

City Church, Business Projects Gain Speed

Church, business and street developments in Salem gained momentum Tuesday night by Salem Planning Commission actions.

One of them gave conditional approval for a four-story addition to the telephone building on downtown State street.

Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co. had petitioned for permission to erect the additional building without providing more than its present 11,000 square feet of

off-street parking space in the area.

Commissioners approved a committee report favoring the telephone company's plan on grounds that the building would house mostly equipment, but final go-ahead was made subject to approval from the State Capitol Planning Commission because of nearness of the State Capitol.

Christian and Missionary Alliance Church received approval to replace with a new church the present old church building at 5th and Gaines Streets. Both this and the telephone building plan came under "variance application" procedure where planners' action is final unless the City Council recalls it and starts new hearings.

No Opposition
No opposition developed at hearings on two zoning change requests, both of which received favorable endorsement from the commission and headed for further City Council action.

One of these would extend the heavy industrial zoning for a large tract of former public housing colony land adjacent to Paulus Brothers Cannery which is acquiring the property for possible future expansion.

The other would be a one-lot extension of C-3 business zoning near Lee and Mission Streets, sought by Mason Chappelle, located on the south side of Lee west of Mission.

The commission favored a property owners' suggestion that Mason Street south of Pioneer Cemetery be renamed Saginaw Street, because it would be a logical extension of Saginaw. Both are a block west of Commercial in South Salem.

Procedural Matters
Zoners also took action on several procedural matters which have been under study. They proposed by resolution a change of meeting dates so that regular business meetings will be held on the second and fourth Tuesday nights of each month. Final vote will be taken on this plan Sept. 18. Now the commission holds a planning session on the second Tuesday and regular business on the third.

Members decided that submitters should be required to furnish a copy of plans being filed so that the commission staff can make sure no changes are made between the commission's approval of the plat-plan and the actual filing of them with the county.

Commissioners Appointed
Commissioners John Carlin, Stuart Compton and Chris Kovalevich were appointed by Commission Chairman Robert K. Powell to further a study of ways to better inform property owners of zone code provisions at time they are asked to sign zone change petitions.

The Hammel Street widening and annexation of that area were given a boost by the commission after another round of discussion of that area near Lansing Avenue in Northeast Salem. The City Council was advised to proceed with annexation procedure after accepting a strip of property from Anna J. Dardis that will permit 30- and 45-foot widths of the street at its west end, gradually widening to 60 feet at the east.

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Hoover Wins GOP Cheers in Freedom Plea

— Former President Herbert Hoover was cheered lustily Tuesday when he told the Republican national convention: "The greatest issue in America and all mankind is the encroachments of government to master our lives."

The 82-year-old Hoover got his usual rousing reception, with delegates whooping it up as he came forward smiling.

Dressed in blue, including a blue shirt with a soft collar instead of the usual heavily starched one, Hoover seemed to unbend in other ways too. For he smiled as young Republicans pranced by the lectern carrying banners with such slogans as:

Greatest Ex-President
"Welcome, Mr. Hoover, Our Greatest ex-President."
"We Love You, Mr. Hoover," and
"Stanford Welcomes Mr. Hoover."

The ovation lasted five minutes, and there was more cheering at the end, especially when Rep. Joseph Martin of Massachusetts, the permanent chairman, pinned on him a gold medal in honor of his service to the party.

Hoover told the delegates they should set forth a new "declaration of principles of American life" to keep the nation free and strong.

Party Prepared
He said the Republican party should have a "resounding" declaration instead of the "traditional" party platform. And even before he spoke, the party was prepared to follow through, in part at least.

Its platform committee was set to present a platform containing planks with the usual labels but introduced by a "declaration of faith."

Composed in Advance
The "declaration of faith," along with the other planks, were composed in advance by the convention's platform committee.

