

\$750,000 Fund Granted Oregon For Control of Water Pollution

The Federal government has allocated the State of Oregon \$750,000 for water pollution control, Gov. Elmo Smith said Thursday.

The Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, in a letter to Gov. Smith said \$647,135 has been set aside for Oregon for water pollution control construction grants and an additional \$102,865 for assisting the state water pollution control program.

Gov. Smith said the allocation should step up Oregon's program for cleaning up the state's streams by providing aid to cities, counties or sanitary districts which are either planning new sewage treatment works or expansion of present systems.

Consent legislation.

The federal funds are part of the \$1,000,000,000 available to the Bureau General in new federal water pollution control legislation.

For the first time, the new law incorporates the principle of direct federal grants in construction of sewage treatment works, Gov. Smith said.

The state, through its state sanitary authority, has major responsibility for approving proposed

plans and certifying that they conform with the overall state program of pollution abatement and control, according to C. H. Everts, state sanitary engineer.

Evert's office also will establish priorities of the grants.

Salem Group To Serve at GOP Confab

Six Salem persons are preparing to serve as members of the Oregon delegation to the Republican National Convention which opens Monday at San Francisco.

Gov. Elmo Smith, chairman of the state's delegation, will fly south with his wife Saturday from Coast City after attending the Coos County Fair. State Sen. Mark Hatfield, named to the convention platform committee, already is in the Bay Area.

Delegate W. W. Chadwick and his alternate, James D. Olson, will leave Saturday morning by train. Secretary of State Earl Sorenson, another delegate, and his alternate, Robert Elstrom, plan to enroute Sunday.

Wendell Wyatt, Republican state chairman, is vice chairman of the delegation and Mrs. Zylpha Burns, longtime chief clerk of the State Senate, is secretary.

In addition to Hatfield's platform committee post, three other Oregon delegates also have been assigned committee positions. They are Sen. Howard Belmont, county, credit committee; State Sen. Rudie Williams Jr., Portland, committee on permanent organization; and Newbury, who is a member of the rules committee.

The Oregon delegation will establish headquarters at the Francis Drake Hotel in San Francisco. Quarters for the group will be in the Francis Drake, Chancellor and Oxford hotels.

The convention itself is to be held in the San Francisco Cow Palace.

U.N. Agency Chief Visits Salem Home

A man who has headed the United Nations children's relief program in Korea and Japan for the past three years is currently a Salem visitor.

En route back to headquarters of the U.N. Children's Emergency Fund in New York after his service in the Far East, Irvin Markuson, 41, is a participant in a family reunion at the home of a brother, Kernan Markuson, 121 N. 4th St.

Though a native of Tacoma, Wash., the visit to Salem brings back memories for Irvin Markuson. He attended Willamette University for a semester in 1928.

The gigantic children's relief program in the Far East, commonly called UNICEF, handled distribution of food to hundreds of thousands of youngsters and nursing mothers under the administration of Markuson.

"In one year our program made available 40 million pounds of skimmed milk to 1,200,000 Korean children and 300,000 nursing mothers," said Markuson in a Thursday interview. "This included 60,000 orphans."

Thousands of children and nursing mothers in Japan also have benefited by the program, according to the visitor. He said that the many services of UNICEF include mid-wife training.

Every Nation

Markuson pointed out that funds for the program came from every member nation of the U.N. as well as from private sources.

"There is every hope," said the visitor, "that this program will continue indefinitely."

Prior to taking the administrative post with UNICEF, Markuson was a member of Gen. Douglas MacArthur's staff in charge of welfare work. He, his wife, and two children leave today for New York and reassignment.

Others at the reunion this week at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Kernan Markuson have been a sister, Mrs. Harry Van Every and family of Sacramento, Calif.; mother, Emma Jane Markuson, Salem, and Linda Markuson, Portland, daughter of the Kernan Markusons.
