

PCL Star Tilt Set Tonight

Strong Hitters To Favor South

PORTLAND — Southern hitting is likely to overcome Northern pitching when Pacific Coast League baseball stars meet here Monday night in the annual all-star game.

Top players from the four Southern clubs—Los Angeles, San Francisco, San Diego and Hollywood—will go against a hand-picked team of Northern players from Sacramento, Portland, Seattle and Vancouver, B.C.

It will be the 12th in the series, the South having won seven and the North four. The South is favored this year because of such sluggers as Steve Bilko of Los Angeles, a first baseman with his eye on the PCL home run mark. Multnomah Stadium, with its relatively short left field fence, has become a home run haven for right-handed batters like Bilko.

Bearden to Start
North Manager Bill Sweeney of Portland is expected to open with Sacramento's Gene Bearden on the mound. For relief duty Sweeney could beckon Rene Valdes, a 17-game winner and top man on Portland's pitching staff. Other North pitchers are Renold Duren of Vancouver, Earl Harist of Sacramento and Howie Judson of Seattle.

Seattle's Ray Orteig will replace Sammy Calderone of Portland as the starting catcher. Calderone had won the job but he hurt his finger in Sunday's first game against San Diego.

Scheffing Picks Hillman
Bob Scheffing of Los Angeles, the South manager, has named the Angels' Dave Hillman as starting pitcher. Others on the mound staff are Bob Anderson of Los Angeles, Russ Kemmerer of San Francisco and Luis Arroyo of Hollywood.

The game, scheduled to start at 8 p.m., will be in the stadium where Portland moved its home games this season after years in the old park on Vaughn Street.

A vote of Portland fans selected the first 19 players on the North team and Sweeney picked the remaining eight. Scheffing filled out the South squad after sports writers and sportscasters named the first string.

