Happy Estes Thanks Voters For Support

CHICAGO (U) — Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee appeared in person at the Democratic National Convention late Friday to thank the cheering delegates for giving him their vice presidential nomination.

The tall, ruddy-faced nominee was smiling and obviously happy at his victory. But he looked, too, as if he hadn't slept for a week — indeed he hadn't Thursday night.

Kefauver was dressed in a light suit, with a blue shirt and a light striped tie. His wife, Nancy, was with him.

Both were smiling and waving. They got an enthusiastic reception even though half of more of the delegates had left the hall as soon as the nomination was decided.

The hand played "The Tennessee Waltz" and "Dixie."

Kefauver told the delegates: "I don't know how all of you feel but I sure am tired. — back a long time ago I went to the University of Tennessee and I was on the track team. I've been in a lot of races but I have never been in one like this."

Kefauver described his chief rival, Sen. John F. Kennedy, as a "fine young statesman." He added:

"Every member that I had to contend against—the eight or nine placed in nomination—every one of them is able to perform this office better than I."

Kefauver went on to say: "I can only say that as a member of the team I shall do my best to hold up my part of the job."

Southerners Refuse to Vote For Kefauver

CHICAGO (U) — Smoldering resentment over Sen. Estes Kefauver's racial policies touched off a mass refusal among fellow Southerners Friday to support him for the Democratic Vice Presidential nomination.

Kefauver did not sign the manifesto in which Southerners in Congress denounced the Supreme Court decision outlawing segregation in public schools.

In one Deep South state, Mississippi, there was open talk Friday night of a concerted effort to refrain from voting for the Democratic ticket in November.

But there were few if any outright third party threats that might suggest a southern revolt like the one in 1948 which cost Harry Truman 30 electoral votes because of his civil rights program.

While Mississippi delegates crossed the Mason-Dixon line to cast their 22 votes at the Democratic convention Friday for Sen. John Kennedy of Massachusetts, there was a cry for a hurried meeting of the state Democratic convention.

Walter Sillers of Rosedale, speaker of the Mississippi House of Representatives, proposed a meeting of the state convention "to decide what we want to do — whether we will support the party in November or go fishing."

Of the 334 convention votes in 12 Southern states from North Carolina to Texas, Kefauver got only 50 on the second and final convention roll call for Vice President Friday.

HEAT KILLS OYSTERS

TSU, Japan (U) — Thousands of mother oysters, indispensable to the cultured pearl industry, are being killed off by a heat wave, the Mie Prefecture Marine Bureau says. This year the temperature has jumped to 91 degrees. Total loss so far this year is more than half a million dollars.

Widow of FDR Doubts Truman's Worth to Adlai

NEW YORK (U) — Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt said Friday former President Harry S. Truman's statements against Adlai Stevenson would make Truman's position difficult during the Presidential campaign.

Truman announced his support of New York Gov. Averell Harriman at the Democratic national convention in Chicago, and in a second statement said he didn't think Stevenson could win the election.

She left the convention early and took off from here for a European trip.

"People will ask him (Truman) 'what do you really stand for?'" Mrs. Roosevelt told newsmen. "It's going to be difficult after his second statement against Mr. Stevenson."

Adlai's Former Wife Titles Book 'Egghead and I'

LIBERTYVILLE, Ill. (U) — Adlai Stevenson's former wife said Friday she has been too busy writing a book, "The Egghead and I," to pay much attention to Stevenson's Democratic Presidential nomination.

Mrs. Ellen Borden Stevenson, who divorced the nominee in 1949 on the ground of mental cruelty when Stevenson was Illinois governor, said she dispatched a note of congratulations to him Thursday before the balloting began.

"I knew it was going to happen again," she said.

Mrs. Stevenson, 46, added that she has not changed her political stand since 1952 when she announced her support of President Eisenhower.

She said the diary passages suggested the title, and added that they were "political, but not very personal."

Mrs. Kirk of Salem Dies

Mrs. Iva Kirk, 330 N. 12th St., long-time Salem resident, died Friday at a Salem hospital. She was 85.

Mrs. Kirk was the widow of Walter E. Kirk, English teacher at Willamette University for many years. He died in 1937.

Born July 29, 1871, in Illinois, Mrs. Kirk was raised in Nebraska and graduated from Nebraska Wesleyan College in Lincoln, Neb.

She was a member of PEO for 60 years and was also an active member of First Methodist Church, the Women's Society for Christian Service, the American Association of University Women, the YWCA, the Salem Women's Club and the Willamette University faculty women's group.

