

Possible City Water Service to East Salem Eyed in Negotiations

(Council news also on Page 1.)
Negotiations for possible city water service to the new East Salem suburban water district were ordered Monday night by Salem City Council.

Water Manager John Gerren said he had received overtures from G. R. Rootwright, engineer for the recently voted water district in the Four Corners and other east suburban areas. The

district is now drafting plans for its water lines and soon will have to decide whether to dig wells or develop other water supply of its own or to contract with the city for water.

Earliest Date
City Manager Kent Mathewson said water service could not be considered before summer of 1958, the earliest date at which completion of the new Salem wa-

ter supply line from the North Santiam River is expected.

Mayor Robert E. White, calling for investigation of the possibilities, admitted that aldermen would have to consider whether such a water service would tend to hasten or delay eventual annexation of the east suburbs of the city of Salem.

Recently the Council has vetoed individual water connections outside the city on grounds that such properties needing water should petition for annexation.

Along Same Lines
Consideration of the East Salem water problem would probably be along same lines as water contracts now in effect with a few outlying districts. These charge the regular city rate plus 25 per cent.

The city manager indicated that if the city favors serving such an area, it could work to require that standards for the pipe distribution system meet city standards. The additional water capacity from the new supply line financed by voter-approved bond issue would permit serving the outside area, he said, and the plan would add revenue needed to pay off the city's bond issue for the new line.

In other municipal business Monday night at the City Hall meeting, Salem's Council approved the three-lane traffic system for downtown State and Church Streets. This will mean changing to parallel parking on one side of the street in three blocks. The change was recommended by the Traffic Safety Commission.

Payment Voted
Aldermen voted to pay Leo Childs and Duane Gibson \$3,200 for land to extend and make official parts of 16th and Hines streets in Southeast Salem near the former public housing colony. Planning Commission Chairman Robert K. Powell said the public would benefit, especially since Hines offers the only railroad crossing between Mission and McGilchrist streets.

One annexation to the city was made official and another annexation proposal set for election. The Council officially proclaimed as annexed the 23-acre East Park Avenue area which voted 13-0 to come into the city recently. Set for annexation election Oct. 5, with polling place at the tractor company at 3310 Silverton Road is the Hammel Avenue area near southeast corner of Lansing Avenue and Silverton Road.

Zone change public hearings were set for Sept. 10 on two proposals recently endorsed by the Planning Commission. These would add M-2 heavy industry zoning for land adjacent to Paulus Brothers cannery and would create a one-lot C-3 business zone extension on south side of Lee Street near Mission Street.

Approved, over Planning Commission objection, a variance permit allowing Glen L. Clark to add a room, close to property line, on to house at 1655 Oxford St.

Set Sept. 24 hearing on plans for sanitary sewer in Market Street from Evergreen Avenue to city limits.

State-Supported High School in Tennessee Admits Negroes

A state-supported high school in Tennessee admitted Negroes Monday for the first time in the state's history.

At the same time the Virginia general assembly was handed a program aimed at giving citizens the choice of continued racial separation in schools or no state-supported schools at all.

A similar program designed to preserve school segregation goes before voters in Alabama Tuesday.

In Tallahassee, Fla., the protest of Negroes against segregated seating on public buses brought the arrest of the Rev. C. K. Steele, president of the Inter-Civic Council which is sponsoring a boycott of Tallahassee buses.

Without Tag
Steele was charged with operating a Negro car pool automobile without a "for hire" tag.

In Columbia, S. C., Gov. George Bell Timmerman Jr. leveled an attack on President Eisenhower for "racial mixing" in District of Columbia schools and on federal reservations.

Timmerman said a reconvened Democratic state convention he was sticking with the national Democratic party although he voted against the platform and the nominees. The South Carolina state Democratic convention was recessed last March to give party leaders a chance to size up results of the national convention.

Report for Classes
Negro students reported for classes at the Clinton, Tenn., white high school as police stood by to prevent trouble. Fifteen Negroes were enrolled to attend classes with 750 white students in compliance with an order issued last winter in U. S. district court.

A plea by John Kasper of Wash-

ington, D. C., that parents picket the school in protest brought his arrest on charges of inciting to riot and vagrancy. He was jailed under bond of \$5,000.

