Dulles Says Russia Swaying Egypt on Suez

Propaganda From Soviet Called Vicious

WASHINGTON (U) — Secretary of State Dulles accused Russia of waging a "very vicious type" of propaganda campaign to force Egypt to reject a peaceful and fair settlement of the Suez Canal dispute.

In blunt language, he charged that Russia alone of the 23 countries seeking to solve the Suez crisis was carrying on "this most salacious form of propaganda."

At a news conference, Dulles expressed confidence that Egypt's President Gamal Abdel Nasser "has sufficient influence and authority" to accept a reasonable Suez settlement despite Russia's attitude.

Nasser Praised

He praised Nasser for contributing to world peace by agreeing to meet with a five-nation committee which will seek to persuade him to adopt a plan for international control of the canal drafted at a diplomatic conference in London last week.

Eighteen nations, led by the United States, Britain and France, devised this formula despite opposition from Russia, India, Indonesia and Ceylon.

In denouncing Russia's Suez role, Dulles said Moscow began its propaganda barrage even before he explained the Western-backed proposals to Soviet Foreign Minister Shepilov in London, Imperialistic Plan

Arah language broadcasts beamed by the Soviets to Egypt, he said, sought to portray the plan as "imperialistic" and "colonialist."

Russia's propaganda blasts were continuing, he said, as of Monday with the aim of making it "extremely difficult for President Nasser to accept even a fair solution."

Chinese Note Says Craft One Of Chiang's

WASHINGTON (U) — Secretary of State Dulles reported Tuesday Red China has acknowledged its fighter pilots shot down an aircraft of the Red Chinese coast last Thursday — the same day a U.S. Navy patrol plane was shot down in the Pacific.

While the Communist note admitted downing a plane, Dulles said, it repeated the claim that it was a Chinese Nationalist aircraft and not a Navy plane.

Questioned about survivors, Dulles said the note was "entirely negative with respect to survivors," and he concluded there were none.

16 Men Aboard

The Navy's Mercator patrol plane had 16 men aboard. Searchers recovered only one bullet-ridden body and a few pieces of wreckage.

Dulles, faced with new demands that the United States take strong action against Red China in connection with the incident, said the government would announce what action it plans when all the facts are available.

Criticism of both Dulles and President Eisenhower for not filing a formal protest with Red China over the downing of the Navy plane, came from Rep. Celler (D-N.Y.).

No Uncertain Terms

"Protests in no uncertain terms" should be "the very minimum action taken," he said.

"Otherwise," Celler maintained, "we could well be accused of being afraid to speak our minds."

Pair Held in House Prowls At Woodburn

WOODBURN — Two 17-year-old California boys were held Tuesday night in city jail in connection with two house entries in Woodburn Tuesday morning.

The boys admitted the entries and told of 12 similar incidents in Redding, Calif., Ashland and Eugene, according to Police Chief Leonard Fuller. One of the boys gave his home as Redding while the other said he was from Nampa.

Fuller caught the boys hiding in the slough between Young and Cleveland streets shortly after a report from Miss Mabel Livesey, 492 Young St., that a strange youth had entered her house while another had engaged her in conversation in her garden about 9 a.m. She said she heard the boy upstairs when she entered her basement and, shouting to ask who was there, apparently scared him away.

The nearby home of Mrs. Fred Anderson, 411 Broadway, was entered a short time later in the same manner, one boy holding Mrs. Anderson in conversation outside, and 58 was later found to be missing, Fuller said.

Baby Nurse Mum on Three Infants' Deaths

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (U) — An Amazonian baby nurse, who told police she shook three infants to death in a fit of temper, suddenly fell silent Tuesday at a corner's inquest.

The nurse, 33-year-old Virginia B. Jaspers, refused to testify on advice of counsel, who asked that she first receive a psychiatric examination.

The inquest was adjourned indefinitely while the 6-foot, 220-pound blonde woman remained in county jail under \$50,000 bond.

Police said the nurse also admitted injuring two other infants. Additionally, detectives were investigating five other complaints from parents who said their children were injured while in the care of Miss Jasper.

