Building Dips Below Oregon Figure in '55

Building volume in Oregon during the past July dropped somewhat from the same month a year ago, according to figures from Pacific Architect and Builder, Seattle trade magazine.

Oregon's July, 1956 total was \$12,149,348 compared to \$13,819,276 for July of 1955. The state's high point was the past June, which totalled \$14,141,212.

Heavy industrial construction in California pushed the five western states' aggregate building total during July 1956 to a record \$259,781,330—a figure 20 per cent higher than those for the same month a year ago. The record gain resulted despite decreases in Washington, Montana, and Idaho as well as Oregon.

California's July, 1956 total was \$215,396,983 compared to \$181,909,571 a year ago.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday at 10:30 a.m. in the chapel of the Clough-Barrick funeral home. Interment will be at City-view cemetery.

48 Planes Here in Air Fair; Crowd Below Last Year

Salem's annual Air Field held the stage Sunday at McNary Field as hundreds of persons viewed various types of aircraft, displays and demonstrations. Forty-eight private and military craft throughout the Northwest flew in for the occasion.

Officials said the crowd drawn for the event was less than the estimated 13,000 of last year. The affair was sponsored by the Salem Optimist Club.

What was expected to be one of the chief attractions—a C-124 Globemaster troop carrier—failed to show up from McChord Field at the last minute because of unforeseen commitments.

CAP Plane Topples
One minor accident occurred on the field during the program as a light Stinson Civil Air Patrol plane from Shelton, Wash., angled over while taxiing. Damage included a buckling wing and broken wheel but Pilot Richard Souliere was not injured.

However, a real note of excitement came in mid-afternoon when Coast Guard craft, including a helicopter, withdrew from the proceedings to answer an emergency call near Eugene where a Navy attack bomber crashed. Three men bailed from the bomber and reportedly escaped serious injury.

Demonstrations Made
Demonstrations were made at the fair by a flight of Navy Corsairs, by the helicopter, a Navy Heliopt fighter, and by a Coast Guard search and rescue crew. Other military craft were on display.

A special brunch for visiting pilots was held by the Salem chapter of the Oregon Sports Pilots Association.

The fair is held each year as a means of displaying the progress made in aviation.

Walter Hartley of the Optimist Club was general fair chairman.

Gervais Man Hurt in Wreck

James Perry Wells, 22, Gervais, was reported to be in fair condition at Salem Memorial Hospital Sunday following a one-car accident one mile north of Hopmere about 4:30 a.m. Sunday.

Hospital attendants said Monday evening that Wells had not regained consciousness. He reportedly received head injuries and face lacerations.

State police said Wells was traveling south on Highway 219 when his car skidded and rolled 635 feet.

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Combined Police Effort Solves 6 Burglaries at Woodburn, Gervais

Combined efforts of county, state and federal authorities resulted in the rapid clearing of six burglaries at Woodburn and Gervais 48 hours after the break-ins were reported, Marion County Sheriff Denver Young said Sunday.

"Good close cooperation between all branches in the law enforcement field" was responsible for the quick solution, Young stated.

The break-ins were reported to authorities Friday morning. Hit in the night-time raid were branches of the Bank of Oregon at Woodburn and Gervais; Thomson Hardware Store; Gervais; Pioneer Tavern; Gervais; Gervais Cafe; and the Highway Variety Store and sub-postoffice in Woodburn.

Cash, Stamps Taken
Approximately \$250 in cash and stamps were stolen from the six business houses.

Young said recovery of a Brooks safe in Abiqua Creek Saturday was part of a trail of clues which led to Ronald Eugene Huffman, arrested Saturday afternoon on a charge of burglary.

Huffman and a 16-year-old MacLaren inmate admitted taking the safe from Ann's Market, Brooks, July 24, Young said. They took the safe to Huffman's home, hid it and later beat open the door in a woodshed. Young reported that pieces of fire clay from the safe and tools used to remove the door were found at Huffman's home.

The sheriff also reported that papers missing in the Woodburn-Gervais thefts were found at Huffman's home.

Dumped Safe
Later the two youths took the safe to the Abiqua and dropped it in the creek near a refuse dump. It was spotted there by a fisherman who relayed the information to Silverton police.

Young said that the safe contained no papers.

The Woodburn-Gervais burglaries apparently had no connection with a gang of teen-agers which roved Woodburn early Friday morning.

Police in Utah Capture Killer

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—A 19-year-old youth gave himself up to police Sunday and admitted killing two persons and kidnapping two others in Salt Lake City during a night of terror Saturday night.

Asst. Chief L. R. Gresson of the Salt Lake City Police Department identified the youth as Barton Kirkham of Salt Lake City. Gresson said Kirkham signed a statement in which he admitted killing D. Avon Frame and Mrs. Ruth Holmes Webster during a grocery store holdup about midnight. Gresson said Kirkham shot the pair after he robbed the store of \$34.

Gresson said Kirkham also admitted kidnapping a Salt Lake City brother and sister and forcing them to drive him to Provo Canyon, 40 miles south of here, after the holdup.

House Turns Green While Owner Absent

FORT WAXNE, Ind. (AP)—Mrs. Ruby Boxell saw green when she returned from a weekend at the lakes Sunday afternoon.

The kitchen floor had turned green. The natural wood cabinets were the same color and the refrigerator had a green stripe. The living room—wall-to-wall carpet had green spots. And the kitchen stools, which had migrated to the dining room, also were green.

To greet Mrs. Boxell, proud of their handiwork, were the painters—two girls, 9 and 13 years old, who had walked away from a local orphanage the day before.

The contents of all the drawers in the house had been tossed onto the floor, but the older girl explained.

"We were going to clean up the drawers, too."

All of Mrs. Boxell's shoes lost their toes because they didn't fit smaller feet.

The girls said they had found the house door open. The paint was in the basement.

"What am I going to do?" Mrs. Boxell asked authorities.

"We just wanted to make things pretty," said the younger girl, over and over again.

Rescuers Still Fight to Reach Trapped Miners

MARCINELLE, Belgium (AP)—Rescuers trying to reach about 290 men trapped in a blazing coal mine since Wednesday sealed off the underground gallery Sunday in an effort to lower the temperature.

Earlier Sunday flames and smoke in the Bois de Casier mine 3,000 feet under ground subsided enough to let rescuers penetrate 50 yards. There they found a cave-in, according to Andre Van de Heuvel, chief of Belgium's mine administration.

An official statement issued late Sunday night said a water pipe system was installed before the gallery was sealed off "in an effort to lower the temperature by blocking off the hot smoke."

A German expert said Saturday there was no hope of finding any of the trapped men alive.
