

Stevenson Said Different Person Today From Unhappy Man of 1952

CHICAGO (U) — While crossing the street between the two main convention hotels the other day, Adlai Stevenson caught sight of old pal James A. Farley in the crowd, waved, and called out, "hello there, Jim."

Then, turning to one of his aides, he said, "I never forget a face."

This of course is Farley's own

celebrated line, his trade mark in fact. Stevenson was kidding. But while he may never be a Farley in the art of politics, Stevenson nevertheless is a very different person today from the unhappy figure of the 1952 Democratic convention.

Four years ago, he was unsure of himself and his role, tortured by doubts of every description. He wasn't even sure that he didn't like Dwight D. Eisenhower for President.

All that is gone. Stevenson is in there pitching for the nomination with everything he's got. As you watch him work, you are primarily impressed with his aggressiveness and air of confidence. He looks coolly competent, and seems to know exactly what he will do.

Whirling Dervish

He has been whipping back and forth between his various headquarters in Chicago like a whirling dervish.

As the state delegations came into town, Stevenson included their hotels in his itinerary. His principal office is in a suite on the 23rd floor of the Hilton Hotel. Between 8 a.m. and noon Monday, something over 100 people came to see him there, delegates, the governors of several states, a U.S. Senator or two.

He makes two or three trips downstairs daily to a huge, festooned reception room, open to the casual stroller. Pretty girls offer you literature and soft drinks and ask if there is anything else they can do.

Most of the people there are not delegates. They are sightseers and they can't help Stevenson get the nomination. Nevertheless, he tours the room beaming, shaking hands, dropping a quick quip or two.

What caused this transformation?

One of his top lieutenants—a man who took leave of his own business months ago to work for Stevenson—said the explanation lies in three or four developments.

"After the elections four years ago," he said, "Stevenson began touring the country, making speeches to raise funds for the party. We owed something like \$200,000 at the time. He got the money from those speeches to pay off the whole thing."

The experience itself was invaluable. He got a picture of politics and the party that he just hadn't had before.

"Then he went abroad, and he discovered that he had become a well known figure outside the United States. Prior to the campaign, he hadn't been well known even inside this country. He was impressed and flattered, naturally."

Until his health began to decline early this year, Dr. Williams had been an active resident in this community, center of intensive uranium exploration and milling activity on the Colorado Plateau.

MILL CITY — Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. Wednesday at the Presbyterian Church in Mill City for Richard (Dick) Kanoff, 21, who died early Sunday morning when a car plunged into Detroit Lake two miles west of Idanha. Interment will follow at Fairview Cemetery near Mill City.

Kanoff's body was recovered from some 40 feet of water about 12 hours after the 2:30 a.m. accident, which saw the vehicle plunge over a 100-foot embankment on the North Santiam Highway. Three companions in the car escaped with superficial injuries.

The body was recovered by two Portland "skin divers," Frank Chase and Leonard Bannister.

The four youths in the 1956 Chevrolet coupe were enroute east from Mill City at time of the tragedy. The other three were Clifford Swift, 28, and Phillip Goebel, 22, both of Mill City; and Floyd Lenscher, Lyons.

Kanoff was born Feb. 20, 1935 and was graduated in 1953 from Mill City High School, where he played basketball and football. He later went to Oregon Tech at Klamath Falls on a scholarship.

Surviving are the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Kanoff, Mill City; brother, Larry, Mill City; and grandmother, Mrs. Louis Kanoff, Mill City.

Holdup Tip Proves False

A tip that plans were afoot to hold up two Salem establishments resulted in a state and city police stakeout of the spots Sunday night. Officers said no holdup attempts materialized.

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Seattle Man Surrenders in Probe of Multnomah Vice

PORTLAND (U) — A Seattle man under indictment surrendered Monday as a final report was awaited from a grand jury whose indictments led to the arrest of 32 persons after a nine-week investigation of vice conditions here.

