Senators Junk Jinx With 20 to 9 Victory

Essegian Hits No. 26, Cade Pitches 15th Win

LEWISTON, Ida.—(Special)—The Salem Senators, who hadn't won a game all season in the Lewiston Braves ball park, exploded all over the place Tuesday night for a rousing 20-9 victory, one in which four Braves flingers were cracked for 16 hits. Included was Chuck Essegian's 26th homer of the season. Salem had tried unsuccessfully for a win here in eight previous games.

The Senators were back at full strength for this one, with Russ Rosburg and Ronnie King in the lineup after suffering injuries over the weekend. Rosburg had two hits and King one. But the hitting leaders for the big surge were Jack Dunn, who had four safeties, and Essegian who had three.

Lefty Jerry Cade, pitching with little rest, went the distance for his 15th win of the season. He gave 13 hits, fanned five and walked two. Starter Bob Wadsworth was the loser for the Braves, and was followed by Bob Roberts, Merl Schellich and Jim Benton.

Salem scored three in the first, three in the third, five in the fourth, four in the fifth, two in the sixth and three more in the ninth for the Senators' biggest production of the season.

Essegian's homer was the only one of the wild game, and his three hits elevated his batting average to .366. He also had four runs batted in to push his total to 85.

Gene Klingler had four of Lewiston's hits and Howard Keefe had three.

Alhambra 18-Year-Old... Young Southpaw Signs Giants' \$50,000 Pact

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The New York Giants Tuesday announced the signing of an 18-year-old southpaw pitching plumb, Mike Francis McCormick, as a bonus player for a figure reported to be \$50,000 or more.

The youngster, a good looking 195-pounder, was signed by the Giants' veteran scout, Walter (Dutch) Rothermel. Rothermel, president of the Giants, personally backed the deal. McCormick's record in high school and American Legion junior baseball includes five no-hit performances.

No one, including young Mike, would pinpoint the bonus money, but the Giants did outbid every other major league club with the exception of Cincinnati, which did not get into the bidding.

McCormick made his name at Alhambra, Calif., and legio ball in Southern California.

Mike had a 20-0 record this spring in high school and an overall record of 34-4 as a prep pitcher. In legion ball, over a 5-year span, the mark is 49-4.

He registered three no-hit games in legion play and two in high school. He struck out 26 of 27 batters.

Eugene Loses 2 to Spokane

SPOKANE (AP)—Spokane swept a Northwest League double header from Eugene, which used pitchers to pad out a weakened playing roster, by scores of 4-3 and 9-6 Tuesday night.

In another NWL game, Wenatchee trounced Tri-City, 11-3, in a free-hitting game that produced that rare NWL spectacle of an errorless nine innings.

Emerald Manager Cliff Dapper suspended three players who showed up for the game late and his new team combination made seven errors over the two games, including five in the nightcap.

Dapper identified the three suspended players as first baseman Gene Marinacci, utility man Jack Smith and third baseman Manny Lacosta. The manager said the trio damaged the motor of the club car they took on a fishing expedition.

Bill Bottler completed his 23rd game in 24 starts and recorded victory in the second game. Bottler almost lost his own game in the fourth when he walked five batters in succession to force in four runs.

Spokane scored runs in the third through sixth inning of the shortener opener to overcome an early Eugene lead. Jim Sampson's home run tied it up for the Indians in the fifth. Eugene's Bill Griffin allowed only three hits but he gave up eight bases on balls.

Patton, Campbell Top National 'Am' Scores

Billy Joe Patton was up to his old tricks Tuesday and set a pace which some 1,500 other golfers failed to match as he qualified for the National Amateur championship at Lake Forest, Ill., Sept. 10-15.

The unpredictable North Carolina clouter who set the golfing world agog by his shooting in the 1964 Masters tournament, fired a 36-hole score of 137 in the Carolina section at Hickory, N.C.

Patton had rounds of 70-67-137 over the 6,000-yard, par 72 Catawba Country Club course and topped his nearest rival among eleven qualifiers in that district by six strokes.

Calhoun Risks Unbeaten Mark

CHICAGO (AP)—Rory Calhoun of New York puts his unblemished midweight record on the line Wednesday night against Spider Webb of Chicago in a 10-round bout.

Calhoun, 22-year-old son of an Atlanta, Ga., Baptist minister, will be aiming for his 24th straight victory in the nationally televised (ABC, 6 p.m. PST) fight at Chicago Stadium.

Calhoun, managed by Frank Bachman and trained by veteran Charlie Goldman, is considered one of the most promising young boxing prospects in the business. He has scored 12 knockouts and has shown ability to take a punch as well as serve one.