The complaints were telephoned to police after the bizarre case received nationwide publicity. One complainant, a former New Haven man who lives in Detroit, said his child is mentally retarded. He did not attempt to connect that with the injury he said the child received while under Miss Jaspers' care. At the time, the child was three weeks old.

Famed Globe Trotter Dies

CRAMERTON, N.C. (U) — George Holden Tinkham, 86, Boston's bearded barrister and globe trotter, died Tuesday in his sleep at the Cramerton home of a sister, Mrs. Stuart W. Cramer Sr. He had served 14 terms in the U.S. House of Representatives.

He had been visiting his sister since returning from Europe last June. He had not been ill.

The funeral will be at St. Emanuel Episcopal Church in Boston Friday afternoon.

A descendant of a Mayflower family, he represented the 11th Massachusetts District— including Back Bay and fashionable Newton—from 1915 to 1943, when he retired from politics.

It was as a visiting congressman that Tinkham fired the first American shot against the Austrians after the United States declared war against the Central Powers in 1917.

He made more than 30 trips abroad, many to Africa where his safari off the tourist track enabled him to study tribal life, one of his hobbies.

'Mutt, Jeff' Strip Creator Leaves \$548,027 Estate

NEW YORK (U) — Cartoonist Harry C. (Bud) Fisher, creator of "Mutt and Jeff," left a net estate of \$548,027, an estate tax appraisal disclosed Tuesday.

Fisher's gross assets at the time of his death in 1954 totaled \$964,532, including his interest in the "Mutt and Jeff" and "Cicero the Cat" comic strips. Debts of more than \$350,000 and other deductions reduced the net figure.

Papers filed indicated Fisher's estranged wife, Edith Otto Rich, will get half the net estate, while the Salvation Army and American National Red Cross will receive \$131,876 each.

PORTLAND (U) — A Troutdale grocer-dairyman has given the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children here a 96-acre farm for use as a convalescent home or hospital for youngsters.

The will of Herman Blaser, 82-year-old bachelor, filed for probate Monday stipulated, however, that the gift could be used for any other purpose if approved by the hospital corporation.

Blaser's estate was valued at \$50,000. His own home and two acres of land were given to his housekeeper.

AMSTERDAM (U) — Queen Juliana, Prince Bernhard and their two eldest daughters, Princess Beatrix and Irene, arrived from Greece by plane Tuesday. Prince Bernhard took the controls of the DCA for part of the flight.

The royal couple had flown to Corfu to meet their daughters, who had sailed from Venice on a cruise organized by King Paul and Queen Frederika of Greece.

In an announcement issued in The Hague Friday, Juliana and Bernhard said they had solved "difficulties which had arisen."

Eugene Inn Near Campus To Stay Dry

EUGENE (U) — The College Side Inn lost its attempt Monday night before the City Council to penetrate the "dry" zone around the University of Oregon campus.

The council turned down the request of the inn operators for a beer license. The inn is within the boundaries established by the state Liquor Control Commission several years ago where no beer or liquor licenses would be sold.

University President O. Meredith Wilson told the Council that effects of the zone have been "genuine and considerable" in reducing drinking and disciplinary problems. He said the zone is part of the university's program of "institutional discouragement" of drinking by students.

Atty. Charles Porter read a letter from the inn operators saying the university administrators should be required to prove that the dry zone cuts down student drinking.

15-Year-Old Hurt in Crash

INDEPENDENCE, Ore. (U) — A 15-year-old Hanna ranch resident was in Salem Memorial Hospital with head lacerations Tuesday night after the car in which he was riding rammed into a cement culvert abutment. He fell into the culvert on stepping out of the car, officers said.

The condition of John McCoy, however, was reported "good" by hospital attendants. His companion, listed as Robert James Vollen-dorff, 18, also of Hanna ranch, was apparently uninjured in the accident about 8:30 p.m. a mile north of Buena Vista on Independence road. State Policeman Charles Conaway said. Vollen-dorff was charged with driving without a license, Conaway said.

One side of the car was literally "ripped off," guard rails were broken for about 50 feet before the scene of impact, and a large chunk of the cement culvert was knocked off, Conaway said.