Drafted as the preamble to a document keyed mainly to current issues, the committee's "declaration" was marked by such statements of principle as these:

"Our government was created by the people for all the people, and it must serve no less a purpose."

"We hold that the major world issue today is whether government shall be the servant or the master of men."

"We hold that the Bill of Rights is the sacred foundation of personal liberty."

Hoover appealed for a statement along those lines with these words:

"Cannot this centennial convention of the Republican party, whose whole background has been the preservation of the freedom of men, make such a declaration?"

5,000 Greet Kefauver in Homecoming

MADISONVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Party lines were erased temporarily Tuesday as 5,000 cheering persons from east Tennessee, a Republican stronghold, turned out for the homecoming of Estes Kefauver, Democratic vice presidential nominee.

The town's most famous son gave a short nonpolitical talk from a platform on the Monroe County Courthouse lawn, then spent 35 minutes shaking hands and signing autographs.

Sen. Kefauver recounted his boyhood days in Madisonville, introduced his family, brought the crowd a greeting from his aged and ailing father, Robert Cook Kefauver, and warned that another Republican victory would endanger the Tennessee Valley Authority. His comments were frequently marked by enthusiastic applause.

The senator motored here from Knoxville, where he made a confident prediction earlier Tuesday that the Democratic ticket will carry not only Tennessee but the nation in the presidential election this fall.

For an hour preceding Tuesday's rousing welcome, Kefauver visited his father at the family home.

Mental Patient Search Centers in Clackamas Area

PORTLAND (AP) — Search for a man who escaped Monday from Morningside Hospital here swung Tuesday night to the Clackamas River area southeast of Portland.

The Clackamas County sheriff's office at Oregon City said it had reason to believe the escapee, Raymond Lee Dunlap, 28, a mental patient, might try to contact his family near the Carver community.

Ship, Dredge In Collision At Portland

PORTLAND (AP) — The steamship Olympic Pioneer collided with the pipeline dredge Wahkiakum in the Willamette River early Tuesday, causing considerable damage to the dredge, the Portland district Army Engineers office said.

The ship, owned by the Olympic Steamship Co., Seattle, was bound upstream. The dredge was at the mouth of the river.

Col. Jackson Graham, the district engineer, estimated damage at \$80,000 to the dredge's hull and frame. Additional damage to ladders and machinery was not determined.

The dredge master, Capt. John Oja, suffered minor injuries.

An investigation and hearing were ordered.

The ship was only slightly damaged.

Power Firm Drops Demand Charge Rule

Elimination of demand charges throughout the system of Pacific Power & Light Co. will take place immediately, it was announced Tuesday by Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heltzel.

The demand charge has applied to customers who heat by electricity, amounting to a surcharge in addition to the normal charge for energy.

Elimination of the demand charge will save Oregon customers about \$37,000 a year.

Among mid-valley communities serviced by Pacific Power are Shaw, Stayton, Aumsville, Jefferson and the Dallas-Independence area. The demand charge was dropped from schedules in Multnomah County two years ago.

Big AF Craft Crashes; 3 Die

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — A giant Air Force transport plane with six men aboard crashed and burned Tuesday night after its captain flew it from over a congested area to a vacant plot of land.

Three men were killed and three were critically injured, the Palm Beach Air Force Base reported. The injured were placed in the base hospital. Names were withheld until next of kin are notified.

A base spokesman said the pilot radioed the tower that he was facing an emergency and that he was heading for the open area.

The plane crashed from a low altitude, burned and blew up. It was in flight over the city.

Portland Man Dies in Crash

NAMPA, Idaho (AP) — Two autos crashed head-on in Nampa late Tuesday night, killing both drivers and injured four other persons, one critically.

Killed were Wendell H. Hillenbrand, 42, Portland, assistant terminal manager for Consolidated Freightways, and Berry Ray Duty, 36, Caldwell.

Hillenbrand's wife Helen and daughter, Sally, about 8, were in critical condition at a Caldwell hospital.