Pinza to Need Long Rest, Report Says

CERVIA, Italy (AP) — Singer Elio Pinza will require months of absolute rest although the stage and screen star says he feels fine, a member of his household said Monday.

Pinza was eager to resume his activities after collapsing three days ago from what his physician described as a mild heart attack. Mrs. Pinza told reporters Sunday he suffered a light stroke.

A member of the household said Pinza wanted to take a walk outside but his wife and a sister persuaded him to stay in his bedroom.

Dr. Celestino Scavellotti, director of the Cervia hospital, described Pinza's condition as nicely improved, and confirmed that Pinza will be able to sail from Genoa for the United States Sept. 2.

Portland State Work Halted By Confusion

PORTLAND (AP) — All was confusion Monday as contractors moved in heavy machinery to begin excavation for a new building at the downtown Portland State College.

Lack of a city permit delayed the project and not one shovelful of dirt was moved.

The public works commissioner hurriedly called a conference of college officials, contractors and architects to clarify the matter.

The college spokesmen said they learned only last Thursday that the project required a permit. Their application was delivered to the City Planning Commission Monday morning but it was too late to issue a permit.

Excavation may begin Tuesday under an agreement proposed by the public works commissioner.

Horse, Mule Numbers Dip

WASHINGTON (AP) — Could it be that old Dobbin, the horse, and Maude, the mule, soon will be as rare as grandpa's left-handed mustache cup down on the farm? It looks that way.

The Census Bureau reported Monday that the Dobbins and the Maudes definitely are on the decline—and fast.

A new count of horses shows there were 454,000 in 1954, down from 460,000 in 1950. And that decline, the bureau said, came on top of a previous record drop of better than 36 per cent from 1945 to 1950.

The census count showed 4,141,288 horses and mules on farms in 1954. That was a drop of 3,462,822 from the 7,603,910 in 1950.

Oregon Youth Missing Near Alaskan Peak

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (AP) — An intensive air and ground search was under way Monday for Wayne Berry, 20, who has been missing more than a week in the Mt. McKinley Park area.

Berry, an electrician's helper for the Alaska Railroad, was flown from Healy to the airstrip at Mt. McKinley Park a week ago Saturday. He planned a sheep hunt in the mountainous region east of the Kenai river. He carried only a three-day supply of rations.

The missing youth is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Berry of Klamath Falls, Ore.

He was flown to the mountain by James Smith, a private pilot and an engineer for the Alaska Railroad. Smith became alarmed when he returned to the mountain last Wednesday to pick up Berry and could not find him.

Vandals Hit Air Tower

That old city control tower at McNary Field is not improving with age.

Police said major vandalism discovered Monday evening in the unused tower's rest room included a broken sink, toilet bowl, window, mirror and the windows of an unused door stored in the room.

The destruction occurred some time since Aug. 12, police said. The building apparently was entered with a key.

Abandoned as an airport control tower three years ago, the city-owned structure is now used twice a week by the Civil Air Patrol, but the rest room is seldom entered, police were told.

Milton Pair Die in Crash

OLYMPIA, Wash. (AP) — An Oregon couple died in a head-on collision Sunday near Connell, Wash.

The state patrol identified the dead as Dean Records, 52, and Dottie Records, 46, both of Milton, Ore. Their car and a truck collided about five miles south of Connell.

Post Office Morale Said At Low Ebb

CHICAGO (AP) — Leo E. George, president of the National Federation of Post Office Clerks (AFL-CIO), Monday said morale in the post office is sinking.

Speaking before delegates to the 50th convention of the NFPCC, George asked for union-government relations in line with modern labor relations thinking.

"Postal Workers," he said, "are now on the bottom of the economic ladder, and with a rising cost of living they have only two choices—get out of the postal service entirely, or take additional outside jobs in order to maintain a reasonable standard of living."

The NFPCC, which has a no-strike policy, must depend upon federal legislation for the adjustment of grievances, George said.

One of the primary objectives of the convention, George said, is a legislative program to win recognition of the NFPCC in dealing with the federal government.

"This is necessary," he said, "if postal and federal workers are to receive pay on a par with workers of equal skill in private industry."

Three Men Perish in Fiery Crash

TOOELE, Utah (AP) — Three men died in the crash of their car as a gasoline tank truck Monday night at a highway junction nine miles north of here.