Webb, from Idaho State, has his last bout was Aug. 6, in New York, when he defeated Charlie Cotton in 10 rounds.

Webb, 24, is a former national collegiate champion from Idaho State who is on the way up in the 160-pound ranks after serving an Army hitch. He took a 10-round decision from Holly Mims in Chicago Stadium last month and scored a six-round knockout over Bobby Boyd March 17, 1954.

Freeman-Bastien Duet Win Mainer Via Foul

They didn't get the Northwest tag team championship trophy, because no mat tie can change possession on disqualification. But the tag combo of Herculean Herbie Freeman and Rousing Red Bastien nonetheless got the main event victory at the Army last night, over titleholders Bulldog Bud Curtis and Henry Muscles Lenz.

Both Curtis and Lenz persisted in applying choke holds to staggering Bastien in the final fall, and referee Reggie Parks finally had enough, called a halt and gave the brawl to Freeman and the Minneapolis redhead.

Ref Parks was the best friend the winning combo had in the house all during the brawling. After Curtis and Lenz had taken turns roughhousing Freeman in the first fall, with Lenz getting the clincher with a full nelson, Parks allowed an illegal, even though highly spectacular tactic by Freeman and Bastien which won the second fall.

Freeman was again in a full nelson, by Lenz. Herbie gasped for Bastien to mount the top rope in a corner of the ring and let fly with a soaring kick. This he did, and both feet landed solidly on Freeman's chest. The impact knocked both Freeman and Lenz flat, and Herbie jumped aboard for a quick pin. Curtis and Lenz roared in protest, but were ignored. Had they done the same thing to Herbie and Bastien, chances are the gathering would have attempted to join in the fracas, with chairs.

In the first match on the card Parks won two flying head scissors, a slam and a press to beat Don Kinfred in a rousing clash, and in the second mix Doran O'Hara beat bearded Tony Borne via a disqualification and a whirling full nelson.

Junior Medalist Loses 1st Match

Mickey Mantle Hits Home Run No. 45

The Pittsburgh Pirates, powered by Dale Long's three-run homer, knocked off Milwaukee 5-4 Tuesday night trimming the Braves' National League lead to 1 1/2 games after the second-place Brooklyn Dodgers had split a doubleheader with the last-place Chicago Cubs.

Brooklyn won the opener 4-4 with three ninth-inning runs by Don Newcombe gained his 21st victory in relief. But the Cub won 4-3 in the second game, cut to 7 1/2 innings by darkness in lightless Wrigley Field.

Third-place Cincinnati hammered the New York Giants 11-1 to edge to within three games of the lead. Philadelphia defeated St. Louis 6-4.

Mantle Slams 45th

In the American League, Mickey Mantle hit his 45th home run as the New York Yankees padded their lead to eight games with a 4-0 decision over Kansas City in a game held to six innings by rain. Second-place Cleveland, held to four hits by Ray Moore, lost to Baltimore 1-0. The Chicago White Sox salvaged a split at Washington, winning 5-3 after a 6-2 defeat. Detroit defeated Boston 6-3.

Five consecutive hits, including Long's 25th homer, after two were out in the seventh tied the score for Pittsburgh against Warren Spahn, who was seeking his 190th major league victory. Dick Groat's infield single scored the clincher in the eighth against rookie Bob Townbridge. Elroy Face won it in relief of Dick Hall, who was (Continued next page)

Shanty Keeps Boat Trophy

DETROIT (AP)—A roaring Seattle speedboat that never faltered once she got under way kept the historic Harmsworth International Trophy in the United States Tuesday with a 2 1/2 mile victory over the Canadian challenger, Miss Supertest.

The defending craft, Shanty I, driven by Lt. Col. Russell Schleen, Air Force jet plane pilot, averaged a comparatively slow 80.730 miles per hour. But she did her first five-mile lap at a speed of 97.869 miles per hour.

The Canadian challenger, Miss Supertest, driven by Bill Braden of Hamilton, Ont., came into Tuesday's final heat by virtue of the mishap that took Shanty out of competition at the start of Monday's heat. The Seattle craft developed supercharger trouble and was unable to finish the second heat.

Tuesday the two boats went across the starting line much as they did in the two earlier heats—the challenger again ahead by about 300 feet. And once again the Canadian craft lost the lead in the first part of the initial lap.

The challenger's engine coughed and sputtered repeatedly while the defender just roared along with no apparent after effects of Monday's engine trouble.

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