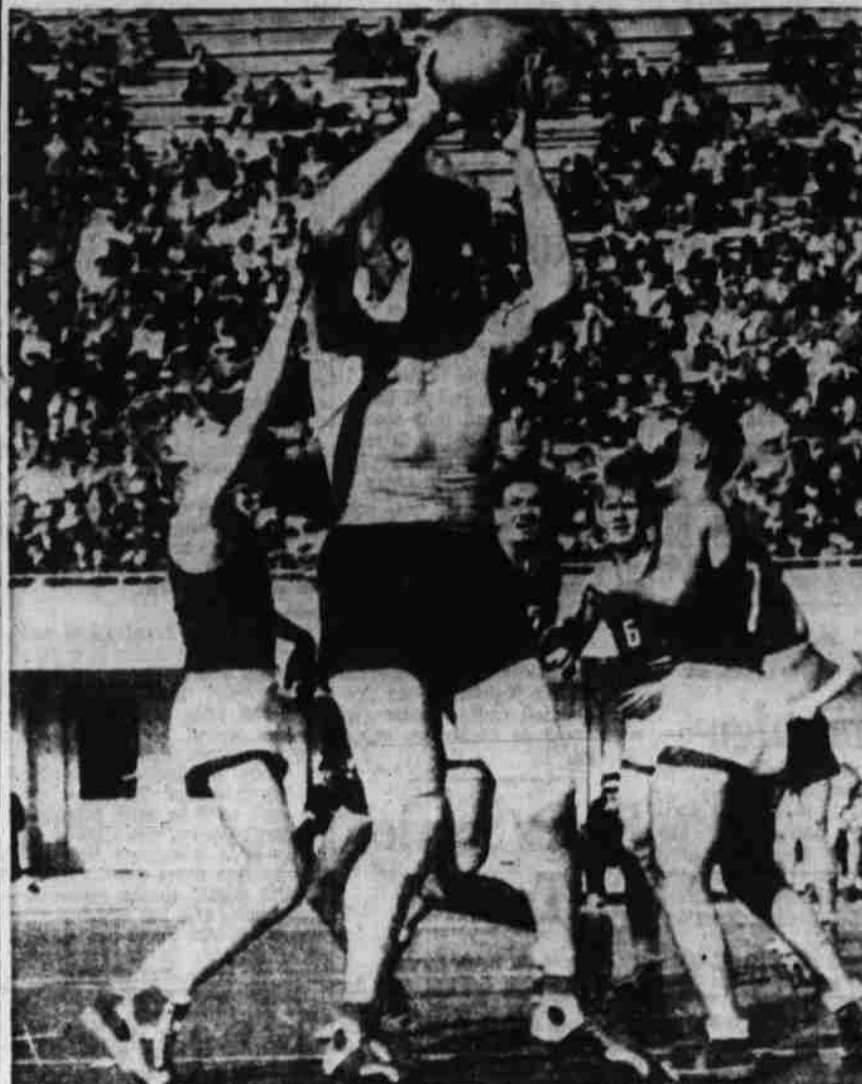

Reds Bow To Braves By 8 to 2

The Milwaukee Braves continued to withstand the ever-mounting pressure Sunday, defeating Cincinnati 8-2 for the second straight day to retain their game and a half advantage over the Brooklyn Dodgers.

The defeat dropped the third place Reds three games behind the front running Braves in the tight three-team National League pennant race.

The New York Yankees rebounded from Saturday's loss to Baltimore with a sweep of the Sunday doubleheader from the Orioles 6-2 and 4-2 to increase their first place margin over Cleveland in the American League to 3 1/2 games.

Tribe Wins, Sox Lose
The Indians walloped Kansas City for the third straight time, 6-3, in their single game. Washington made it two in a row over Boston, handing the Red Sox an 8-2 loss that dropped them 10 games off the pace.

Detroit thrashed Chicago's White Sox 6-2 to move a bit closer to its first division goal.

The Dodgers kept pace with the Braves, defeating Robin Roberts and the Philadelphia Phillies 7-3 in the rubber of their three-game series. Pittsburgh swept a doubleheader from the cellar-dwelling New York Giants 3-2 and 11-3. The injury-riddled Chicago Cubs played a scoreless nine-inning tie with St. Louis after defeating the Cardinals 6-2 in the opener of their doubleheader. The second game was halted because of darkness.

Burdette Posts Victory
Lew Burdette posted his 14th victory for the Braves, permitting the Redlegs only five hits, including Wally Post's 21st home run. Brooks Lawrence was tagged with his fifth defeat in 21 decisions. Bobby Thomson, Del Rice and Bill Bruton each drove in two runs for the Braves.

The Dodgers pounded four home runs, two by Carl Furillo as seven of their nine hits went for extra bases. Pee Wee Reese and Randy Jackson also hit homers. Roger Craig was credited with his 11th victory although he (Cont. page 10, col. 5)

Hubby-Wife Tourney Held

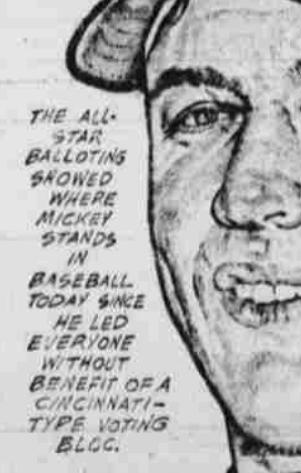

'World' Tourney Taken by Kroll With Closing 66

CHICAGO — Stocky Ted Kroll overcame his bridesmaid role in tournament golf with a flourish Sunday, threading his way through the traffic of an estimated 61,000 fans to score a closing 66 and cart off \$50,000 as Tom O'Shanter's "world" champion.

While other front runners folded under the pressure of trying for golf's most fabulous jackpot, the steady 36-year-old Kroll hammered out his fourth sub-par round, 32-34, for a 72-hole total of 273-15 under regulation.

It matched the lowest winning tally in the "world" extravaganza, Ben Hogan taking it with 273 in 1951.

He strung out rounds of 67-69-71-66 against the 36-36-72 standard in his greatest victory.

Fred Hawkins of El Paso, Tex., trailing Kroll 209 to 207 entering the last round, avoided much of the crowd as an earlier finisher and crashed through to second place with 34-33-67 for 276. It was worth \$10,000.

Exhibition Contract
In addition to the \$50,000 in cash, Kroll also signed a contract with promoter George S. May guaranteeing him \$1,000 each for 50 exhibition matches with 250 fans.

Third place in the "world" treasure hunt went to Robert DeVincenzo of Mexico City, Roberto, always a hot contender in the tourney, welded the best closing round of the day with 33-35-65 for 277 and \$5,000.