Jet Engine Operated by Atom Energy

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho (U) — The Idaho Falls Post Register said Friday a turbojet aircraft engine was powered by atomic energy at the national reactor testing station west of here in January.

The paper quoted published testimony of Lewis L. Strauss, chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, made to an atomic energy subcommittee of the House Appropriations Committee June 13.

The paper said it was the first public disclosure that an atomic aircraft engine had been successfully put into operation.

Strauss was quoted as saying: "In January, a turbojet engine was for the first time powered exclusively by heat from an experimental reactor operating on the ground at our testing station in Idaho. More ambitious tests will follow."

The AEC office here and General Electric, which is engineering the reactor, had no comment.

Portland Vice Jury's Legal Status Eyed

PORTLAND (U) — Legality of Multnomah County grand jury actions were challenged in circuit court Friday.

This could include the current grand jury indictments from a vice and corruption investigation in Portland, although attorney James M. Hafey actually filed his motion on another case.

Hafey represents James S. Le-sueur, 18, Portland, held for grand jury action on a statutory rape charge.

Hafey asserted all grand juries empaneled this year were drawn from an improper list. He said the law calls for the list to be selected from both assessment rolls and voter registration rolls. He said the list instead came only from voter registration rolls.

Hafey also said jurors on the June panel were not examined individually by the jury commissioner and that prospective jurors were excused by someone other than the presiding judge.

It was the June grand jury that returned more than 30 indictments after its vice and corruption investigation. Included were indictments against Dist. Atty. William Langley, Police Chief James Purcell Jr. and Clyde Crosby, Teamster Union leader in Oregon.

\$50 Million Check Completes M & M Stock Transfer

PORTLAND (U) — Acquisition of the M & M Wood Working Co. of Portland by the Simpson Timber Co. of Seattle was completed Friday when a check for \$50 million dollars was deposited with a bank for purchase of stock and assets of M & M.

The trust department of the bank will distribute the money among M & M stockholders. They will receive \$35 a share.

Actual sale price was \$50,536,151.

M & M operations in Oregon and California will be integrated into the Simpson operations, which heretofore have been in Washington and California only. M & M operations involved in the transfer include a large plywood plant in Portland; extensive plywood and lumber activities at Springfield and Lyons, Ore., and in Northern California.

2 Ex-Cons Seized for Blinding Labor Writer

NEW YORK (U) — Two ex-convicts were seized by the FBI Friday in the wanton acid attack that blinded labor columnist Victor Riesel.

The government said the attack sought to prevent the crusading newspaperman from telling a federal grand jury about labor racketeering.

The FBI said the man who actually hurled sulphuric acid into Riesel's eyes April 5 was slain last month with a bullet in his brain. As many as three other gangland murders may lie in the background of the acid attack.

The slain man was Abraham Telvi, a 22-year-old Brooklyn hoodlum. The assault that cost Riesel his sight cost Telvi even more. Authorities said some of the acid splashed on Telvi's face. The tell-tale scars led to his underworld assassination because he was too "hot."

Telvi was said to have collected \$1,000 for the acid attack. But the big mystery was who put up the money. The government wouldn't comment.

The two under arrest are Joseph P. Carino, 43, and Gondolfo (Shiekie) Miranti, 37. Both were described as thugs in New York's garment district, where acid often is a weapon of intimidation or revenge.

The government said Carino set up the acid attack on Riesel, and that Miranti fingered the columnist to Telvi outside Lindy's Restaurant on Broadway.

Carino and Miranti were held in bonds of \$100,000 each after Asst. U.S. Atty. Thomas B. Gilchrist Jr. said:

"Their viciousness knows no bounds or limits... the actions of these men represent a brazen outbreak of mob violence."

Telvi's brother, Leo, 26, was held in \$100,000 bail.

Carl Francis of Dayton in GOP Convention Post

DAYTON, Ore. (U) — State Sen. Carl H. Francis, Republican candidate for state attorney general, will leave for San Francisco Sunday to be a sergeant-at-arms at the Republican national convention opening Monday.

It will be the first time Francis has attended a national political convention.

Oregon Steelworkers Agree to Contract

PORTLAND (U) — Oregon Steel Mills here and the United Steelworkers have agreed on a three-year contract giving wage increases and other contract improvements to 300 employees.

Lee Caldwell, a union official, said the increase amounts to 52 cents an hour over a three-year period.
