

Harriman Given Red Carpet Treatment at Convention

CHICAGO (AP) — Gov. Averell Harriman of New York flew into town Friday, and the Democrats gave an honored political tradition a mild workout.

The tradition is that a covey of

backers should meet each candidate at airport or railway station. When he steps out, the holler and cheer and wave, thereby proving, of course, that their hero is best fitted to lead this nation. So Friday Harriman backers were out to welcome their man, and though the demonstration wasn't much by past standards — no brass bands, for instance — it did keep a tradition alive.

Shortly before Harriman's plane dropped down, a stage director hustled up and surveyed his cast of 50 or so. Each person had a standard bearing such admonitions as "win with Harriman" or "Harriman's our man."

Crude Signs
Curiously for a candidate who has been in the race as long as Harriman, the signs were crudely lettered with crayons, as if somebody had goofed and it had taken fast handwork to produce any signs at all.

"Hold your banners up," yelled the stage director. "Will you hold your banners up, everybody?" (As in a hayloft, i.e., political spontaneous combustion always is helped along if you sprinkle liberally with kerosene.)

"Wave, everybody!" said the S. D. "Yell!"
Whether or not he was satisfied with this brief workout wasn't clear, because the plane came in then, airline officials hastily rolled out the red carpet they save for these great occasions, and Harriman stepped out.

Banners went up, and the waves and cheers rolled out on schedule. Harriman came down the ramp, answered a few routine questions routinely, and reminded reporters he had a news conference planned soon.

"I'm not going to give you any scraps here," he said.
"And he didn't." This demonstration has been gone into in some detail only because it represents such a change from four years ago. In 1952, candidates at both the Democratic and Republican conventions poured into Chicago every hour on the hour.

Each was welcomed with varying degrees of frenzy, some of which was genuine and some simulated.
Whether real or somewhat phony, they did point up the thrill of a wide open race, with a number of candidates running for their political lives.

Little Excitement
But so far this year there has been little to equal the excitement or the foolishness, of four years ago.
Adlai Stevenson, the front runner, has slipped into town from

his suburban home without fanfare. His followers, though, are observing the other, quieter traditions.

The pretty girls, the paper hats advertising Adlai, the copious literature no one ever seems to find time to read.

A nice, placid scene, at least outwardly.
Still, the Democratic donkey always has been a lively, unpredictable critter. No matter how settled down it appears to be, it's always capable of some wild kicks yet.

Traffic Rolls
On Freeway
To Portland
Heavy trucks and trailers rolled across the newly-named R. H. Baldock freeway for the first time Friday afternoon.

The freeway, which re-opened Friday noon following a three-month closure, had been restricted to vehicles weighing less than 10,000 pounds, state police reported. The first heavy haulers were permitted on the road Friday.

There were no ceremonies as barriers were removed from the Hayville junction and near Wilsonville, opening the road for the first time since May 2 when it was closed to permit paving of ten-mile section including two southbound lanes.

State police said normal patrols have been resumed on the freeway. Patrolling on highway 99 through Woodburn will continue. Capt. R. G. Howard said about 60 per cent of north-south traffic is expected to utilize the freeway.

Baldock, former state engineer, was feted at a testimonial dinner in Portland Friday night. Gov. Elmer Smith and representatives of federal and state highway groups plus members of 20 other organizations honored the engineer. Chairman of the event was Charles A. Sprague, publisher of the Oregon Statesman.

Airman's Wife
Kidnaped by
'Russ Flier'
NORTH BRANFORD, Conn. (AP) — State police said Albert W. Dreppard, 28, an Air Force technical sergeant, was shot in the face Friday night by a man who invaded his home and apparently kidnaped Dreppard's wife, Grace, 29.

Dreppard, taken to a Middletown hospital with a .32 caliber slug lodged in his left cheek bone, told this story:
He and his wife were watching the All-Star football game on television when, about 9:30, a man who identified himself as a state policeman asked to use his telephone.

Once in the house, the man's attitude changed. He drew a revolver and told Dreppard he was a Russian flier who had been forced down, and that Dreppard and his wife were "lousy Americans."

The man was about 25 years of age, with heavy Russian accent, blond hair and was wearing black shoes, green trousers and a "tight" jacket.

Mrs. Albom was ferrying the car to Newport where her husband is an auto dealer, police reported. The vehicle was towed from the scene of the incident which occurred about 5 p.m.

Adoption of the little German girl was arranged for Mr. and Mrs. Floyd J. Miller, 515 Chemawa Rd., by International Social Service.

The Millers, tipped off by a nephew in the Army Hospital Corps in Nurnberg, started adoption of Rita Lou before she was born. The name, which rolls lovingly from Miller's tongue, was given by the parents-to-be.

Mr. and Mrs. Miller are both 48 years old. They have been married 15 years and often considered adoption but held back because of their age, Miller said Friday.

"My wife and I both come from

large families, and we both had the feeling it was much too quiet around here," he added.

Miller, who has been a Salem resident since the age of 15, has been a mechanic at California Packing Corp. the past 12 years. His wife, an Oklahoma girl, also has been employed there during canning season, up until today.