Officers said an unknown passenger motorist tossed a lighted match onto spilled gasoline before two of the bodies could be extricated. The resulting blaze cremated the bodies and took 2½ hours to bring under control.

It was several hours before the Utah highway patrol could issue a tentative identification of the dead. The three, all Salt Lake City men, were listed as Lee Lay Park, owner of the car, Tommy Lau and Lau Chin.

Expansion of Farm Credit To Be Outlined

PORTLAND (AP) — New federal legislation expanding farm credit services will be outlined by the Farmers Home Administration regional director at a series of meetings with Oregon and Washington office personnel of the agency.

K. W. Sawyer, regional director, said he will meet with county branch personnel between Aug. 28 and Sept. 27 to explain the new program. The meetings will precede acceptance of applications under the revised loan program.

The new legislation provides increased loan benefits for certain types of farming operations, Sawyer said.

Same Business, Same Building, Same Wife

Eugene Fire Chief Resigns

EUGENE (AP) — The resignation of Fire Chief Ed Surfus Monday climaxed months of discontent in the Eugene fire department.

City Manager Robert Finlayson read the chief's letter of resignation at a City Council meeting Monday night, and said he would approve Surfus' request that it be effective immediately.

Although Surfus did not attend the meeting, a number of firemen and their relatives filled the council chambers and overflowed into the corridor.

Unrest and discontent over working conditions became public knowledge last May after Eugene voters rejected a measure for a 56-hour work week for firemen to replace the current 72-hour schedule.

AF Orders Speed-Up in Jet Tankers

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force Monday announced a speed-up in production of jet tankers required to give intercontinental range to the strategic jet bomber fleet.

The tankers, known as KC-135s, are made by the Boeing airplane Co. of Seattle. The first of the new planes, which will eventually number about 400, are now nearing completion. They cost 4 million dollars each.

The Air Force announcement said Defense Secretary Wilson had approved the speedup which will result in a production rate of 20 tankers per month "substantially earlier than previously planned."

Air Force officials testified at the Senate inquiry into air power earlier this summer that they would settle for two tankers for every three B-52 all-jet atomic bomb carriers.

Idaho Border Slot Machine Arcade Due

CARSON CITY, Nev. (AP) — Despite objections that "we're just building another Las Vegas industry on the Idaho border," the state tax commission Monday approved a third slot machine arcade on U. S. 93 about 40 miles south of Twin Falls, Idaho.

The objection came from commission member Robert Allen, who declared that slot machines are just "an opening wedge" to more extensive types of gambling on the Idaho-Nevada border.

The commission has been steadfast in the past, however, in refusing to permit other than slot machines in the area.

Allen declared the establishment licensed Monday is known as Cactus Pete's and will be operated by Peter Piersanti of Contact and Arthur L. Gurley and Dale Curtis Wildman, both formerly of Twin Falls.

10th Juror Seated in Brink's Case

BOSTON (AP) — The 10th and 11th jurors went into the box Monday at the beginning of the fourth week of the million-dollar Brink's robbery trial.

Four more remain to be chosen before taking testimony begins. These four include two alternates.

So far no women have been accepted.

Constitution Party to Pick Tax Fighter

FORT WORTH (AP) — T. Coleman Andrews, former U. S. commissioner of internal revenue, probably will be named Presidential candidate by the Constitution Party Tuesday. Its officials said Monday.

The party is fighting for the repeal of federal income tax laws. Andrews, who lives in Richmond, Va., resigned his federal post in 1955 after two years as head of the nation's income tax system.

Thomas H. Wardell of California probably will be named Vice Presidential candidate by the party.

Party officials said that both Andrews and Wardell have indicated that they would accept the nomination.

Neither is attending the Constitution party national convention which opens here Monday.

About 100 delegates, supporters and alternates have registered for the meeting.

Mrs. Mary D. Cain of Summit, Miss., and Fred T. Spangler of San Antonio, both keynote speakers Monday night, blasted the Democratic and Republican parties for assiduously straying from the principles set forth in the Constitution.

"We have not the money with which to produce the great fanfare of the robber parties," Mrs. Cain declared. "But we have something that neither party can now boast—we have integrity. And we have the will to restore to the people of America their lost freedoms throughout restoration of the full glory of the Constitution and the Bill of Rights."
