has been on leave of absence from his White House post as disarmament adviser to President Eisenhower, to give his whole attention to his anti-Nixon and pro-Herter work.

The appointment was announced by Representative Herbert Bonner, Democrat, of North Carolina, committee chairman.

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Madras Area Train Wreck Debris Cleared

MADRAS, Ore. (AP) — Service was resumed Thursday over the Oregon Trunk line after crews cleared away the wreckage from a rock slide that swept seven freight cars from the tracks in the Deschutes River canyon 35 miles north of here Wednesday night.

Five of the loaded cars were carried some 300 feet down a canyon bank. Riding in one of these were three transients who escaped with sprains and bruises. James W. Smith, 36, Sacramento; Bill Hamilton, 42, Sacramento; and George King, 52, Stockton, Calif., were taken to The Dalles for examination, then booked for vagrancy.

Apparently a section of the steep canyon wall gave way causing the slide that struck the Spokane, Portland and Seattle train about 15 cars back from the locomotive. The train was northbound from Bend to Wahiama, Wash.

Capitol Visit Total Declines

Out-of-state registrations at the state Capitol Guide Service Bureau so far this year are approximately 10 per cent below those for the similar period in 1955, bureau officials reported Thursday.

Despite this showing, however, every state in the union is represented on the register along with a substantial number of tourists from foreign countries.

Records show that in legislative years the total registrations exceed materially those of other years. Capitol Guide Service is now maintained on a seven day a week schedule.