The Multnomah County district attorney and Portland's chief of police were among those indicted. Joseph P. McLaughlin, 38, co-owner of a Seattle card room, surrendered to the sheriff on seven indictments and posted a total of \$2,000 bail. He left to return to Seattle at once. McLaughlin had been sought on fugitive warrants issued in King County, Wash.

Indictments against McLaughlin accuse him of extortion, conspiracy to commit a felony, and committing acts disturbing to the public peace. He was accused of taking part in real estate speculation in connection with a proposed location of a sports and recreation center here.

Meanwhile, Dist. Atty. William M. Langley, indicted earlier on charges of malfeasance and conspiracy to permit gambling, won a week's postponement Monday for arraignment on a charge of assault and battery.

Turkey Group Planning 3 New Buildings

The \$270,000 expansion program of Oregon Turkey Growers Assn. revealed Monday in the cooperative's request to the City Council for permission to build in an unused street will result in three new \$90,000 buildings by next summer, William Geurts, manager, said.

The first stage is already under construction on company-owned property. It will provide a new process for chilling and aging turkeys recommended by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It will result in approximately a 30 per cent increase in the 100 workers now employed, Geurts said.

The entire expansion will approximately double the present capacity of the plant but the number of employees will not increase materially after the first plant goes into operation, he said.

The second new building will be a packing area. Most packing is now done at an ice house, Geurts said. The third will be a freezer. All the buildings will be one-story.

A-Reactor In Full-Power Record Run

WASHINGTON (U) — A history-making full-power run of more than two months by the land-based duplicate of the atomic power plant which propels the submarine Nautilus was announced Monday by the Atomic Energy Commission.

The reactor operated nonstop at peak capacity for more than 66 days and 66 nights on less than a single charge of uranium, the AEC said, and added:

"If the Nautilus itself had made a cruise for this length of time—1,600 hours — she could have steamed at top speed, submerged, around the world and many thousands of miles more."

The feat was accomplished by the nation's "first practical reactor power plant" at the AEC's national reactor testing station at Arco, Idaho.

The reactor, said the AEC's announcement, "was routinely shut down on Aug. 8, 1956, at the end of what is believed to have been the longest full power run ever completed by any type of propulsion plant — land, sea or air."

Purpose of the endurance run, the commission said, was "to prove the reliability and stamina of pressurized water reactors for ship propulsion."

It said data from the test will be used in the design of improved nuclear power plants both for naval vessels and civilian nuclear power plants."

Oregon Demo Group Jumps Behind Estes

CHICAGO (U) — Oregon's Democratic convention delegation Monday jumped enthusiastically to the task of transforming a Stevenson-Kefauver ticket into a winning convention combination.

As the convention opened formally, Sen. Richard L. Neuberger was prepared to second the nomination of Sen. Estes Kefauver as Adlai Stevenson's running mate.

Neuberger, delegation chairman, told the delegates at their initial caucus Sunday night that he felt a fellow-Tennessean should place Kefauver's name before the convention. His statement was in answer to talk that he might fill the nominating role.

CHICAGO (U) — Gov. and Mrs. Averell Harriman entertained Thursday night at a huge reception aimed at furthering his bid for the Democratic presidential nomination.

The social affair followed a day of politicking during which the Harriman camp professed to be encouraged by the number of state delegations which were postponing commitments as long as possible.

The Harriman forces took this as a sign that any handwagon move to front-runner Adlai Stevenson had been halted.

Harriman and his wife sent out more than 5,000 invitations to the reception, held in the Conrad Hilton Hotel.

Harriman and his wife, two daughters and a grandson stood in a receiving line. Inside the hotel ballroom guests were served sandwiches, petit fours and a fruit punch that a waiter said included "a touch of Burgundy."

Some of the guests were Stevenson or Lyndon Johnson campaign buttons.

Harriman spent most of the day visiting state delegations or receiving visits from groups of delegates in his headquarters in the Sheraton-Blackstone Hotel.
